Two Council meetings have been held since the publication of the last magazine, and the elections - the AGM in May, followed by an ordinary meeting in June.

At the AGM on 17 May 2011, Maria Naylor was re-elected as Chairman, with Rob Newton as her Vice Chairman. Other returning councillors include Selina Allen, Richard Brocklebank, Myran Eade, Peter Friend, Felicity Groves, John Mordaunt and Ian Paisley. Fred Thurston had made the decision not to restand. All of them must be thanked for all the time and effort voluntarily given to serve the Parish.

- Planning Maria (Chairman), Peter (Vice Chairman), Richard, Felicity and Ian.
- Environment Felicity (Chairman), John (Vice-Chairman), and Myran.
- FGP the Chairman and Vice Chairman of the Council and of both Committees.
- Selina Allen is the School Governor at Framfield School and Ann Newton at Blackboys.
- Ian Paisley is the Tree Warden.

Blackboys – reduction in speed limit – I have had news that the speed limit reduction is back on the cards for Blackboys with the associated traffic calming. ESCC will be presenting the revised proposals to the Council at 6.30 pm on Tuesday, 26 July 2011 just prior to the Council meeting in the Village Hall, Blackboys. A petition has been received by ESCC to do something about the speed of traffic on the B2192 as well as a similar request for the Palehouse Common Road – a busy time for ESCC!

Sandie Smith takes the bookings and does the cleaning at the Village Hall, Blackboys. Great thanks must be given to them all for their time and efforts for the Parish.

Some remedial repair works will be commissioned at the Memorial Hall before the start of the football season.

fuss of the sweet but lively little dog. Wanting Chaser the dog to feel at home, she had given him the run of the house. Molly was very frightened and did not feel safe in her home any more. "Where is she?" I enquired. "Put your coat on and I'll show you" she said. We went out into the sodden wind swept garden, the rain still pouring down. I still could not see her. "There she is" she said pointing to the flat roof of the garage. I could not see anything at first and stepped back to get a better look and there she was. All I could see were two soaking wet ears flattened against Mollie's head as she crouched down trying pitifully to avoid the wind and driving rain on the exposed roof.

Molly refused to come down and we retreated indoors to discuss the situation. I offered advice on how to improve the situation, but when Mrs Jones explained that Molly was old and frail we regretfully decided that Chaser should be returned to rescue so he could be re-homed in a cat free home. I knew that once Chaser had gone Molly would soon return to her old routine and enjoy the warmth and comfort of her home again.

I have been called to other very similar situations where a new dog has been introduced into cat only households. Invariably it is the same story where the new dog is given access to all the house and the resident cat or cats decide to leave home. Sometimes they decide to move into another household or they compromise by finding alternative accommodation in the garden shed, under the parked car or handy bush. Occasionally they decide a safe refuge can be found under a bed or in the airing cupboard where the dog cannot reach them. I heard of one cat that decided to live in the airing cupboard only coming out for calls of nature and food literally for years. When the dog eventually died years later the cat amazingly resumed its previous routine and enjoyed the entire house again.

In most cases a little thought and forward planning before introducing the new dog would have prevented the problem.

It is most important that the dog is restricted to a limited area downstairs while the cats should have escape routes and plenty of high places to retreat to where they feel safe. Using a baby gate to restrict the dog and letting the cats have free access, particularly upstairs, will all help. Before they meet, familiarise them to each other's scent on clothing, articles and rooms. They can then gradually get accustomed to the new strange smells. Hopefully, having slowly and carefully introduced the pets to each other they will then become friends.

Being a harvest mouse is a tough business. Modern agriculture has made their life more difficult and the tidying up of verges and removal of hedgerows has depleted their habitat. Then there is the weather to contend with. If they survive all that, there is a range of hungry predators; stoats, foxes, kestrels, cats and crows who would find them a tasty snack, while studies of barn owl pellets reveal that harvest mice make up one per cent of their diet!

Surprisingly, the little harvest mouse was not recognised as a distinct species until the late 18th Century when the great Selbourne Naturalist Gilbert White sent two specimens to Thomas Pennant, a regular fellow correspondent describing them as separate species for the first time. In fact there has been no archaeological evidence of harvest mice before Roman times, giving rise to the idea that they might have been brought into this country at that time.

While walking in summer and autumn it is worth taking an extra peek into grass verges and tall vegetation bordering agricultural fields, you just might find a little straw cricket ball clinging tenuously to the stalks and perhaps give a little thought to the smallest mammal in Europe and the struggle it has to survive in these modern times.

All is Safely Gathered In

As the height of summer gently glides into autumn, golden sheaves of wheat will decorate the late August landscape and the light and the very texture of the countryside seems to change with the approaching new season. A very 'romantic' or idealised view of our 21st century landscape I know, but even in this highly mechanised modern world, the onset of autumn does have a very distinct feel about it; a sense of reaping the efforts of all the hard work that went before and is about to come again soon.

For much of our wildlife it is a time when the rigours of raising a family are over and the essential task of getting ready for surviving the winter either through migration, hibernation or by staying here and 'toughing out' the cold months begins. Our smallest rodent owes its name to this season, the harvest mouse, a really charming little creature that is probably not uncommon, but its size precludes it from being seen very much. The Latin name *Micromys minutus* is indeed very apt.

As the name implies, the harvest mouse has an association with cereals, particularly wheat and builds a nest of woven grasses around the stems of crops and grasses which can range from half to a full metre off the ground. In fact you are far more likely to record the presence of harvest mice through finding the nests during winter once the surrounding vegetation has fallen, though by this time the mice will have abandoned them. The nest is spherical like a cricket ball and breeding nests can be up to 10cms in diameter whereas a non-breeding chamber is only half the size.

Harvest mice don't hibernate so their size makes them vulnerable to cold, wet winters. It also means they have high energy requirements and during their short life they have to continually search for seeds, berries and insects to sustain them. They usually have two or three litters a year, mainly between May and October, and average around six young in each litter. They change from being blind, naked rodents at birth to exploring outside the nest at eleven days to being totally abandoned to their own devices five days later.
