The Parish Council met on Tuesday, 30 January and 27 February 2007.

Following on from my last report, as I am sure everyone is aware, WDC refused the recent planning application for Bird-in-Eye North. We still wait to see if anything will be forthcoming for Bird-in-Eye South.

Jack Gore (WDC) reported that WDC have set their portion of the Council Tax with a rise of 4.2%, which is considerably lower than the other authorities that make up the total Council Tax bill. Chris Dowling (ESCC) stated that ESCC's part of the Council Tax will rise by 4.3%. East Sussex is the second worstfunded council in England receiving almost the least amount of Government funding although more and more statutory functions are delegated to them.

Rosemary James attended both meetings to update the PC on the future of Rosemary's Pantry and the Post Office. Rosemary wishes to retire and is looking for a successor. However, the Government has recently announced that there are to be 2,500 Post Office closures so until it is known if Framfield is to be one of them the situation remains rather 'on hold'. The news will be known at the beginning of April. In the meanwhile anyone interested in filling the much-needed postmaster/mistress role should contact Rosemary in the first instance as we are all hopeful that Framfield will not be one of the forced closures.

The PC set the precept for the forthcoming financial year (2007/08) at £32,000 – the smallest portion of everyone's annual Council Tax bill!

Recreation Grounds - the contracts have been agreed for the maintenance of the three Parish recreation grounds and allotments for the next three years. The idea of providing a sports pavilion on both Framfield and Blackboys recreation grounds has been discussed. This would enable the Memorial Hall to become more of a function hall and changing facilities etc could be provided in the new pavilion, which might encourage more sports to the area.

The first Farmers' Market at the Memorial Hall was a great success and will be repeated every fourth Saturday in the month, 10-12 noon.

Blackboys Village Hall has been awarded a Big Lottery grant of £12,000 to enable the improvement works to continue. This is all thanks to the great efforts of our Chairman, Eryl Thomas.

### Framfield & Blackboys Horticultural Society

You should have received with this newsletter the Schedule for the Summer Show. This year we have changed the format of the dog show to a "Fun Dog Show" (which will not be judged under Kennel Club Rules) and to add to the fun there will be a Fancy Dress class for dogs (optional for owners!). There is no need to come early to register – just come along - entries (at £1 per class) will be taken in the ring and judging will commence promptly at 2.00pm. Everyone will be charged admission to the showground including dog owners (who haven't had to pay in the past) and this remains at £1 for adults and 20p for Also this year we will be hosting our very first Scarecrow children. Competition with a prize of £10 going to the winning entry and, as they were so successful last year. Wheelbarrow Races will be running throughout the afternoon with wheelbarrows once again being provided by Windmill Feeds. 

#### BACK FROM THE BRINK

Imagine that you are sitting on a bench somewhere in Sussex, enjoying your sandwiches when all of a sudden a huge bird comes and snatches it from your hand. Well back in the 16th and early 17th century this may well have happened and the huge bird would have been a red kite.

Way back then red kites were a very common sight in all our big towns and cities and in effect did the job that your Council now perform, clearing up all the rubbish in the streets (and I will leave you to decide whether they did a better job or not). Our Elizabethan ancestors would throw out all their rubbish, including leftovers, offal and all sorts of unsavory items on which the kites thrived, and in turn were revered by the populace as useful co-habitants. Shakespeare refers to kites no less than 15 times in his plays.

However, as we moved towards greater sanitation, coupled with more intensive agriculture, attitudes towards kites changed and their fortunes tumbled spectacularly. They were now considered vermin and a penny bounty was attached to their head. Persecution and a lack of carrion led to kites becoming virtually extinct in Britain to the extent that by the 1930's there was only one known breeding female left in the country, in mid-Wales.

Changing attitudes, decline in game keeping and conservation methods pulled these wonderful birds back from the brink. Supplemented by young birds from the continent, release projects in the Chilterns and Scotland have been remarkably successful to the extent that since 1992 the breeding population in the Chilterns has gone from zero to over 250 pairs. In addition, the Welsh population has also flourished, and rather ironically youngsters from the UK are now being used to bolster the declining European population.

We are now seeing the benefit of this increase in these beautiful birds in Sussex as more and more are now being seen on a regular basis and indeed they are now breeding in the west of the County.

The signs are that they will continue to expand and may be even more successful than buzzards. The one thing that might limit their growth is the fact that we are too tidy these days, we are not allowed to leave dead livestock out as carrion as it is perceived as a health and safety risk. In Wales, the Chilterns and parts of Scotland meat is actually put out for kites at feeding stations in a controlled way, sometimes attracting a couple of hundred birds at a time and have become great tourist attractions because of this practice.

Red kites are beautiful majestic birds; they represent a real conservation success, a beacon of hope. Where they occur they are easy to see, you only have to drive up the M40 to understand why they have made this one of Britain's most dangerous roads! I'm sure that within the next ten years they will be a regular feature of the skies over Sussex.

Mind you, you might have to be a little bit more careful about what you have in your picnics.
