

FRAMFIELD PARISH COUNCIL - May/JUNE 2007

The Parish Council met on Tuesday, 15 May (the AGM) 26 June 2007.

At the AGM Eryl Thomas was re-elected as Chairman with Rob Newton again as Vice-Chair. The decision was taken to keep all committees the same for one month and then review them in June. Jeremy Bacon and Rita Redman were welcomed on board as 'new' councillors in addition to the nine previously in office.

Adoption of The Local Authorities (Model Code of Conduct) Order 2007

All Councillors were in receipt of a report dated 5 May 2007 recommending the adoption of The Local Authorities (Model Code of Conduct) Order 2007 as detailed below. Following discussion the meeting resolved:

(1) That pursuant to section 51 of the Local Government Act 2000 the Council in place of the model code of conduct previously adopted in 2002 hereby adopts with effect from (14 May 2007) the Standards Board's version of the Model Code of Conduct attached to the report being an amended version of the code set out in the Schedule to the Local Authorities (Model Code of Conduct) Order 2007 (SI 2007/1159) to the extent that it is mandatory for parish councils and including paragraph 12(2) of the model code and this code shall be the code expected of Members and Co-opted members of the Council.

(2) That the ten General Principles are hereby adopted as a nonenforceable annex to the Code to remind members and the public of the principles underlying the Code.

In June a Framfield resident was in attendance commenting on the apparent inaccessibility of the minutes. It is not practical to put the full minutes in the Parish Magazine but as noted in all my reports I am happy for anyone who requires a copy to contact me. I also leave copies in Country Fare in Blackboys.

With my District Councillor 'hat' on I commented that the Parish needed to be aware of the publication of the WDC Local Development Framework Issues and Options Paper (Core Strategy & Generic Policies) in early July. This document contains a broad view of possible sites for development for the next twenty years. There is far more in the paper than is required (8,000 dwellings need to be built between 2011 and 2026) and the public have a six-week period to state their preferred views. This should be done by answering the questionnaire on the document. The consultation process ends on 13 August 2007. Unless WDC produces the appropriate





VEHICLES?

The new law will require vehicles (including those used by churches) to be smokefree at all times if they are used <u>Either</u> to transport members of the public,or in the course of paid or voluntary work by more than one person-<u>regardless</u> of whether the persons are in the vehicle at the same time or at different times. Vehicles that are primarily used for private purposes will<u>not</u> be required to be smokefree.

Smokefree vehicles will need to display a no-smoking sign consisting of the international no-smoking symbol* in each compartment of the vehicle in which people can be carried.

*The international no-smoking symbol consists of a graphic representation of a single burning cigarette enclosed in a red circle of at least 70mm in diameter with a red bar across it.

GATE HOUSE, FRAMFIELD

The Gate House project is connected to a registered charity, the Rural Housing Trust, and provides five selfcontained accommodation units unfurnished at a low rental for young married couples /families for a limited period of several years.

The purpose is to offer a first, affordable, step on the housing ladder to enable savings to be built up for the next move – hopefully, ownership of a house or flat. The project has been running successfully since 1992 but, with the current house-price inflation, the emphasis for serious savings has moved very much to the fore. Accordingly, a savings element has been built into rental payments for the benefit of occupants on their departure, having completed a satisfactory tenancy. The level of this savings element is discussed with all applicants. Priority is given for applicants from within the parish of Framfield although the Management Committee can accept occupants from neighbouring parishes. HOME SECURITY

A home is best secured when it has locking windows, and good quality locks fitted to external doors. Sometimes improvements to security are put off simply because of the cost.

There are schemes operating in Wealden which might be able to help in certain circumstances. Anchor Housing (based in Hailsham) operate a "Handyman " scheme, with quite low labour costs, and they fit good quality locks. For further information it may be worth a call to Anchor Housing on 01323 442556.

As Crime Prevention Officer, I have access to (limited) funds which can be used where a householder simply has no spare cash to use for improving security. These funds are operated through what is known as the "Homesafe" scheme, and if anybody requires further information about the scheme please contact the Wealden Crime Prevention Officer.

THERE BE DRAGONS

Dragons abound throughout Sussex, or to be more accurate dragonflies, and August is a great time to get out and about to look for them. In fact you don't have to go out to look for them especially if you have a garden pond as even the smallest can still attract dragonflies or even more their smaller cousins the damsetflies.

Dragonflies and damselflies both belong to the family Odonata and there are two basic differences between them, dragonflies are bigger, more robust and when they are at rest their wings are held at ninety degrees to their body, whereas damselflies are smaller, daintier and fold their wings down the length of their body while resting. Having got the differences sorted out it's time to start searching for them.

The big dragonflies are more obvious and the biggest of these is the Emperor, a big blue insect that continually hawks over its territory be it a small garden pond or large lake. The males have a light blue coloured body and will chase other dragonflies, insects including butterflies and even small birds that enter their territory. At the opposite end of the scale the UK's smallest dragonflies, the darters, become more evident. The Common Darter is as its name implies with the male a bright red colour while the female is yellow. Just like us humans, the colour in this species fades as they age and they usually end up a dull brown colour at the end of their life.

These two species are just two of the more spectacular but common dragonflies that are relatively easy to see. A really exotic damselfly which is also quite common around here is the very aptly named Beautiful Demoiselle. The largest of our native damselflies, this iridescent blue insect patrols slow moving stretches of streams with plenty of overhanging vegetation accompanying patches of dappled sunlight where the males carry out their not too ferocious territorial disputes. To come across these lovely insects along a river or stream bank is to almost transport you to a rainforest habitat as they are so colourful.

There are only 39 species of dragons and damsels in the UK of which a good majority occur in Sussex, and just a little bit more time spent looking for them can be very rewarding indeed. They are also fascinating creatures in their own right, so here are five interesting facts about dragonflies.

- They don't sting; they can bite, though very seldom do, despite people in the old days calling them 'devil's darning needles'.
- Unlike most other insects, they can move their 4 wings independently of each other which enables them to loop-de-loop and even fly backwards! They can also reach speeds of over 30 kilometres per hour.
- They spend most of their life as larvae under water and the bigger dragonflies can live for 4 years in this stage. When they emerge into their adult stage they only live for a few weeks.
- 4. Newly emerged dragonflies will move away from water for a few days until they are fully mature, and have often been noted over a mile away from water. When they are ready they look for a territory and a mate by a river, lake or pond.
- 5. They are carnivorous in both the larvae and adult stages and are able to extend their jaw, which they keep concealed behind a type of shield, when catching their prey.

Just a brief glimpse into the wonderful world of dragons and damsels, so while you are out and about this month take a little bit more time to seek out these wonderful, exotic creatures by the waterside.


