Warmest greetings from Framfield Vicarage.

The Lawrence's finally landed on Friday 2nd November and the warmth of welcome we have all received has overwhelmed us. Thank you all very much for making us so welcome.

On an introductory note, I am usually known as Chris (only my mother calls me Christopher if she is about to have a stern word with me!). I am married to Sarah and we have four daughters; Lois (11), Phoebe (10), Isobel (6) and Olivia (4). My working background was with the MoD as a senior mechanical engineer in the Naval Warheads Department until 2001 when I was given the opportunity to train for the ministry. The family spent the next two years in Oxford while I studied at Wycliffe Hall theological college.

Prior to becoming a full time mother Sarah ran her own business as a beauty therapist, latterly from Buxted Park. My first appointment was as Curate in the parishes of Wadhurst, Stonegate and Tidebrook where we have been for the past four years.

The road to Framfield has not been an easy one. Many seemingly fruitless job applications having gone before, but God often saves the best till last if you are prepared to hang in there and simply trust that He has it all under control. We are certain that this is the place we are supposed to be and as such are looking forward optimistically to a bright and fruitful future.

So what of the future for the church and community? I am of the firm belief that God has created each one of us to be in a right relationship with Him through his son Jesus Christ and as more men, women and children come into that relationship the family of God expands and the community thrives. In essence there should be no division between the church and community; one is an expression of the other.

One of my particular desires is that the church family is not looked upon as a group of religious people. Being a Christian has very little to do with religion.

As we are all aware a great deal of the worlds problems, both past and present, can be attributed to 'religion'.

Rosemary James -

I can now write telling everybody who contributed so very generously to Rosemary's sponsored child in Ethiopia. Rosemary has sponsored the child for seven years and her name is Etaferahu Yeshaw, she is now fourteen years old and lives in a village called Cheleme. The village is 520 km to the north-east of Addis-Abbaba, the capital of Ethiopia. Her father is a farmer and her mother a housewife and she has one brother and *OM* sister.

Not all the money is going directly to Etaferahu but to the village community. It consists of the purchase of reference books for Cheleme primary and junior school, sixty combined desks for the school, twenty four kits of sports wear, five volleyballs and five footballs.

A new house has been built for Etaferahu and family, made of wood and stone with a thatched roof. Also, one milk cow, one plough ox and five sheep. Plus five sheep for twenty needy children of the village.

As you can see. World Vision has done, I think, a great job for Rosemary's project. *One* which I think she would have greatly approved. Giving Etaferahu better living conditions, a better education and better prospects in life for her and all the village community.

Through your generous donations, the future of this village in Ethiopia must be truly thankful for this part of East Sussex. I must once again thank you for your generosity in your tributes to Rosemary and benefiting our not so privileged people in Cheleme village in Ethopia.

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It may surprise some that God has little time for pious religion. FRAMFIELD PARISH COUNCIL – SEPTEMBER/OCTOBER 2007

The Parish Council met on 25 September and 30 October 2007. I detail below some of the items that were discussed and other issues for information. Anyone wishing for a copy of the full minutes to any meeting please do not hesitate to contact me.

Eryl Thomas thanked everyone involved in this year's Summer Show with special thanks to Kathy Gore for all her unending efforts for what has become a real Parish event.

The subject of drawing up tenancy agreements for Blackboys allotment holders has been on the table for some time now. The Parish Council will endeavour to put the wheels in motion in time for the new financial year on 1 April 2008. The rent may also increase from April 2009, which will be five years since the last increase. More information will be available in the next edition of the magazine.

With the winter months drawing in residents seem to pay more attention to street lighting or more to the point when the lights are not operating as they should! All the Parish street lighting is owned and maintained by the Parish Council care of EDF Energy but any problems need to be reported to me in the first instance either by telephone or email.

Chris Dowling discussed the problems with speeding drivers on our roads and particular attention was paid to the B2192 in Blackboys where there has been another spate of accidents. Not only is the speed of the vehicles a problem but also the condition of the pavements - photographic evidence was provided by local residents.

The pavilion project is ongoing with regular meetings of the parties concerned -this is reported fully in a separate article in this magazine.

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FRAMFIELD PARISH COUNCIL - CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Introduction. As a Parish Council we try and communicate with all Parishioners and this report is part of that process. Since last year's report we have had elections for both District and Parish Councils. Ann Newton, our Parish Clerk is now also our District Councillor and we wish her well in this new role. This is a good opportunity to thank our outgoing District Councillor, Jack Gore, for his efforts on our behalf over the last 12 years; it has not always been easy but his good sense and balance have been much appreciated. May I also thank, on your behalf, Ann Newton, who deals with Parish day to day problems and fellow Councillors for their time and effort, given freely, through the year.

Planning. Another year and the Bird-in-Eye spectre still hangs over us. Proposals for developing the southern part of this area were refused and an appeal has been made. But the overall position is unlikely to be clear until the New Year as other related development propositions have also been made and appealed and these will all be taken into account by the Planning Inspector. Following local opposition to a new caravan site at Mill field in Blackboys the applicant lodged an appeal which was heard as an Informal Hearing and I am very pleased to report that the Inspector agreed this was not a suitable site.

Environment. Generally we have a good record as far as footpath maintenance is concerned but landowners sometimes do need to be reminded to keep accesses clear, safe and marked. Equally users should always keep to paths, secure opened gates and not leave litter, Then we will all be happy! There seems to have been slightly fewer traffic accidents this year on most roads throughout the Parish but there are some sites which see a high level of activity. Speed limits are still too

FRAMFIELD PARISH COUNCIL Recreation grounds - Pavilions

We hope you are already aware that the Parish Council is embarking on a project to replace the existing sports changing facilities at each of the Framfield and Blackboys recreation grounds. The concept was discussed at a public meeting in March this year followed by an update at the Parish Annual Meeting in May. Reflecting the expressed support, the Parish Council decided at its July meeting to go ahead and this was publicised at the Summer Show in August.

The deficiencies of the existing facilities are well known to regular users (cricket and football clubs) and they have been involved in the design of new facilities. With improved facilities the possibility of after school activities including team sports could be safely supported. A small steering group is overseeing the project and reporting to the Parish Council who will be responsible in the long term for maintenance of the facilities. We have already had some help from 'Clearwater' (building company) in the design and planning aspects of the proposal. We expect to get planning approval early in the New Year and, depending on the success of our fundraising efforts, work might start before the end of the year.

Each building is likely to cost about £50,000 even if we and the Clubs do a lot of the straightforward work ourselves. Ideally, if every household in the Parish contributed £100 we would have sufficient funds. But we realise that not everyone would either agree or be able to afford such a sum and that raising the Parish element of Council Tax by a significant amount would also not be welcomed. So, we will seek grants from appropriate bodies, charities and councils. An appeal for contributions will also be made to business and commercial interests within the Parish.

But this will probably not be enough alone and we are also seeking, therefore, financial help from parishioners (you the reader!). If you feel you can make a positive contribution to this venture, or want further information, please contact our Clerk, Ann Newton or any Councillor.

We held our AGM on Wednesday 7th November, and I would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone that was able to come, for their support. Kathy has been in the chair for 9 years and made such a difference to the Society and Summer show which, would not be the success it is today without her support. She will be a tough act to follow but I will do my best.

Recreation Grounds/Allotments. We have 3 grounds which all need maintenance and a lot of our annual budget goes on this. So we do hope you all use and enjoy them. We still have problems with dog fouling and will install more dog mess bins at Framfield and Blackboys grounds but please let us know if you can identify persistent offenders. One set of swings at Blackboys has had to be replaced at a cost of £7,000 and this sort of expenditure may be needed in coming years for the play areas at both grounds. The Blackboys allotments always seem to be occupied but if you are interested in securing one then please contact Ann Newton who keeps a waiting list.. Over the coming year we will be looking again at allotment tenancy arrangements and also at the position in Framfield.

Elsewhere you will read about the project to have Pavilions at Framfield and Blackboys grounds. This is a major project for us and any advice, help and support in implementing this initiative will be much appreciated.

Law and Order. Most of us are aware of the role of the Police Community Support Officers and many will now be used to seeing our PCSO, Nick Arthur, around the Parish. Generally the Parish does not have a significant crime problem, but we do have our moments, and the police reaction is quite positive. Most of us probably feel the PCSO initiative to be a good one in that we actually see them out and about so if/ when the Government reduces funding for them we will need to make strong representation.

Housing. Depending on the figures produced we sometimes find ourselves agreeing with the District Council on likely requirements for housing including the affordable element.

Given the national and South East expressed need for housing we will be facing pressure for development in the villages as well as the towns. In rural areas the need and shortfall of adequate infrastructure is a key issue and we must continue lobbying for this to be a key element of any proposed site consideration. As a Parish Council we try to be realistic on this subject and accept that over the next few years a small amount of development in the villages will happen as it has done in the past. What is clearly unacceptable is something the size of Bird-in-Eye within a rural parish.

Points of View. There was a Parish Council stall at the summer show and it was a good opportunity to make contact and seek views. But we also have an Annual Parish Meeting each May when only a handful of parishioners attend.

So, are you all perfectly happy with what we are doing or do you think we would not listen to your views if you gave them? Of course we hope it is the former but if not please let one of us know. Councillors give their time and effort willingly but some feedback does actually help morale!

Framfield C E Primary School November 2007

We welcomed 14 new children into our Reception class in September and are pleased to report that they have settled in extremely well. This is partly due to the excellent transfer programme which we run with Framfield Playgroup, and also to the rest of the children in the school who have welcomed them and supported them as they learn how to negotiate their way through the school day. All the children participated in our Harvest Festival in the church which was a considerable achievement for the very youngest children. We also held a service of celebration and thanksgiving for our Bishop's Commendation award. The Archdeacon of Lewes and Hastings joined us for this special occasion, as did Nigel Sarjudeen, Education Officer from the Diocese, members of the school and parish community. It was a lovely occasion which demonstrated the children's confidence and the eagerness with which they approach their religious experiences and education. This term promises to be as busy as ever with plans for a Christmas production already underway. The School Council is discussing a project to improve the school's pond, and staff and governors continue to work towards improving the premises and the provision which we offer. The most visible sign of our continued improvements is the fence along The Street. I am aware that this has not met with total approval locally and wish to express my hope that the benefits to the children will be recognised. We have improved the overall safety of the playground - the children are not confronted by speeding cars as they play, there is a reduction in pollution and noise, and more shade from the sun. In addition the fence has created secluded play areas and a marvellous surface for games and art work. Although they cannot be seen the children are still there and are still enjoying their work and play.

Hedgehogs are one such visitor that I'm sure nearly everyone would like to see snuffling across the lawn or flowerbed. Harmless and helpful to the gardener, we put out food and drink to encourage them, build them little boxes to hibernate in and carefully check the bottom of bonfires to make sure they aren't incinerated on Guy Fawkes night. Turn them into moles however, and all sorts of medieval instruments of torture are devised to discourage and at worst, kill them. What do they do wrong? They have a similar diet to hedgehogs so are just as useful, but the fact that they make dirt piles on our lawns turns them into public enemy number one. If hedgehogs made a mess would our attitude to them change? Bees we like, or at least tolerate, while wasps send us into bouts of apoplexy, but both deliver a nasty sting. Bees make honey, wasps, well they just make themselves a nuisance, but in fact they can be very good for the garden as they feed on some post species.

One of the great pleasures in life is to sit out in the garden of a summers evening and hearing the frogs croaking from some hidden, dank comer, but my neighbour can't bear to be anywhere near them. Horrible, slimy things that jump out at you while you are pottering, so I'm sure that he would be very happy to see a grass snake slither into the pond and take a frog for lunch, whereas for most people this would be the signal to run indoors and not emerge for at least a week.

A glimpse of a brown rat will have us reaching instantaneously for the phone to call the rodent operatives, as they are known these days, but a badger lumbering up the path at dusk can elicit real delight, until that is they start digging up the lawn in search of earthworms and grubs, then our attitude changes somewhat. I have a long time memory of many years ago when someone rang the Trust to ask what was the Trust going to do about "its" badgers digging up my lawn?!

Wildlife needs our gardens. We have systematically and continuously eaten into their habitats making their workd smarter and smaller. Some adapt better than others, taking advantage of new opportunities that man-made environment has to offer, but the majority of species find eking out a living more and more difficult. Generally people welcome animals, insects and birds visiting the garden, it can enhance and enrich the view from their window, and the interest in 'Gardening for Wildlife' has mushroomed over recent years.

But we can be a bit selective in what we set out to encourage and worry when the wrong species turn up. So really, when you see something is not quite to your liking, take a deep breath and just remember that it is just trying to find a little niche for life in an increasingly hostile world.


