

The Friends of Ashdown Forest

The 46th Annual General Meeting was held in Nutley on Friday 19th October, attended by 100 of our members. The past year has been a very busy one, with our New Year recruitment campaign resulting in 480 new members to date. Membership now stands at 1,167.

Our Chairman, David Streeter, announced that earlier in the year the Friends had bought 5.6 acres of land at Chuck Hatch, now known as Friend's Field, lying within the historical Pale of the Forest. Other expenditure this year included the purchase of a new vehicle and a contribution towards Forest signage.

Following the business section, we were pleased to welcome John Barnes for the first time to our meeting as the new Chairman of the Board of Conservators. Mr Barnes warmly thanked the Friends, not just for their financial support, but also for all the work done by Friends on the Forest and gave a talk on the background to the Conservators' policy of forest management and the make-up of the Board.

The Forest Superintendent, Dr Hew Prendergast, then gave a comprehensive and illustrated talk on last year's activities on the Forest. A special mention must go to an exciting new project, which has seen the employment of Louise, the new shepherd, who has field work experience on the Scottish moors, the Falkland Islands and Argentina. Together with her working dogs, she will lead her flock of 56 Hebridean sheep (plus one new ram!) to graze unfenced areas, and the results will be monitored. A new exhibition at the Forest Centre is being planned for next Easter, on the association between the Forest and warfare throughout the ages. Dr. Prendergast appealed to members to contact the Forest Centre if they have any old maps, photos, artefacts, or even memories they could contribute to the exhibition.

From the Vicarage

Love- keeps no record of wrongs (1 Corinthians 13:5).

How was your Christmas, peaceful, hectic? Many of us seemed to be very busy; no shortage of social events, school productions, family gatherings and a variety of church services to attend (*hopefully something to suit all tastes?*).

Overall it was all very enjoyable and a great opportunity for myself and the family to meet so many, and be genuinely welcomed and accepted. Thank you all very much. Coming into a different community has its pluses and minuses. The plus side is in the objectiveness in seeing things as they currently are. The parish has what I call, 'lots of smiley people' - those who greet you with a smile and a friendly welcome. Even when you are feeling a bit down, a 'smiley hello' brings an instant lift to your day. Additionally, we have so much to be thankful for. There is a lot of goodwill and hard work going on that makes this community thrive. This is a very positive place to live and it is a blessing for all of us to be part of it.

The minus side is in not knowing the history of a community. Life would be wonderful if peace and harmony existed ail the time, but as we know conflicts do arise. People fall out with each other, cross words are said or actions taken that cause others upset. Unfortunately, not all issues are resolved. Harsh words can leave deep emotional wounds that if left to fester can leave a lifelong mark and a breakdown of relationships. It would be unreasonable to get it right all the time as to err is part of our humanity. What is important when conflict arises is that it is sorted out in a timely manner. The apostle Paul writing to the church at Ephesus says *"In your anger do not sin": Do not let the sun go down while you are still angry, and do not give the devil a foothold.* (Eph 4:26)

Divide and conquer is still the order of the day and the devil's mandate if we let it be that way; the choice is ours. Paul's words are equally valid in dealing with conflict within a marriage, between friends or different institutions within a community. In a village context one person's offence can quickly gather negative support. The writer of Hebrews says 'Make every effort to live in peace with all men... see to it that no bitter root grows up to cause trouble and defile many (paraphrase Heb12:14-15).

But is there a way back when it's all gone pear shaped and long-standing grudges are still in place? The good news is 'yes'. Jesus' brother James writes 'confess your sins to each other and pray for each other so that you may be healed' (James 5:16). A straightforward apology and the asking for forgiveness breaks the hold and opens the door for restoration within a relationship.

One of the reasons for writing the above is that it has become apparent that in the not too distant past the Church has caused offence through its action or inaction within the parish. I don't propose to go into detail but by way of accepting responsibility and seeking forgiveness a Service of Reconciliation will be held as part of the 10am Parish Communion on the 24th February 2008 (3rd Sunday of Lent).

Confession is indeed good for the soul and a catalyst for a bright and positive future.

I am always so grateful to my dedicated 16 house to house collectors who cover the parish, 8 of whom exceeded £100 this time, whilst others including "businesses" were not far behind.

This year's total has been greatly helped by the Legacy of £415 in connection with the death of Ralph Foregard of Willows Rise earlier in the year, and our gratitude goes to his family.

Once again I emphasise the success of "Home Collectors", who now number 27 and who achieved a total of £466, an increase of £175 over last year. I have said before how much I would welcome more Home Collectors who would keep a collecting tin, which I will supply, to absorb small change throughout the year. I here has been a small increase in numbers who have come forward but I feel strongly that more parishioners could join our team to support those now suffering from the dangerous situations in Iraq and Afghanistan. The Royal British Legion is totally involved in the vital need to help the families of those killed as well as so many of our troops seriously wounded, with those losing limbs at such an early age.

THE FAMILIAR AND THE EXOTIC

For a birdwatcher, one of the great things about going to far away places is the excitement of seeing new and exotic birds, but this is sometimes balanced with the pleasure of coming across familiar birds in unfamiliar surroundings. My wife and I were exercising our lungs in the Himalayas of Nepal recently, and while struggling for breath at nearly 14,000 feet the distinctly recognisable trill of a wren rang out, equally happy in this overwhelmingly beautiful and dramatic landscape as it would be in a garden in Sussex

Similarly, house sparrows were common as were tree sparrows, while it was interesting to note two species that originated in Asia that have made themselves very comfortable in the UK, the ubiquitous collared dove and the ever increasing rose-ringed parakeet, yet to become established in Sussex but probably will in the near future. An interesting conundrum involved an absolute great tit look-a-like which was in fact a green-backed tit while a rather grey looking tit with similar markings was masquerading under the name of great tit.

Occasional glances to the skies gave us glimpses of familiar raptors and while we were there we saw kestrel, common buzzard, sparrowhawk, peregrine falcon and osprey. Mind you they had to share the space with gems like lammageier, crested serpent eagle, black eagle, crested goshawk and hundreds of black kites.

Green sandpiper is a bird I associate with winter walks around Henfield when I occasionally disturb one that is feeding along the muddy margins of the River Adur or its tributaries, but in the Royal Chitwan National Park we were on the back of an elephant in sweltering heat somewhere around the mid-thirties centigrade watching the same bird carefully skirting around a twelve-foot crocodile that was basking on a sandbank. The crocodile was actually the gharial, a fish-eating species, so the sandpiper was quite safe!

For those who have trouble with their warblers, then a trip to Nepal will just compound your woes The Nepalese Field Guide has about 2 pages of warblers that look just like chiffchaffs, and luckily one did oblige by singing so was at least able to identify that one as a proper chiffchaff. I was quite pleased with myself in that I identified a lemon-rumped warbler, but needed the help of a local guide to put names to some of the others.

Of course for us somewhere like Nepal is full of exotic wildlife whereas for the locals they are just part of everyday life, nothing to get excited about really. We caused some mild interest by standing on one of Kathmandu's busiest streets staring into the tops of 3 trees fascinated by hundreds of roosting fruit bats, completely oblivious to the tumult going on beneath them.

Back home again, the wren has been busy in the garden and when I see him it does bring back memories of a wonderful holiday. The Downs may not be quite as dramatic as the Himalayas, but where you are, the pleasure of watching this little bird is just the same.
