Despite the hubbub of getting children ready for school and making packed lunches etc, breakfast time at the Vicarage has Radio 2 playing in the background. Terry Wogan is usually good for a laugh and brings a good degree of lightness to the beginning of the day. In addition to the fun and frivolity Terry's programme has a Thought for the Day, given by a variety of presenters from various religious persuasions.

To all religions that believe that there is a god (whatever form god may take), no religious group can absolutely prove that their god exists. Faith is needed to bridge the gap and give credence to their particular set of beliefs. Even a devout atheist needs faith to affirm their belief that God does not exist!

As human beings we all have faith, and need faith, for our daily living. The expectation that a light will go on when you press the switch requires faith that the unseen electricity will make it happen. Sitting on a chair requires faith that the four legs will support your weight, otherwise you may just crash to the floor. There are many other daily examples we could quote that require faith but we accept them as routine as they mostly happen automatically. Over a period of time the continual cycle of 'cause and effect' affirms our beliefs and reinforces our faith; that's the way we learn and accept the world around us.

But what about faith in God; does he really exist? When you read about the many miracles Jesus performed in the Bible, are they true or a figment of someone's imagination, designed to dupe the gullible?

If you take the Bible at face value and read about Jesus' healing ministry you may well come to the conclusion that if Jesus was indeed God in human form, then performing miracles was easy for him. If He created the universe and everything in it then a few miracles here and there must have been a piece of cake!

Once Jesus started performing miracles of healing crowds flocked to him, why? In essence people had faith in Him. Jesus never turned anyone away and 'if he did it for me, he will do it for you'. Jesus moved with love and compassion on all who were in need.

St Matthew records - News about him spread all over Syria, and people brought to him all who were ill with various diseases, those suffering severe pain, the demon-possessed, those having seizures, and the paralysed, and he healed them (Matt 4:24). With Jesus words were never enough, he proclaimed the good news of God's kingdom by demonstrating it.

To believe in someone or something we require evidence, and it is right to be sceptical as words are seldom enough. Even the disciples found it hard to accept that Jesus was God but his response was to say: **Believe me when I say that I am in the Father and the Father is in me; or at least believe on the evidence of the miracles themselves (John 14:11).**

Obviously Jesus isn't physically with us today, so can we have any expectation that God may move miraculously upon us when we become ill or infirm? Well the answer is a resounding 'yes'. It takes faith to make that statement but I and many others within the local and world-wide church have personally experienced the power of God and witnessed God moving in miraculous ways. When it happens time and time again the evidence stacks up and you should be left with one conclusion; that God does exist and that He hears and answers prayer. God said He would 'watch over his word to perform it' (Jeremiah 1:12) – and praise God He does!

Before Jesus left the earth: *He called the twelve disciples to Him and gave them authority to drive out evil spirits and to heal every disease and sickness - Matthew 10:1.* Jesus healed by the power of the Holy Sprit and the disciples received the same Holy Spirit to carry on demonstrating the reality of God's kingdom. Today the same Spirit is at work within every Christian to continue the commission Jesus originally gave to the first disciples - *Matthew 28:20.*

In Framfield church we have a Healing Service at 6.30pm on the 3rd Sunday of each month. It is a very gentle, informal service and there are people who will pray for you. Even if you have never been to church or considered being prayed for, why not come along?

Whatever your need, big or small, God is there for you – you only need to have the courage to ask. **Taste and see that the Lord is good!**

St Thomas à Becket Churchyard - Flora and Fauna Survey during 2007 and ongoing

What can attract us to a church? There are probably as many answers to that question as there are people. They may include 'a real sense of God's presence'. 'a very friendly, caring community', 'I have friends who go there', 'lively services', 'beautiful building', or in some cases, 'nothing whatever'. For me, when I joined Framfield church just over a year ago I could have said yes to all of these except the last one, and I admit there was one more reason.....Framfield Church also has a wonderful churchyard! As an ecologist, I was delighted to see such a huge area providing not only a resting place for the loved ones of the community who have passed on, but also a terrific sanctuary for wildlife. This fact was already appreciated by many in the church, who have worked hard over the years at appropriately managing the churchyard. Their challenge is to maintain the right balance between keeping paths accessible to visitors, whilst taking care of the best of the wild flora allowing them to flower so beautifully in spring or summer, depending on the species, and to set seed before being mown or strimmed at the best time.

So during the summer of 2007 I embarked on a plant survey, to assist those doing the hard work (mine was the fun bit!) in deciding which bits to allow to flower and which could stand more frequent mowing. While the full results still await analysis, so far a total of over 120 species of 'higher plant' have been recorded. This does not include the fascinating range of lichens to be found on many of the older gravestones.

But of course, plants are not the only inhabitants of our churchyard - there is a whole foodweb. On a warm summer's day, a delightful range of butterflies and damselflies can be seen flitting around the flowers, and crickets and grasshoppers bouncing around in the longer grass. Allowing some areas of rough grassland near the hedges and in the uneven ground around older gravestones has also created perfect conditions for Slow Worms, a protected species which has been seen on occasion by those caring for the area. As a result of donations, last year around 6 bird boxes were put up in various trees around the churchyard I wish I'd been there when they hoisted the 3 foot-long owl box into the big beech trees by the vicarage!

So as you walk through the churchyard this spring and summer, we hope you will enjoy the beauty and amazing diversity of wildlife that you will see around you. Maybe you will be visiting the graves of your own loved ones; perhaps if you linger a while, you may catch a glimpse of the sheer creativity and generosity of the loving Heavenly Father who makes it all possible, who notices when even a sparrow falls to the ground, who cares infinitely about every little detail of our own lives, and longs to pour the same love into us as he does into the rest of his creation.

Funds are raised through annual subscriptions and social activities. In recent years Friends have organised concerts, open gardens and dinners. Since it was formed the Friends Association has contributed to the overhaul of the organ, roof repairs, the refurbishment of the Gage Chapel, the recasting of the bells and repairs to the stonework of the church windows. We are currently refurbishing the buildings iron guttering. Over £75,000 has been raised since the association was formed to maintain this beautiful building.

This summer The Friends invite all parish residents to enjoy the church and its surroundings during the 6th, 7th and 8th of June. There is something for everyone and everyone is welcome.

A way of reducing costs of heating oil is to form a fuel oil syndicate.

With substantial support from parishioners it would be possible to negotiate a very competitive price for heating oil. A commitment would be required from households to purchase their heating oil from the source with which a competitive price had been obtained for a period of 12 months.

With some 500 households participating substantial savings could be made to your annual heating costs. To participate and qualify you would need to be on the Framfield electoral roll (supplies would only be made within the Framfield parish boundaries). The cost of membership to the syndicate would be six second class stamps.

She was bought by America and her last voyage was a cruise leaving Southampton and calling at various ports from Portugal, Canary Islands, Rio de Janeiro, around Cape Horn, Peru, Panama, and on to the final destination at Long Beach California where she remains as a tourist attraction.

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GATE HOUSE FRAMFIELD

The Gate House project is connected to a registered charity, the Rural Housing Trust, and provides five self-contained accommodation units unfurnished at a low rental for young married couples/families for a limited period of several years.

The purpose is to offer a first, affordable, step on the housing ladder to enable savings to be built up for the next move. It has been hoped that this would be the ownership of a house or flat. The Project has been running successfully since 1992 but with current conditions the emphasis for serious saving has come very much to the fore. Accordingly, a savings element has been built into rental payments for the benefit of occupants on their departure, having completed a satisfactory tenancy. The level of this savings element is discussed with all applicants.

Priority is given for applicants from within the parish of Framfield although the Management Committee can accept occupants from neighbouring parishes. LIFE IN COLD BLOOD IN SHOREHAM

As always I, like millions of others, have been captivated by the latest David Attenborough television series 'Life in Cold Blood'. If anyone can make the often reviled and much maligned amphibians and reptiles almost lovable then he can and the insight the programme gave us into the lives of some of these creatures was truly remarkable. Throughout the series his boyish enthusiasm shone like a beacon from our screens and who can forget his response when he finally realised his 50 year long ambition of seeing the world's smallest chameleon during filming in Madagascar.

Some of the series was shot in the Galapagos Islands and it has been my good fortune to visit there on two occasions myself where I have sat on the rocks alongside and marvelled at the marine iguanas, those most prehistoric of reptiles and snorkelled amongst huge Pacific green turtles, so ungainly and awkward on land yet so graceful in the water. I have also been to the Charles Darwin Research Station and gazed wonderingly at 'Lonesome George' the last remaining individual of the Pinta Island race of giant tortoises, trying to imagine what it's like to be the last of your kind. George probably does not have the gift of imagination but he does represent the threats that reptiles and amphibians are under to their survival on this planet and the programme left us in no doubt that their hold in this world is more precarious than any other group of animals.

Most reptiles and amphibians live in the tropics where their numbers are great and varied while in our more temperate climate fewer are able to withstand the cooler winters. In the UK we only have 6 native reptiles and 6 amphibians, with a few other aliens having been introduced. All the natives bar the natter jack toad and the sand lizard are recorded regularly in Sussex, and with a bit of effort you can see these creatures yourselves.

As I write, my little pond in the garden is just a heaving mass of frogs, where well over 20 individuals are all involved in a sexual bonanza producing great mounds of spawn from which the next generation will emerge. Garden ponds are providing a lifeline for our frogs as the natural breeding sites in the wider countryside diminish. Meanwhile, at Woods Mill we have all been terribly excited as a similar scene was being enacted at one end of the lake, but here the participants are common toads. For me this was a great sight as in all my years at Woods Mill I have never seen such a large number of toads on the reserve.

In many garden ponds, and certainly at Woods Mill, a trip out at night with a torch will probably reveal some newts, probably the common or palmate newt, but if you are lucky it might be the magnificent great crested newts. What is more they might be indulging their displaying activity of gentle tail shaking, just like that shown on TV!

Finding amphibians can be easier than reptiles because in spring and summer they all need water, whereas snakes and lizards have a great capacity to disappear long before you come across them. Grass snakes are perhaps easier to encounter in water as frogs form a big part of their diet whereas the adder is most likely to be seen in the early morning sun, warming up on a bare patch somewhere on the Downs or in our heathlands. These are also the preferred habitats of the common lizard. Often all reptiles might be sheltering under a tin sheet or log, a really good place to find slow worms.

Programmes of the calibre of 'Life in Cold Blood' just open our eyes to the glorious wonder of the natural world and though it has shown examples of this from all over the world, there are species here right on our doorstep that have that same fantastic life style and sadly, their survival in this world is just as precarious as their exotic cousins.


