From the Vicarage

2009 – A 'Go it alone' year or the year to 'Go with God'?

There is a saying that says 'When I thought things couldn't get any worse, they did!'

This is certainly the position that many are already finding themselves in as we enter this New Year.

The economic down turn is biting hard; who would ever have thought that some of our long standing high street stores would be shutting up shop and be reduced to selling off the remaining shop fittings?

A gap on the high street is one thing but the loss of a job and the stability of a regular income quite another. In our material world serious financial worries are perhaps the number one concern of most families trying to make ends meet.

In the western world the true 'God' has been replaced by the 'Money God'. The more you have the more secure you feel. And although money can't buy you love or happiness it can certainly make life more bearable and enjoyable providing you have enough of it.

Unfortunately, as we are all aware reliance on money is a falsehood; it's just that we largely choose to ignore the fact. But an overdrawn bank account or the words 'redundancy', or 'negative equity' quickly reawaken our senses.

A crisis situation however is not all bad news as it forces us to readdress our priorities in life and look at the big picture. When your back is firmly against the wall and all human help has failed you then God may come to mind. Obviously calling upon God shouldn't be a last resort, someone that we keep like a fire extinguisher in a red box on the wall with the notice above it that says 'In case of emergency, break glass'. On a sinking ship or a plane that is spiralling to earth there are not many passengers who are not praying 'God, help me!'

I firmly believe that a simple honest prayer always gets God's attention. But what then, does God say 'why should I help you, you only want my help because you are in a situation you can't solve yourself? Such a suggestion however would be unjust and not even enter the mind of God simply because it is not in keeping with His nature — 'The Lord is full of compassion and mercy' (James 5:11) and as St John reminds us 'God is love'.

ON COURSE FOR WILDLIFE

In the darkest depths of winter it's always nice to look forward and plan exciting days for the coming year, so we at the Sussex Wildlife Trust are here to help you do just that!

The courses brochure for 2009 is available and this year we have expanded the programme even more, widening the variety of subjects, spreading the geographical area and bringing in more tutors to inspire and enthuse you! Sussex is still a wonderful county and, despite the pressures on its countryside and wildlife, one of our aims is to show people there is still so much to see and enjoy. Also we have linked up with some landowners and farmers who are doing some exciting wildlife and landscape restoration projects that also have some excellent indoor facilities to base a whole day there.

Wildlife can be enjoyed through a variety of medium and we have incorporated a number of arts-based courses into the programme. Our wildlife photography courses and safaris have been running very successfully for a couple of years now and this year we have added a 3-day botanical illustration course open to anyone with a desire to learn about drawing plants As well as budding artists we are also catering for would-be writers who want to extend their literary skills into writing about wildlife and the environment, while another course looks at how the landscape of Sussex, particularly the Downs, has been interpreted in word and song over the last 200 years. Plus there is a day on learning to make willow bowers for your garden.

Finding out about wildlife as a family can be a real treat and it is amazing how young ears and eyes spot and hear things that elude us poor adults. I recently ran an afternoon on owls principally for adults but one of the group brought along his 7-year old grandson who was just brilliant and so enthusiastic. Included in the programme are a couple of identification courses for families, one based in Ashdown Forest the other at Ninfield in East Sussex.

One of the main reasons that the Trust runs these courses is to give people the confidence to go out and apply their newly acquired knowledge to their own local area, so there are a number of training courses covering amphibians, surveying for otters and water voles, spiders, how to survey a hedgerow and many more. These will be open to anyone but we will particularly encouraging people from local conservation groups, 'Friends Of groups, parish councillors, or anyone who is interested in learning to gain the skills to volunteer for organisations like ourselves!

Of course there will be a whole range of courses to come and to see, enjoy and hopefully inspire people about our wonderful wildlife. Much of it continues to be under threat and our hope is that you will be inspired enough to help us to conserve it for others to enjoy it in the future.

the need for more affordable housing for parishioners, especially in Blackboys. We have also been concerned at the lack of consultation with the council by WDC regarding allocation of the houses. This has put us and our District Councillor in the difficult position of being questioned and criticised but without having been involved in the actual process. WDC officials are aware of our views.

Law and Order. Fortunately we have very few crimes in the Parish but as it is generally recognised the fear of crime is very prevalent so Police presence is a welcome feature around the Parish. Our last PCSO, Nick Arthur, was seen around but obviously was so good he has now been promoted to Police officer and reassigned. The delay in filling his vacancy does nothing for support and confidence in the police service but a replacement has just been announced. His name is Simon French and he can be contacted at Uckfield Police Station.

We do hope that our efforts are well directed and appreciate feedback, even criticism from which we can always learn. some monitoring activity will be launched this year using volunteers to collect data which can then be used to persuade ESCC to take positive action to manage volumes, access arrangements etc.

Environment. The Council is concerned to see that adequate footpaths are maintained throughout the Parish although the responsibility for this mostly lies with the landowners and a survey has just been undertaken to identify where repairs etc. are needed. Benches and bus shelters are the responsibility of the Council so please report any that need attention, it may take a while to get them repaired as we have only limited funds allocated for such work. David Andrews chairs the Environment Committee and would appreciate any points or suggestions from parishioners.

Recreation. The recreation grounds in the Parish are well used and appreciated by most users, however, on occasions dog mess appears so please do clear up after your dog and, if you observe any fouling, please report it rather than get into personal confrontation. The grounds are a major expenditure for a small Parish and thanks are due to Myran Eade who does such a lot in his own time to keep up standards.

The project to provide pavilions at Blackboys and Framfield grounds has passed another milestone with granting of planning permission, construction costs have been sought and in the next few months applications for grants will be made. It may well be that one pavilion could progress at a faster rate than the other but the Council is still determined to pursue the objective of new facilities at both grounds.

Blackboys allotment tenants have now got formal agreements and everyone concerned should be in no doubt as to their responsibilities, particularly towards other users. The Village Hall now has an extension car park and allotment users should use this now instead of the Hall main car park. Framfield allotments, of which the main users are the organic gardeners, also need to have tenancy agreements and some improvements to facilities are overdue and the Council will be addressing these this year. It had been hoped to do this earlier and so the patience of the users is appreciated by the Council.

Housing. 'Craftsmen's Cottages' is the latest addition to Parish housing and a welcome is extended to the new residents. It should be well known that over recent years the Council has never been convinced of

Introduction. On behalf of Councillors and our Clerk may I wish you a safe and peaceful new year. Every council is encouraged to communicate with parishioners on a regular basis and this report supplements the information you get regularly through this excellent magazine.

Two new Councillors have joined us since last years report. Fred Thurston and Brian Hodge, and both have already made a positive impact and got involved with issues. This is also an opportunity to thank fellow Councillors for all their voluntary hard work and support during the year. Many parishioners will already be aware of how much effort and patience our Clerk, Ann Newton, expends on behalf of the community and for this we should all be grateful.

Planning. Almost invariably Bird in Eye features yet again in our annual report, the Government inspector has taken comprehensive evidence and hopes to announce his findings before too long. Whatever happens the council will continue to register its concern that this is not the sort of development appropriate to a rural parish. We have a very effective Planning Committee, under the able chairmanship of Maria Naylor, who put a lot of time and effort into ensuring we contribute sensible input to the Wealden process.

Planning matters often arouse strong feelings sometimes between neighbours and we always recommend people talk to each other before going too far with the process, WDC do offer pre application advice and Ann Newton can always be asked for procedural advice on the mysteries of the planning system!

This year should see the finalising of the Wealden Local Development Framework and this will then be used as the strategic guideline for all future development in the area. We await this with interest and trepidation as it will identify housing prospects and it is unlikely that we will be spared from further development proposals affecting the Parish.

Traffic. We probably all have stories of speeding traffic but equally many of us occasionally transgress so please can we all be considerate and safe this coming year. However, it has become more noticeable that the actual volume of traffic is almost as bad an issue and hopefully


