Standing at the Crossroads

The weather is fantastic at the moment and it's just great to be alive enjoying the sunny weather; and if you haven't been yet; the coast is lovely.

Personally I find the simplicity of the seaside the perfect place to reflect on life and the future, but also a place to enjoy the moment.

We live in a fast paced society often rushing from one thing to another but for our own health and the well being of our loved ones we must take some time out. In family life vain promises will seldom do and actually putting a date in a diary or on the family calendar is what's actually needed.

In my Civil Service days I worked with many men and women who worked really hard with the aim that retirement would be the place to slow down, sit back and enjoy all the things they had worked so hard to achieve. The only problem was that the vast majority died less than two years into their retirement; a sobering but true statistic.

In recent weeks the news papers and news reports have continued to bring further revelations about the death of Michael Jackson and it has been difficult in some respects not to think about his life and the suddenness of his death. His musical talent probably brought pleasure to billions but his personal life in the spotlight of the media was often portrayed as somewhat off-beam. To some his death was seen as a tragedy, to others a merciful release from a life of frustration and contradiction.

I tend to go with the latter view – but it also begs the question that if Michael Jackson knew he was to die suddenly would he have done anything differently?

The early death of a loved one, or indeed a celebrity often brings us up short as we ponder the question 'what about my life' where am I going, do I have any direction, am I content with my lot or am I living a lie?

This week I have been reflecting on a verse from the prophet Jeremiah – he writes:-

This is what the LORD says: "Stand at the crossroads and look;

ask for the ancient paths, ask where the good way is, and walk in it, and you will find rest for your souls.

Life could be viewed as a journey interspersed with crossroads moments were a decision needs to be made. What is certain, is that life never stands still and if we never consider were we are going then our circumstances, or indeed someone else may make the decision for us for the next part of our journey.

Latterly Michael Jackson's life appeared to be one where he was surrounded with people offering him advice and direction. Some of it was probably good, but some not so good.

'Life' can mean many things to many people but a life that lacks direction is really no life at all.

Jesus described Himself as **'The Way the Truth and the Life'** and He also spoke about Himself as the 'Gateway', though which anyone can enter into a new life. A life with meaning, direction and purpose and at the end a place in heaven. He said - **'Enter through the narrow gate. For wide is the gate and broad is the road that leads to destruction, and many enter through it. But small is the gate and narrow the road that leads to life, and only a few find it'**.

Like it or not we are all spiritual beings as well as having flesh and blood. But is often the spiritual side of life that glossed over or at best seen as of secondary importance. This in itself is a tragedy as it when we seek God first that we find that rest of life automatically falls into place!

In addition to standing and looking at the crossroads the Lord says ask for the ancient paths; ask where the good way is, and walk in it. One of today's problems is that people don't take the time to stop and 'ask' for Godly direction. Is it any wonder that there are so many restless souls?

The Latest Bank Scam !

I have recently been the "target" of fraudulent attempts to obtain money from my current bank account. Your debit card can be read literally around the corner by someone with a mobile phone. A "Standing Order " form is then taken from the bank, the fraudster fills in your details, copies your signature and makes whatever sum of money he/she thinks you may not notice going from your account to theirs, and posts the Standing Order form back to the bank. If you are lucky, as I was, you may receive a letter thanking you for setting up the Standing Order and telling you what date your first payment will be made. I reported two attempts to obtain money this way to the police in Uckfield and have now been informed that the matter is countrywide and is being dealt with by the Metropolitan Police Fraud Squad.

I was lucky— but do check your statements. The fraudsters usually start with small amounts which you may not notice. Query everything ! I would hate anyone to go through the distress it caused me—suspecting everyone and everything, completely unable to trust anyone until the police gave me the answers. *Sue Whitehead. Editor.*

find them a handy little snack, while studies of barn owl pellets reveal that they make up one per cent of their diet!

Surprisingly, the little harvest mouse was not recognised as a distinct species until the late 18th Century when the great Selbourne Naturalist Gilbert White sent two specimens to Thomas Pennant, a regular fellow correspondent and describing them as a separate species for the first time. In fact there has been no archaeological evidence of harvest mice before Roman times, giving rise to the idea that they might have been brought into this country at that time.

While out on your walks in late summer and autumn it is worth taking an extra peek into grass verges and tall vegetation bordering agricultural fields, you just might find a little straw cricket ball clinging tenuously to the dying stalks and perhaps give a little thought to the smallest mammal in Europe and the struggle it has to survive in these modem times.

ALL IS SAFELY GATHERED IN

Golden sheaths of wheat decorate the late August landscape as the height of summer gently glides into the approaching autumn, when the light and the very texture of the countryside seems to change with the new season. A very 'romantic' or idealised view of our 21st century landscape I know, but even in this highly mechanised modern world, the onset of autumn does have a very distinct feel about it; a sense of reaping the efforts of all the hard work that went before and is about to come again soon.

For much of our wildlife it is a time when the rigours of raising a family are over and the essential task of getting ready for surviving the winter either through migration, hibernation or by staying here and 'toughing out' the cold months begins. Our smallest rodent owes it's name to this season, the harvest mouse, a really charming little creature that is probably not uncommon, but it's size precludes it from being seen very much. The Latin name Micromys minutus is indeed very apt.

As the name implies, the harvest mouse has an association with cereals, particularly wheat and builds a nest of woven grasses around the stems of crops and grasses which can range from half to a full metre off the ground. In fact you are far more likely to record the presence of harvest mice through finding the nests during winter once the surrounding vegetation has fallen, though by this time the mice will have abandoned it. The nest is spherical like a cricket ball and they build breeding nests that can be up to 10cms in diameter whereas a non-breeding chamber is only half the size.

Harvest mice don't hibernate so their size makes them very vulnerable to cold, wet winters. It also means they have high energy requirements and during their short life they have to continually search for seeds, berries and insects to sustain them. They usually have two or three litters a year, mainly between May and October, and average around six young in each litter. They change from being blind, naked rodents at birth to exploring outside the nest at eleven days to being totally abandoned to their own devices five days later.

Being a harvest mouse is a tough business. Modern agriculture has made their life more difficult and the tidying up of verges and removal of hedgerows have depleted their habitat, then there is the weather to contend with. If they survive all that there is a whole range of hungry predators they have to face; stoats, foxes, kestrels, cats and crows would
