ESCC Bus Service Information

A new range of timetable leaflets is now available for *Rider* bus services which are funded by East Sussex County Council. These timetables have been updated following the changes made in some areas last July.

These timetables cover Lewes, Newhaven and Seaford, Battle, Wadhurst and Robertsbridge, Crowborough, Uckfield & Heathfield, and Rye.

The new leaflets are available onboard buses and from libraries, tourist information centres, local council offices, and some doctors surgeries. They are also available online at:

After listening to feedback from passengers, the County Council has produced the new leaflets in a larger print and added town centre bus route maps.

An updated East Sussex bus map leaflet is currently in production and will be available early autumn. A new timetable for Bexhill will also be available in the next few months, although the current one is still valid.

Rider services are operated by bus companies and community transport providers on behalf of the County Council. The County Council spent around £1. 7 million on the provision of these bus services last year.

My personal brush with Hell was during a series on Ignatian spirituality at college, where a prayerful meditation was carried out asking God to show you what Hell is like. My revelation of Hell is perhaps not for the pages of the Parish Newsletter at the moment, however it was very reminiscent of the account of the Rich Man and the beggar Lazarus (Luke 16:19-31).

You may be asking the question "what's the point of asking God to show you what Hell is like?" I suppose the simplest answer is to say that unless you know what you have been saved from, then you may never fully appreciate the significance of the crucifixion or Christ as 'Saviour'.

I have often wondered whether the slave trader John Newton had a robust vision of Hell when he wrote: Amazing Grace! How sweet the sound that saved a wretch like me; I once was lost, but now am found, was blind but now I see.

The main reason for bringing up the question of Hell is to promote the Alpha Course! Alpha is the perfect place to openly discuss any question regarding life and the Christian faith. Alpha is not all heavy discussion; it is also good fun and an opportunity to meet others who are also searching for some answers to the bigger questions in life.

THE INCREDIBLE JOURNEY

Just imagine that you are a young swallow, have just left the comfort of your nest for the first time and there is the whole wide world out there to explore. Your parents have decided that it's time for you to look after yourself so have stopped bringing you tasty packets of insects, so your first task is to learn how to catch your own food.

Watching other birds that look just like you swooping low over the ground you decide to join them and soon discover that is where your next meal is going to be. For a while the intended victims easily avoid your clumsy attempts at catching them, but it doesn't take long to get the hang of catching insects in the air and for the next few weeks there is food a plenty, your muscles are developing, feathers become sleek and you grow out a fine long pair of tail streamers. At one stage a dark silhouette appears which sends some of the other birds into a panic but your instinct is to join the other swallows and your cousins the house martins in harassing the shape until it has passed over.

Very soon the days begin to shorten, nights become colder and food is harder to find. More and more swallows appear from the north and hundreds of them gather on telegraph lines chattering excitedly to each other and you join them, instinctively knowing that something momentous is about to take place but you're not sure what it is or why, but you just know that you have to leave this place and fly off in a southerly direction.

One day, the urge becomes so strong that you all just take off together and feel the wind behind your tail that takes you to the South Downs where there is one last chance for a good feast. Ahead of you is a big stretch of water that smells different to anything that you have come across before so you fly up and down the edge, a magnetic force drawing you but the frightening roar of the waves making you anxious and uncertain. Eventually the pull is too strong and you take off, a plunge into the unknown.

The wind and the waves sap your energy but in time land appears and you manage to reach some bushes and though completely exhausted you manage to feed up on some local insects. Energy restored, you continue your journey south, spending nights in reedbeds along the French coast, having to cope with predators, bad weather, the occasional loud bang and speeding bullet.

 - Resolve to approve the agreement between the Parish Council (the Trustees) and Blackboys Cricket Club for use of the recreation ground. Following minor alterations this was proposed for agreement by Maria Naylor, seconded by lan Paisley and agreed by all.
- Environment: ESCC officers will come and explain the latest proposals for traffic calming prior to the next full PC meeting.

Reports from Representatives

Blackboys Village Hall: Eryl Thomas reported that the AGM was to be organised shortly.

Memorial Hall: Eryl Thomas stated that a letter had been received from Sandy Rogers on her suggestions for improvements to the Hall. A general walk around is needed to assess what needs to be done and a risk assessment.

Schools:

- <u>Framfield</u>: The Clerk reported that she had been advised that ESCC had applied for planning
 consent to provide pre-school care facilities on the School site, which would reduce the use of the
 Hall. The full planning application was yet to be received. [Post meeting note: a courtesy copy of
 the application has now been received and stated in the application form is that the School itself
 will still continue to use the Hall for PE and lunch etc].
- <u>Blackboys</u> Nothing to report other than they had three very successful performances of The Tempest and a damp sports day!

Any Other Business at the Discretion of the Chairman

- Summer Show Eryl Thomas asked for volunteers to help on the Council stall at the Show.
 PCSO Simon French would be there with the CC TV van.
- Fred Thurston commented on an article in the Courier whereby it seemed as though the Parish boundary might change around the new roundabout near the Cysleys Farm housing estate. With input from Chris Dowling and the Clerk the meeting heard that there were health and safety issues around the positioning of the current Uckfield/Framfield boundary sign and if this had to be moved it would NOT mean a change in boundary which could only be done by the Boundary Commission.
- Myran Eade commented on the amount of work many councillors seem to be carrying out at the present time.
- Maria Naylor stated that we seemed to have fallen on our feet with Simon French as the Parish PCSO.
- The Clerk reported that she had emailed Simon's report to all those on email and would sent hard
 copies to those not.
- Initial discussions on the LDF Consultation. Following good initial discussions the meeting
 agreed that Eryl Thomas should draft a formal response for further discussion after the next
 Planning Committee meeting on 5 August 2009.

FRAMFIELD PARISH COUNCIL - REPORT

At the July meeting Eryl Thomas asked that the Parish Council formally record the death of Rita Redman. Rita had been a Parish Councillor in Framfield for some 14 years.

Councillor Chris Dowling (ESCC) reported on the following:

- A site meeting was in the process of being arranged around the area of the B2192, Lewes Road, near to the garage where an accident had recently occurred and a petrol pump destroyed.
- ESCC are conducting a review of their procedures for deer hot spots with particular relevance in this area to the B2102 at Possingworth.
- The issues with the two low level EDF cables in School Lane continue and the meeting agreed that a concentrated attempt should be made to rectify the cable that was brought down outside The Stables. EDF could commence the appropriate legal procedure to gain access to the land further down the road.
- Community Transport Chris thought that now was the right time for the Council to get involved. The Clerk was asked to pass the recent communication from ESCC to David Andrews so that he could initiate a meeting.

Councillor Ann Newton (WDC) reiterated the need for individuals and the Parish Council to respond to the LDF Spatial Development Options Consultation.

Finance

- The total expenditure for the month was £2.613.82.
- Ratification of the purchase of a new computer system for the Clerk's Office. Eryl Thomas reported that as both printers had broken down, the idea had been to replace them both with one laser machine that is also capable of scanning and printing in colour. Three quotes had been received and a printer purchased for approximately £175.00. East Hoathly with Halland PC had agreed to cover the cost of this purchase. At the same time investigation into the current computer system was made with a view to adding memory etc and in conclusion thought best practice to purchase an entire new system. Again three quotes were obtained and the best deal chosen. This was proposed for payment by Myran Eade, seconded by lan Paisley and agreed by all present.
- Donation to the Framfield & Blackboys Monday Club. Eryl Thomas reported that a letter detailing the accounts for the year had been received from Sandy Rogers and a request for a donation. He proposed a figure of £100.00. This was seconded by lan Paisley and agreed by all.
- Framfield and Blackboys Horticultural Society. Eryl Thomas commented that a £50.00 donation is usually made to the Society but due to the review of hire rates at the Memorial Hall this would double their usual hire fee so a figure of £70.00 would cover their extra expenses towards the Hall hire fees. This was proposed for agreement by Rob Newton, seconded by lan Paisley and agreed by the PC. Prior to issuing of the cheque Eryl stated that he would look further into the matter.

<u>Committees</u> (minutes of Committee meetings are recorded individually as and when they occur). <u>Planning</u>: nothing to report.

Recreation Grounds: (Parish Councillors as Trustees): Myran Eade reported on the following highlights of the last meeting:

- There had been several allotment tenants from Blackboys allotments voicing their concerns over the suggestion from some keep bees. A letter has been sent to all confirming that the two applicants would have to produce a plan of what they intend to do and what training and experience they have had.
- The ROSPA report has arrived. Myran and Mark Moore have a copy and they will see what can be done in-house. Mark agreed to look at the swings on Framfield recreation ground.
- It has been reported that a tree at the rear of Framfield recreation ground looks diseased. Ian
 Paisley offered to go and look at it. Myran stated that he would obtain quotes if any work was
 required.
- Fred Thurston reported that he had developed a possible plan in order to make some progress
 with work on Framfield Allotments. The Clerk was in the process of obtaining a large scale map of
 the site.

At one point you have to pass over high mountains, more water and a desert that never seems to end, forests full of other animals that see you as a potential meal but also gives you a seemingly endless supply of insects. Eight weeks since starting out you arrive at the bottom of Africa, the end of a 6000 mile journey overcoming all sorts of hazards and you know this is where you are meant to be for the next three months. You will enjoy the plentiful food and warm weather but come February that same inexplicable urge will drive you north again back to where you were born, this time to raise your own family and will bring smiles to the faces of another set of human beings, so pleased to see your return and the herald of another summer.

FROM SIMON FRENCH

Police Community Support Officer

Last week we had 3 males cold calling on residents in the Blackboys area offering to lay tarmac driveways. We received 2 phone calls from residents in Blackboys complaining about a company named MD ROADS. One resident had work undertaken by this firm and had real problems after the agreed verbal price was changed and moved up. They owned a Bentley and they purchased another car for the evacuees to travel around in. The name of the chauffeur was Charles, and they had a maid called Gladys. The ladies have "driven around Blackboys" several times trying to find the house, but to no avail. I hope that this information may jog someone's memory, if you can help I would be pleased to hear from you.

Well over 1000 visitors enjoyed the range of activities and exhibits on offer at the Framfield and Blackboys Horticultural Society Summer Show on Saturday 8th August on a perfect English summer's day.
