Setting out to achieve something you have always wanted to do shouldn't be consigned to the back burner. If you have the urge to do something, do it while you can.

You may be wondering what this has to do with the title 'Who needs the Church' - be patient Betty I am getting to the point! The point is we all do! The increasingly secular world in which we are almost being forced to live in doesn't suit us as individuals or as a community.

Despite the government's latest action to solve the huge national debt, GB Inc is still on the verge of meltdown. On an international scale we appear to have a slightly better standing than Greece that is in a dire place, but in comparison we are even worse off! Perhaps it goes with the saying 'You can fool some of the people some of the time, but not all of the people all of the time'. The question of 'who's to blame' will always be asked simply because people's nature is to blame others.

As you may have heard 'Be careful when you point the finger as there are three other fingers pointing back at you'! Have people today lost all moral integrity or the backbone to take personal responsibility or to speak out at things that are just so blatantly wrong?

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By working together in Sussex we can crackdown on

Anti-Social Driving

How does it work?

Operation Crackdown provides the opportunity for members of the communities within Sussex to report incidents ot dangerous, careless or anti social driving or riding on the road. This information allows Sussex Police and its Partners to locus on those who present the greatest risk.

What happens with the information I supply?

The information supplied will be checked against a number of databases depending on the severity of the incident that has been reported. We will look to see if the vehicle has been reported within the last 12months and if the driver fits into one of our Special Priority Groups (Young Drivers. Motorcyclists. Drink Drivers or Occupational Road Users).

What are the potential outcomes?

There are a whole range of outcomes which can be utilised in response to the information supplied depending on the result of the research.

The most frequently used intervention is a letter sent to the registered keeper of the vehicle from the Superintendent of the Road Policing Unit, however other options include a visit to the driver by a member of the Road policing Unit, or for the most serious offences a targeted intervention which can lead to arrest and conviction at court.

What have we achieved so far?

Since August 2007 Crackdown has received over 20000 reports, this has generated over 1800 letters of advice, over 500 intelligence reports which have been disseminated to the Road Policing Unit. 132 uninsured vehicles have been seized. 221 warnings/seizures have been made using S59 of the Police Reform act and 43 drivers have been arrested. Over the last three months we have achieved an intervention rate of 1 in 4.

Framfield & Blackboys WI

Here as promised is news of the AGM of the National Federation of Women's Institutes, which took place in Cardiff in June.

The resolution proposed by Bengeo Evening WI, Hertfordshire, was passed with 99.13% of the votes. The full wording of the resolution was: "This meeting urges HM Government to introduce clear and mandatory country of origin labelling on all meat, poultry and fish products sold in this country". Those of us who strive to buy British should welcome this initiative, which will become an official mandate for WI members. So often at present, food is sourced elsewhere and packaged as British, especially processed meat products.

Gill Rogers of Waldron WI was our delegate at this important meeting, which she very much enjoyed. Especially the guest speakers – The Rt, Hon John Bercow MP (Speaker of the House of Commons) appearing via video-link from Westminster, Tim Smit (Chief Executive and co-founder of the Eden Project) and Lee Durrell (Hon Director, Durrell Wildlife Conservation Trust). The meeting came to a climax with a performance by 'Only Men Aloud'.

Gill reported in person at our June meeting when Richard Hill spoke and showed us an inspirational film about the history and work of the Royal National Lifeboat Institution. Supported mainly be legacies and voluntary contributions, the RNLI does not receive any government funding, and only 3% of this is used on administration. This was the subject of a WI resolution several years ago but was defeated when members realised that government money was subject to cuts as for all other services.

Our July meeting is an outing to Bodiam Castle with boat trips and a cream tea included. In August we have a garden meeting, followed by our meeting on September 14th (Tuesday), 'Slow boat in China' with Mr Albon. Do come and join us on September 14th, 7.30 pm, in Blackboys Village Hall.

trigger asthmatic attacks. They are easy to identify as they make tents in which the caterpillars develop, and therefore can be easily avoided.

In response to some local concerns relating to incidents of contact with these caterpillars, they are now under threat from the removal of their habitat, thereby destroying a place on which many other wildlife species depend for their survival.

Our initial reaction to destroy wildlife that comes in conflict with us is symptomatic of our disconnection with the environment. Wildlife scares us; wildlife gone bad must be got rid of. But we actually live in a very benign wildlife environment, the most dangerous species we come across are wasps; the anaphylactic response to wasp stings in a tiny minority of cases can cause real medical concerns.

Far better to find out and understand our wildlife, learn and know what is dangerous and leave it alone, and just be a bit more ready willing and able to live alongside our wildlife and you never know, we might get to learn our to like our new urban neighbours.

The Wild Side of Town

If you have been following some of the news items recently you might get the impression that our wildlife has suddenly become dangerous; everywhere you go some animal, reptile or even insect has been inflicting harm on the human species, perhaps finally taking out some revenge for the havoc we create in their environment.

Now I fully accept that it is shocking to find that your young children have been attacked by a fox in their own home, or that being dive-bombed by angry herring gulls is, to say the least, disconcerting. Being bitten by an adder is something I would rather not experience while the rashes caused by the hair of a moth caterpillar can be painfully irritating. These incidents have all generated media interest recently and, not unusually, the over- reaction to them has been completely out of scale with the events themselves.

Taking the fox and herring gull stories first, both these species are born survivors. As we have increasingly encroached and built on their habitats they have had to adapt to our built environment which they have done very successfully. They also take advantage of our slovenly ways thriving on the rubbish we leave around our towns and cities. Living alongside these animals can inevitably lead to occasional conflict which reached a climax recently when a fox was reported attacking two young children in their house in London a few weeks ago. To my knowledge this is the first time that this has happened and I am sure it will be an isolated incident and is not the precedent for renegade foxes to start habitually attacking people at random and also should not precipitate a mass cull, as I have heard proposed.

I know that herring gulls can be a nuisance around our coastal towns, mainly because of their noisy early morning vocal exercises which are more effective than any alarm clock. Like foxes, herring gulls have adapted well to city life, our buildings are very acceptable cliffs to them providing numerous nesting opportunities on which to raise a family. Like all parents they are very protective of their young, who when they leave the nest, tend to go wandering near to humans, triggering attacks on us by aggressive adults which is very uncomfortable. There is growing campaign to try and 'get rid' of our urban gulls ranging from trying to discourage nesting to direct culling - a completely pointless exercise.

One story that has made the papers locally is concerns about the caterpillars of the brown-tailed moth, a creature that is clad in over a million hairs that it releases as a defence mechanism and can cause nasty skin rashes as well as

<u>FRAMFIELD PARISH COUNCIL – REPORT</u>

The AGM was held in May. Rob Newton was re-elected as Chairman, with Maria Naylor as Vice Chairman. Rob made it very clear that should anyone else wish to take on the role, he would be very happy to vacate the Chair – something he will do come what may next year, particularly as many of the newer councillors will know the ropes by then!

Traffic calming proposals, Blackboys. ESCC are still going ahead with proposals for traffic calming along Blackboys High Street. A meeting had been held between with Chris Dowling, and the ESCC Officer involved to try and progress the proposals. It had been agreed that the proposed extra lighting to the build-out at the eastern end of the High Street was not required due to the number of current lights. At the western end, attempts were being made to minimise the lighting but that no form of exemption would be granted to remove it completely. Modern, low lighting technology was being investigated. The location of the restrictions remains unchanged as do the road junction improvements for the B2102/B2192. The drawings are now in the process of being finalised for formal public consultation.

Pavilion Update.

- <u>Framfield:</u> A meeting has been held with an architect to discuss ideas for the refurbishment of the changing rooms within the Memorial Hall to include enhanced facilities for the Hall. The meeting had agreed that a purely internal refurbishment would be the better option less costly and planning permission would not be required. This would include new showers, an extra ladies WC, larger kitchen, plus smaller 'committee' room for meetings. The architect was also keen to renew and improve the ceiling.
- <u>Blackboys:</u> The Council made the decision in June to cease the proposals for a new pavilion. However, the Parish Council supoprts the proposal to refurbish the current Cricket Pavilion. The Council would need to invesitigate further ways to achieve this and would welcome early discussion with the Cricket Club on the way forward.

Fred Thurston commented that he is very keen to switch a potential funding opportunity from a new build to a refurbishment and he is subject to a specific timescale.

Selina Allen wanted recognised the huge amount of time and effort that members of the Council had put into the project especially Fred Thurston.

<u>Website:</u> Following on from the 'advert' in the last magazine inviting interest in tendering to design a website for the Council, some six enquiries have been received and no further interested parties will be accepted after the end of July. During the summer months it is hoped to streamline the tenders and agree a provider.

Water mains renewals in the Framfield Area

I am writing to inform you about an important £400,000 scheme to upgrade our water main network in the Framfield area and protect customers' drinking water supplies.

As part of the Company's on-going mains renewal programme, we are planning to replace the old 3 and 4 inch diameter cast iron water mains with a tougher 90mm and 125mm diameter plastic water mains totalling 2.6km in length.

The existing section of cast iron water mains forms a strategic part of our water supply network in the Framfield area. However, while the cast iron water mains have done sterling work to serve the area, they are now around 70-years-old and coming to the end of their working life. As you may be aware, the mains have suffered an increasing number of bursts. Each time they do burst, it causes considerable damage and disruption to the footpath/highway and interruptions to the drinking water supplies. There is then further disruption to the wider community as a result of us having to carry out emergency repairs and reinstatement.

After discussions with East Sussex Highways, we are intending to start construction from week commencing 19 July 2010, in both Preston Grove and The Bungalows. We will then move on to The Street, Framfield, the week commencing 2 August 2010. This has been arranged to coincide with the school holidays to minimise traffic disruption. Once this section is completed the scheme will continue along the B2102 The Street and Framfield Road, then up Pound Lane and Gatehouse Lane to finish at Upton Farm. The whole scheme is scheduled to be completed by the end of 2010.

The programme will be as follows:

Phase 1a - Preston Grove Phase 1d - The Bungalows

Phase 1c - The Street/B2102

Phase 1b - The Street

Phase 2a - B2102

19th July through to 30th July 19th July through to 30th July 2nd August through to 20th August 23rd August through to 17th September 20th September through to 25th September and 4th November through to 17th November

Phase 3 - Gatehouse Lane 27th September through to 15th October 18th October through to 3rd November Phase 3 - Pound Lane 18th November through to 8th December Phase 2b - B2102/ Pound Lane

Construction will be from Monday to Friday between 07.30am and 17.30pm. As our existing water mains are within the highway, we do need to ensure the safety of both our workforce and motorists. Therefore, temporary two-way traffic lights will be required for some parts of the scheme and a full road closure will be needed for the work in Pound Lane and Gatehouse Lane. To reduce disruption at any one time, only a 150-metre-long section of road will be affected by the construction work and the necessary temporary traffic lights.

We will ensure access for customers' properties up until the point where we are laying the main across their access. When that occurs, our contractors will liaise with individuals affected directly and ensure that, if necessary, temporary steel plates are used across any excavation to maintain that access.

We are also keen to ensure that where local residents or community organisations have any specific access requirements, we understand what those are before we start construction to see if we can practicably accommodate them. If you would like to discuss such issues can I please ask you to contact me as soon as possible.

Please be assured South East Water is committed to working with local stakeholders and residents to minimise the inevitable disruption that will occur. Clearly we would like to apologise in advance for any inconvenience this work will cause but hope you understand how important it is that we act now, and that the short term pain is worth the long term benefits this scheme will deliver.
