

Don't Tolerate It... Report It!

By working together in Sussex we can crackdown on

Anti-Social Driving

How does it work?

Operation Crackdown provides the opportunity for members of the communities within Sussex to report incidents of dangerous, careless or anti social driving or riding on the road. This information allows Sussex Police and its Partners to locus on those

The information supplied will be checked against a number of databases depending on the severity of the incident that has been reported. We will look to see if the vehicle has been reported within the last 12months and if the driver fits into one of our Special Priority Groups (Young Drivers. Motorcyclists. Drink Drivers or Occupational Road Users).

What are the potential outcomes?

There are a whole range of outcomes which can be utilised in response to the information supplied depending on the result of the research.

The most frequently used intervention is a letter sent to the registered keeper of the vehicle from the Superintendent of the Road Policing Unit, however other options include a visit to the driver by a member of the Road policing Unit, or for the most serious offences a targeted intervention which can lead to arrest and conviction at court.

What have we achieved so far?

Since August 2007 Crackdown has received over 20000 reports, this has generated over 1800 letters of advice, over 500 intelligence reports which have been disseminated to the Road Policing Unit. 132 uninsured vehicles have been seized. 221 warnings/seizures have been made using S59 of the Police Reform act and 43 drivers have been arrested. Over the last three months we have achieved an intervention rate of 1 in 4.

FRAMFIELD PARISH COUNCIL - REPORT

The only meeting to report on was held at the end of July.

Starting with the good news – John Mordaunt was co-opted onto the Council, so we are a full contingent again. John lives in Blackboys, is a super 'hands-on' man who is also closely involved with the Church.

More good news! Six interested parties declared their wish to take part in the tendering exercise for the proposed new website. Four quotes have now been received and a decision will be made in September. This should enable Parish news to be made more widespread via the magazine *and* website. We could even put the magazine on the website!

- Traffic calming proposals, Blackboys. Bad news. ESCC have confirmed the impact that due to the government's announcement of £6.2 billion in-year cuts, every local authority will have to make cutbacks accordingly. At ESCC a significant proportion of the cuts are in Transport & Environment (T&E). This means that they will not be implementing any further speed limits this financial year and until a better idea of the levels of funding that might be available in future years it would be impracticable to forecast when the 30 mph speed limit in Blackboys might go ahead. The Parish Council are very disappointed in this news. Councillor Chris Dowling (ESCC) would be investigating if there is a way forward.
- <u>'Traffic calming' proposals for Framfield</u>. The only works which would be done is a refresh of the lines throughout Framfield village and a new '30' roundel in the carriageway would be implemented on entering the 30 mph speed limit coming from Blackboys.

If anyone requires a full copy of the minutes for any of the Council meetings please let me know.

and will often use piles of grass cuttings or a compost heap in which to breed. The more 'newt-like' lizard you are likely to come across is the common lizard - but only if you have a largish garden on chalk or sandy soils. They are good for the garden as they feed on insects, particularly ants.

If you want to do the right thing by these animals in your garden, provide them with suitable habitats and create the right conditions for them; a pond for newts to breed in, along with dark, dank places in which they can hibernate. Lizards also hibernate and will benefit from a little bit of habitat creation, and above all no chemicals.

Having done that, you can sit back and bask in the glory that you are a real wildlife Samaritan.

Do the Right Thing!

It is always distressing when you really try to do the right thing for wildlife and then it turns out all wrong. Probably the worst case I've heard of was during a spell of very cold weather. Someone was very disturbed to see that birds couldn't drink from the water bowl in their garden as it was frozen so, in a heroic act of great kindness, they put antifreeze in! Not to be recommended.

Recently I was told another tale which had nothing like the drastic effect of the antifreeze and I can assure you that no animals were harmed in the recounting of this story! It concerned newts. Now most people know what a newt is and if there is just one fact they know about them it is probably that they live in water. So recently when a garden was being tidied, the owner came across some newts underneath a pile of rubble and brick, and being quite perturbed by this she returned them to the pond.

Now this wouldn't have harmed the newts at all, it probably just would have made them a bit grumpy. Newts only actually use the water for breeding so they only need it for about four or five months in the year. Once the breeding cycle is complete, the newts will haul themselves out the water and look for some cool, damp shady place to hibernate for the winter. They are quite capable of walking long distances as they have been found up to a mile away from the nearest water.

What would have made the newts grumpier was finding that their ideal habitat for hibernating had been removed so they had to go and look for somewhere else to spend the winter. So, if you really want to help newts, which are lovely creatures to have living in your garden, leave a little bit of rubble and brick or log piles where they can contentedly sleep the winter away.

A newt out of water can understandably sometimes be mistaken for a lizard. A full grown newt and a young lizard can look similar but should you misidentify a lizard as a newt and try and put it back in the water it would indeed be more than a little grumpy, in fact it could be life threatening. Despite looking similar, newts are amphibians, and water is essential to their life cycle. Lizards are reptiles that only need water for drinking.

You are likely to come across two types of lizard in your garden and one of those tries to pass itself off as a snake! A slow worm is, in fact, a legless lizard

Water mains renewals in the Framfield Area

I am writing to inform you about an important £400,000 scheme to upgrade our water main network in the Framfield area and protect customers' drinking water supplies.

As part of the Company's on-going mains renewal programme, we are planning to replace the old 3 and 4 inch diameter cast iron water mains with a tougher 90mm and 125mm diameter plastic water mains totalling 2.6km in length.

The existing section of cast iron water mains forms a strategic part of our water supply network in the Framfield area. However, while the cast iron water mains have done sterling work to serve the area, they are now around 70-years-old and coming to the end of their working life. As you may be aware, the mains have suffered an increasing number of bursts. Each time they do burst, it causes considerable damage and disruption to the footpath/highway and interruptions to the drinking water supplies. There is then further disruption to the wider community as a result of us having to carry out emergency repairs and reinstatement.

After discussions with East Sussex Highways, we are intending to start construction from week commencing 19 July 2010, in both Preston Grove and The Bungalows. We will then move on to The Street, Framfield, the week commencing 2 August 2010. This has been arranged to coincide with the school holidays to minimise traffic disruption. Once this section is completed the scheme will continue along the B2102 The Street and Framfield Road, then up Pound Lane and Gatehouse Lane to finish at Upton Farm. The whole scheme is scheduled to be completed by the end of 2010.

The programme will be as follows:

Phase 1a - Preston Grove Phase 1d - The Bungalows Phase 1c - The Street/B2102 Phase 1b - The Street Phase 2a - B2102 19th July through to 30th July 19th July through to 30th July 2nd August through to 20th August 23rd August through to 17th September 20th September through to 25th September and 4th November through to 17th November

Phase 3 - Gatehouse Lane	27 th September through to 15 th October
Phase 3 - Pound Lane	18 th October through to 3 rd November
Phase 2b - B2102/	18 th November through to 8 th December
Pound Lane	

Construction will be from Monday to Friday between 07.30am and 17.30pm. As our existing water mains are within the highway, we do need to ensure the safety of both our workforce and motorists. Therefore, temporary two-way traffic lights will be required for some parts of the scheme and a full road closure will be needed for the work in Pound Lane and Gatehouse Lane. To reduce disruption at any one time, only a 150-metre-long section of road will be affected by the construction work and the necessary temporary traffic lights.

We will ensure access for customers' properties up until the point where we are laying the main across their access. When that occurs, our contractors will liaise with individuals affected directly and ensure that, if necessary, temporary steel plates are used across any excavation to maintain that access.

We are also keen to ensure that where local residents or community organisations have any specific access requirements, we understand what those are before we start construction to see if we can practicably accommodate them. If you would like to discuss such issues can I please ask you to contact me as soon as possible.

Please be assured South East Water is committed to working with local stakeholders and residents to minimise the inevitable disruption that will occur. Clearly we would like to apologise in advance for any inconvenience this work will cause but hope you understand how important it is that we act now, and that the short term pain is worth the long term benefits this scheme will deliver.
