Christmas should be a happy time of year. Time off from work, time to rest, spend time with friends and family, the giving and receiving of gifts etc. However, I often find that time-out from out normal routines also allows precious time for reflection. As 2010 draws to close, what was the year like for you? Upbeat and positive, perhaps a new job, a few dreams come true or maybe life has been tinged with sadness, a broken relationship or the loss of a loved one?

Personally speaking I often find it difficult to keep a positive frame of mind when there is a lot of negativity and uncertainty around.

Over the past few weeks I have been pondering the question 'Is it possible to be a genuinely happy person with a positive outlook on life simply my making a rational choice?' I stand to be corrected, but I think the answer is 'no'.

If we are to believe statistics then apparently 80% of our thought patterns are negative. This may well be true. If we only watched the 10 o'clock news, by the time we got through the day to day killing in Afghanistan, natural disasters, road accidents and the myriad of other downers then the remaining ten seconds attributed to Mrs Jones having her cat rescued from a tree was the one and only positive highlight that brought a smile to our faces. In this day and age it is difficult to remain positive when we are bombarded with so much negativity that often leaves us feeling upset and empty.

Whatever age we are, living in a world daily punctuated with bad news gets you down. Trying to cope as an adult can be difficult but what about children with a difficult home life or those who hate going to school? Unfortunately, negative experiences in childhood don't just go-away, they are carried into adulthood. The singer/songwriter Dan Hill who wrote 'Sometimes when we touch' included the verse

Romance and all its strategy
Leaves me battling with my pride
But through the insecurity
Some tenderness survives
I'm just another writer
Still trapped within my truth
A hesitant prize fighter
Still trapped within my youth

I believe Dan Hill is an adult who found adult relationships difficult due to the negative experiences he had within his childhood. He is certainly not alone. But is there a way out, and what has this to do with Christmas?

Christmas is not so much about the razzmatazz associated with the season or doing the headless chicken bit looking for presents. Christmas is about the birth of Jesus, the Saviour of the world and that includes you and me. Perhaps this year don't think so much about what you can get, but what you can get rid of, i.e. the unhelpful baggage that we pick up on our journey through life, the things that weigh us down and inhibit our enjoyment of life.

From Jesus' birth thirty years was to elapse before He got up to say what his mission was all about:

"The Spirit of the Lord is on me, because He has anointed me to preach good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim freedom for the prisoners and recovery of sight for the blind, to release the oppressed, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour." (Luke 4:18-19)

Jesus put a smile on multitudes of faces during His earthly ministry, sorted out their baggage, healed them physically, mentally and spiritually and gave them a real hope for the future. The good news is that He is still doing it today through His church. So is it time to let Jesus do the seemingly impossible for you?

When we think about the three wise men embarking on their journey to find Jesus then think also about the effort they went to. To find true treasure often takes some effort but if something is worth having then we owe it to ourselves to make that effort.

In Luke's gospel Jesus says⁹ "So I say to you: Ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you. ¹⁰ For everyone who asks receives; the one who seeks finds; and to the one who knocks, the door will be opened.

Jesus offers the hand of friendship and love to every man, woman and child. A relationship that will last into eternity. How about checking Him out in 2011? See you in church (it's not that scary!)

Wealden Citizens Advice receives funding to support older people

Thanks to a grant from the Nationwide Foundation of £4,450, Wealden Citizens Advice has appointed a part time grants application support worker to help older people in the Wealden area. Hilary Mcintosh, who will be supported by volunteers in the bureau with general advice and information, will be helping older residents in the Wealden area who have utility debts, to apply for grants to help with their arrears and to help set up affordable, ongoing payments towards their utility costs. Furthermore, she will carry out benefits checks to identify whether there are any additional benefits to which they may be entitled.

Said Caroline Mack, Chief Executive of Wealden Citizens Advice, "There is a higher proportion of older people (21.8% of population) compared to the average for England and Wales (16.1%) living in the Wealden District Council area so we are thrilled that Nationwide are supporting a specialist worker to help this group. We know that older people, in particular, under claim benefits to which they are entitled as they have feelings of pride, a fear that seeking help might mean a loss of independence, or are worried about stigma being attached to particular benefits.

"However, I would like to encourage anyone who thinks they may be entitled to benefits or are worried about utility debts to contact one of our bureaux as soon as possible. Our support worker can apply for special utility tariffs (if applicable) and provide specialist support to complete grant forms in a way that ensures the best possible outcome for the clients. If a client is unable to get to a bureau due to mobility problems, then our support worker may be able to arrange a home visit."

Lisa Suchet, the Nationwide Foundation's chief executive said "Every donation made by Nationwide Foundation aims to help people in need, with a focus on funding charities helping older people. We are confident that our grant will make a significant impact to Wealden Citizens Advice.





Don't Tolerate It... Report It!

By working together in Sussex we can crackdown on
Anti-Social Driving
How does it work?

Operation Crackdown provides the opportunity for members of the communities within Sussex to report incidents of dangerous, careless or anti social driving or riding on the road. This information allows Sussex Police and its Partners to locus on those who present the greatest risk.

What happens with the information I supply?

The information supplied will be checked against a number of databases depending on the severity of the incident that has been reported. We will look to see if the vehicle has been reported within the last 12months and if the driver fits into one of our Special Priority Groups (Young Drivers. Motorcyclists. Drink Drivers or Occupational Road Users).

What are the potential outcomes?

There are a whole range of outcomes which can be utilised in response to the information supplied depending on the result of the research.

The most frequently used intervention is a letter sent to the registered keeper of the vehicle from the Superintendent of the Road Policing Unit, however other options include a visit to the driver by a member of the Road policing Unit, or for the most serious offences a targeted intervention which can lead to arrest and conviction at court.

What have we achieved so far?

Since August 2007 Crackdown has received over 20000 reports, this has generated over 1800 letters of advice, over 500 intelligence reports which have been disseminated to the Road Policing Unit. 132 uninsured vehicles have been seized. 221 warnings/seizures have been made using S59 of the Police Reform act and 43 drivers have been arrested. Over the last three months we have achieved an intervention rate of 1 in 4.

FRAMFIELD PARISH COUNCIL - REPORT

There are two meetings to report on – September and October. David Andrews sadly resigned from the Council in September due to his move.

Firstly I can confirm that design of our website is now underway. I hope that it will go 'live', even if not perfect, in the New Year. We hope to not only provide information (minutes etc) from the Council but to have links to local businesses, organisations etc. More information will be available shortly.

I will be starting the round of letters asking people to advertise/re-advertise in the Parish Magazine early next year – so if anyone would be interested in perhaps having a new advert please let me know. The magazine is non-profit-making. The income from the adverts covers the cost of the printing. The magazine is delivered to every household, free of charge, in the Parish, and even beyond!

Street lighting has been high up on the agenda for some time. We have a huge number of lights in a rural Parish (76!) and not only would it be economic to reduce them, it would also help the environment. However, after many months of tireless endeavours by Fred Thurston, the cost of physically removing lights is financially prohibitive – instead the Council have agreed that all of the lanterns should be switched over to non-mercury, low wattage, fluorescent lamps. This will be less costly and reduce our carbon-footprint. The programme for changeover will start during this financial year and be completed next year. This also brings our lights into compliance with regulations as mercury fittings will not be permitted by 2012. If anyone wishes to see the effect of the swapped out lights – there are currently two being trialled in Mount Pleasant, Blackboys and two in Beckets Way. We haven't had any adverse comments so far.

Pavilion Project. Activity is mounting on both fronts – grants are being looked at for the refurbishment of the changing rooms at the Memorial Hall in Framfield and the Council has formally adopted the Pavilion on Blackboys recreation ground with the intention of working together with the Cricket Club towards its refurbishment.

Flood information from The Environment Agency

Floods can happen anywhere at anytime, caused by rising ground water levels, burst water drains, hillside run-off from sudden rain as well as flooding from rivers and the sea.

It is important that you learn how to prepare for and be safe in a flood. It could save your life.

You can sign up for our FREE *Floodline Warnings Direct service*. This provides a flood warning direct to your telephone, mobile, email, SMS text message and fax.

Be warned

New and improved flood warning codes will come into force from November 2010. The new codes will be simpler to understand, provide an earlier alert for the possibility of flooding, provide more local information and are clearer on the actions people need to take.

The Untamed Shrew by Mike Russell People and Wildlife Manager Sussex Wildlife Trust

It is always a great thrill to see wild mammals in the UK; they are largely hard to see, often nocturnal, and not surprisingly do their best to avoid any contact with the human race. I know we would rather not see some animals too closely. Rats or mice in your house and garden are generally unwelcome sights and there are probably too many rabbits. Sadly hares are few and far between in Sussex these days.

When we do see them it is usually the briefest of glimpses as a deer disappears into a wood, or a fox or a badger's red eyes show up in car headlights or sadly, dead by the side of the road. A bat might swoop into view for a second then melt into the twilight gloom, while hedgehogs are becoming a rarity.

What prompted these thought processes is that around Woods Mill at the moment a number of people have been watching one of Britain's smallest mammals, the water shrew. I haven't seen one here for many years, but recently the 'leat', which is a channel of water that supplies the mill wheel, has been cleared of vegetation and so we have a clear view into the water. Hence, we have been able to observe this busy little animal going about its daily life.

Water shrews, although very small, are in fact the largest of the British shrews. They are jet black on top but lighter underneath and with a good view you can see little white tufts at the ends of the ears. As they are semi-aquatic the fur is very short, dense and velvety in texture, which provides the insulation they need to swim underwater. If you see them in the water a silvery bubble envelops their body creating a very interesting effect.

Like all our British shrews they are carnivores and their main source of food is freshwater shrimps, caddis fly larvae and water slaters, though they are not adverse to the odd frog or small fish. They will also eat terrestrial fare as well such as worms, snails and beetles.


Carnivores tend not to taste very nice, although they are prey for some predators such as tawny or barn owls. Thankfully, apparently cats find them particularly distasteful.

They are equally at home on land and water but need dry, safe conditions to breed, so they look for places under logs or in burrows where they make a little nest of dry grasses. Water shrews breed two or three times in the

summer, sometimes producing up to fifteen in a single litter. After breeding the adults usually die leaving the youngsters to find their own territories for the winter, as they tend to be solitary until the breeding season comes around again.

Shrews are renowned for very short but extremely active lives, so it has been a great pleasure and a privilege to be able to just stand and observe these delightful little creatures undisturbed. Although I haven't seen them for many years it doesn't necessarily mean that they have not been at Woods Mill. In the past I came across a few corpses around the reserve, but I think the more likely explanation for their return is the clearing of the leat allowing the animals to forage amongst the roots and vegetation along the edge and just under the water. Whatever the reason, it is very good to see them back.
