#### Stop Press - God comes to Earth as a baby!!!!

When you think about it, God's plan to save the world is quite bizarre. Why would Father God send His son Jesus to earth in such a covert way? A baby born into virtual poverty in the small town of Bethlehem to parents yet to be married!

Surely if God wanted everyone to know that He was God then perhaps we could have expected a more dramatic entrance. After all God did some amazing displays of his power in numerous accounts found in the Old Testament.

If this were not enough how about getting your head around the fact that Jesus was divine and human at the same time?

Answering these two questions alone gives us a crucial insight into the wisdom of God and the crux of the Christmas story.

One of the stumbling blocks many people have with God or even being intrigued enough to find out more about God is that the natural human mind cannot initially understand the mind or the ways of God. Speaking through the prophet Isaiah God said "For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways," declares the LORD. <sup>9</sup> "As the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts. (Isaiah 55:8-9).

The question of Jesus' divinity and humanity has been problematic down the ages. However, to Jesus' mother Mary it was a case of simple acceptance and belief in what the angel Gabriel told her. Mary was Jesus' natural human mother but Jesus' father was God the Holy Spirit. Joseph adopted Jesus as his earthly son.

The announcement of this perplexing fact is recorded in Luke's Gospel chapter 1 <sup>30</sup> But the angel said to her, Do not be afraid, Mary, you have found favour with God. <sup>31</sup> You will be with child and give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus (which means Saviour – my note). Naturally Mary asks <sup>34</sup> How will this be, since I am a virgin?

I believe the reason that Jesus was born as a baby and to all intents and purposes grew up as a normal child, teenager and adult was so that he could connect with all areas of

our lives. The pains and joys of earthly life were fully experienced by Jesus so that He is able to empathise with the whole range of human emotions that we experience.

When we pray (speak and listen to God) we are not communing with a god who doesn't understand us, quite the contrary, God is concerned about our lives and wants the very best for us as you would expect of a true and loving Father. It would be untrue to think that God is distant and not interested. In reality He is the One who 'stooped down' in humility and entered our broken world to save it.

Another interesting point is in the giving of His name. Have you noticed that Mary and Joseph never get to choose his name? The angel Gabriel announces to Mary what his name will be and God appears to Joseph in a dream and tells him - "She will give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins." (Matthew 1:21).

Every name especially from a Hebrew perspective has meaning. A person was and is defined by their name. Jesus' name is very specific because it tells us that He is the Saviour. People get very hung up on the name Jesus and his mandate to save. The reason the world is in such a mess is due to the problem of sin. Personal sin that we inherit or literally 'born into' needs to be recognised and reconciled back to God. Man cannot save himself and reestablish the original relationship with God that would enable each one of us to love unconditionally in the way that God loves us. Sin separates and no amount of good works can make up the difference. Trying to earn our way back into God's favour is the epitome of pride.

However, it is often when we run out of ourselves, when we come up against a problem that we cannot solve or we feel so broken inside that we give up that we start to look beyond ourselves. This is the place where God resides and it is at this point that the cry of the heart reaches the ears of God and He says "I am here for you". This is the point of transformation and it comes through the simple acceptance of Jesus the Saviour; He alone turns our darkness to light, our stress into peace and our selfishness into true love, not just for now but for all eternity. As John writes in perhaps the most powerful, and succinct words in the Bible - "For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life. (John 3:16).

God with outstretched arms offers His Son as a gift to each one of us, but as with every gift it has to be willingly received - the question is - have you accepted Jesus for yourself? He is simply the most amazing gift you could ever receive! I hope everyone in the parish has a joyful Christmas and a peaceful New Year - Rev Chris Lawrence

#### MY LIFE WITH FUR AND FEATHER

#### DOGS SNOW AND SLEDGES.

As I write this I can hear the Long Tailed Tits twittering together as they enjoy breakfast on the feeding station by the kitchen window. These delightful little birds herald the start of winter and brighten up the cold dark days. Their arrival reminded me of winter weather over many years.

I have always enjoyed the snow and so have the dogs. A succession of Newfoundland's have been trained to pull our old home made sledge. My first Newfoundland Cassie was the first one to do this. I had a harness made for her and I was thrilled when it snowed so I could teach her to pull the sledge. This was done very carefully to build up her confidence, helped by succulent pieces of chicken to encourage her to haul the strange object behind her. She soon became an expert sledge dog obeying commands, negotiating gateways and would happily take the sledge round our fields and little wood. One winter there was a very heavy fall of snow and all the lanes leading out of our valley were completely blocked with massive snow drifts. The children and I thought that was fantastic as we could not get out and no cars could get in. This meant that it was safe to try sledging in the lanes. David was small enough to ride on the sledge which was great fun. At that time I also had a miniature long haired Dachshund whose legs were only a few inches long. It was amazing to watch her cleverly running along the tops of hedges and five barred gates. Eliza did not sink through the snow as she was so light and had – like all Dachshunds - very big paws, designed for digging which helped

When sadly I lost a much loved dog I would start all over again with another puppy and wait impatiently for the snow to arrive so sledge training could commence once more. The three boys were always delighted to see the snow especially if they could not get to school. The Newfoundland would pull the sledge up the hill over the neighbouring fields then the children would wiz down the steepest slopes with much glee. We all had plenty of fresh air and exercise in snowy weather; my husband busy sawing logs, the children stacking them and the dog pulling them along on the sledge or dragging long branches back home from the wood.

Our little wood looks magical in the snow. Tracks of animals and birds crisscross the sparkling ground. Normally we cannot see what enticing scents dogs are following but the snow makes this possible.

It is wonderful watching a puppy's reaction on seeing snow for the first time. They are usually fascinated and quickly investigate this strange fluffy stuff experimentally biting and eating it. They quickly become excited, racing round and round nose down and legs flying. Chloe my latest Newfoundland was only a youngster when she first saw snow. I opened the door and let her out, expecting the usual puppy curiosity and excitement. Chloe walked slowly outside, strolled briefly round the lawn, came back in looking decidedly bored as much as to say, "is that all it is, what's all the fuss about?" What a disappointment!

Last winter Chloe had her first lesson in sledging. As I had done with the other Newfoundland's, I taught her very carefully, one step at a time. She was incredibly good, relaxed and steady in her usual laid back way. Before long she had learnt the commands to "walk on, stand and stay." I was so pleased with her progress we went up in the woods round the pond and through the trees. She stood rock still while I took photos. She looked lovely with her jet black fur against the white snow. I was so pleased at her standing there; without her lead attached, looking so relaxed. The photo session finished I thought we would have one more session and go up and down some little slopes between the trees. Up we went then turned round to come back down. It was then that disaster struck. I had quite forgotten the old wooden runners had been replaced by new metal ones to make it slide more easily. The sledge ran forward and hit Chloe's back legs. Being frightened she leapt forward, the sledge hit her again. I was desperately trying to hang on to the lead and calm her down but by now she was panicking. I could not hold on and she shot off dragging the sledge behind her. I was horrified as she tried to escape from the terrifying object that pursued her relentlessly. She vanished out of sight weaving perilously between the trees; then I caught a glimpse of her careering dangerously past the house and out of sight again. Breathlessly I followed and at last found her lying down, shaking with fright her legs all tangled up in the straps attached to the sledge. I felt so terribly guilty letting this happen.

Since this incident I have tried to gradually introduce Chloe to the sledge again but she is still terrified. Chloe has always been so sweet and placid but I doubt now whether she will ever pull a sledge or cart again. It was all my fault for being over confident.



Residents may or may not have noticed that Parish Council meetings are now always preceded by a meeting of one of the Trusts. We have many Trusts, over which the Councillors are Trustees, and these Trusts have to be run separately from the Council. Therefore, there is now prior to every PC meeting a meeting of either Blackboys or Framfield Trust. Blackboys covers the recreation ground, allotments, Hall and Palehouse Common recreation ground. Framfield just the recreation ground and Hall. We also administer Framfield Allotments. If there are any queries regarding any of the grounds, or halls or allotments, contact should be made through me in the usual way.

Jeff Goggin was co-opted and welcomed onto the Council in September leaving only one vacancy.

Blackboys – reduction in speed limit. The re-engineering works to the junction of the B2102 and B2192 in Blackboys will go-ahead in January but ESCC are having a rethink on the traffic-calming measures to the High Street in Blackboys and the work has been delayed until the next financial year 2012/13. The Parish Council and residents involved hope that any proposals which come forward are significantly less 'engineered' than what has already been on offer. Councillor Chris Dowling (ESCC) is working with the Council to progress the works.

Blackboys Village Hall is to be painted internally in the Christmas Holidays and a new gate has been installed between the old and the new car park to stop the top car park becoming a stop-off for weekend evening revellers which causes a nuisance to everyone around. The gate should be kept shut once anyone has gone through.

The Parish Council, once again, will cover the cost of a Christmas tree for the Tree of Light situated outside the Memorial Hall – further details of how to get involved are elsewhere in the magazine.

A list of meeting dates for next year is detailed separate to this report. All that is left from me to say is that the Parish Council wishes everyone a happy Christmas and New Year.

#### STOATS ARE 'STOATALY' DIFFERENT.....


There can't be many people who at some time in their life who haven't enjoyed reading 'Wind in the Willows' and will undoubtedly recall that the 'baddies' in Kenneth Grahame's much loved classic are undoubtedly the stoats and weasels who occupied Toad Hall.


In fact, overtime they have both generally generated an unpopular reputation and even outright hostility, the epitome of what we think of as vermin. Amongst landowners the only time they liked to see them was when their bodies were strung out in a line on a gibbet! 'Weasely' has entered our vocabulary to describe someone who is a shifty and untrustworthy. So, I think it's about time that these two unpopular creatures had a public image makeover.

Neither of them is uncommon, they are widespread throughout the UK although the weasel is not found in Ireland. You are likely to encounter them along field edges and ditches in the longer grasses and stoats in particular don't like to be out in the open whereas weasels have a wider range of habitat and are more likely to be seen in urban areas.

So, if you see one, how will you tell the difference? Stoats are bigger though by not much. What you have to look at is the tail and if there is a black tip to it then you are looking at a stoat. The other name you might know a stoat by is ermine as they sometimes turn white in winter, especially the further north you go, but this is an unlikely occurrence in Sussex. Weasels are really pencil thin, long, sleek and very quick, but essentially the pattern of the fur on both mammals is very similar. In the end to identify them you might have to come down to a very unhelpful saying 'weasels are 'weasely' told and stoats are 'stoataly' different!

That they are voracious and clinical hunters is without doubt and their unpopularity and subsequent persecution resulted from their occasional forays into game pens where, as with any predator, faced with an abundance of potential prey will go on a frenzied killing spree. Despite their similarities there doesn't appear too much competition for food between them. Stoats will go for larger prey items, mainly rabbits and water voles whereas weasels prefer smaller mammals such as mice and voles, though they will both take eggs,

chicks, insects and worms. Their success depends on the amount of food available and fluctuates from year to year; starvation is the main cause of death for both species.

I have had a few encounters with stoats and weasels over the years and, although not always pretty, have been very entertaining. I was watching a nestbox at Woods Mill many years ago in which resided a family of great tits when a weasel rapidly climbed the tree and managed to squeeze through the entrance hall of the box and undoubtedly made short work of the chicks. Well you can't consume what probably amounted to at least half your own body weight without having an impact on the waistline and, sure enough, the weasel was now too fat to get out the hole. For the next 30 minutes I watched him gnaw at the hole to make it big enough to slip out, a monumental effort that required so much energy that probably made it ravenously hungry again.

The whole ecological system by which we all survive requires predator-prey relationships and stoats and weasels are a very effective part of that system, and shouldn't be vilified for that role. If you do come across them stay quiet and still as they will often be unaware of your presence and you might well be rewarded by observing some natural, very energetic and entertaining behaviour by one of our most charismatic mammal species.
