

being made of most journeys, with the exception of the very busy school journeys.

The section of service 32 route south of Heathfield will not be replaced. Stagecoach service 51 continues to provide a half-hourly service between Heathfield, Hailsham and Eastbourne during the main part of the day on Mondays to Saturdays, plus an hourly service on Sundays.

Wealden District Council and East Sussex County Council are working to put in place a new bus service for the Hellingly Old Hospital development as soon as possible, linking with Hailsham and Eastbourne. This is expected to be a long-term solution using a funding contribution provided by the developer.

### **East Sussex County Council funded RIDER services**

Rider 32 Uckfield – Framfield – Blackboys - Heathfield

Countryliner will be operating a revised Rider service 32 between Uckfield and Heathfield on a temporary basis from 19 March 2012. This largely replaces the current Countryliner commercial service and fuller details are given under the Countryliner heading above.

Rider 318 Heathfield – Broad Oak – Burwash Common – Burwash – Etchingham/Hurst Green

As noted above in relation to the 32 and 317, it is the County Council's intention to revert to a more integrated service between Hurst Green, Etchingham, Heathfield and Uckfield to replace the existing 318 and temporary 32 arrangements, both on Mondays to Fridays and on Saturdays. Thus it is likely that some changes will be made to journeys currently run as service 318.

Recent surveys have shown poor use of the current 318 on Saturdays and this may have some impact on the County Council's plans.

# Changes to Bus and Community Transport Services in the Wealden Area

# **Countryliner services**

Route 32

Uckfield - Framfield - Blackboys - Heathfield - Maynards Green - Horam - Hellingly Old Hospital - Hailsham - Polegate - Lower Willingdon - Eastbourne District General Hospital - Eastbourne

This route was introduced by Countryliner as a new commercial venture from 30 August 2011. The bus company has given notice to cancel the route citing as its reasons the increased cost of its fuel and reductions in the government fuel subsidy for bus operators. The last day of operation of service 32 as a commercial service Uckfield – Heathfield – Eastbourne will be 17 March 2012.

In light of Countryliner's decision, it was the County Council's intention to revert to running contracted service 318, provided by Renown, between Uckfield, Heathfield and Etchingham at similar levels of service to that operated before August 2011. However, it has not so far been possible to reach agreement with Renown over the price of providing this service, partly because of the need for a higher capacity bus to cater for an increased number of school children who have been travelling on service 32 to and from Heathfield Community College.

As a short term measure, from 19 March 2012, the County Council will fund the continuation of a revised Countryliner 32 service between Uckfield and Heathfield. This service offers similar levels of service to the current timetable although there is a break in service at lunchtime and the last journey from Uckfield is withdrawn due to poor use. The service will continue to serve Heathfield Community College at school times. Departures from Heathfield during most of the day will be slightly later than at present, therefore giving more assured connections from service 317 and 318.

The County Council is considering the options for services between Heathfield, Blackboys, Framfield and Uckfield and it may be that some reduction in service will be necessary, particularly on Saturdays. Recent surveys undertaken on this section of route show only a small level of use

And all this disaster relief is extra to the routine work of feeding the hungry, improving water supplies, health education, and much more. I think it is a worthy cause.



In 2009, 20 nightingales in Suffolk were fitted with a tiny 'geolocator' device weighing less than a gram by scientists from the British Trust for Ornithology (BTO). These devices enabled the scientists to track the migration of these birds, plot their route and find out where they spent the winter. The results were fascinating. Following a single bird, it left its breeding ground on the 25<sup>th</sup> July and made its way down the west coast of France, past Madrid and arrived near Lisbon on the 1<sup>st</sup> September where it remained for a couple of weeks. Making its way down the west coast of Africa this individual arrived at its final winter destination in the south-west corner of Guinea in mid-December - five months after it left Britain. We know that this bird stayed in that location until mid-February when it set off on the return journey to England. Sadly the transmitter stopped sending back signals shortly after and it was assumed that the bird perished. However, in May 2010 the same bird was captured by researchers, just 50 metres from where they originally attached the device the year before.

My interest in nightingales has been re-invigorated even more year this year as the BTO is organising a national nightingale survey. The last was carried out in 1999 and raised concerns about the decline in their numbers that had occurred since a previous survey. Annual observations point to a continual decline and so this 2012 survey will give a clear picture of how many pairs of nightingales are breeding in the UK. We do already know that the population is shrinking into the south-east corner of the UK so we are relatively well off in Sussex for nightingales, but if this contraction continues at the current rate, in a relatively short time they may disappear altogether; a scenario too awful to contemplate.

Woods Mill is a place where you can hear nightingales between the end of April and the beginning of June. For many years now I have run 'Evening with Nightingales' events to give people the pleasure of listening to these wonderful birds as dusk emerges. 

# **Those Nightingales Again**

## by Mike Russell, Sussex Wildlife Trust

I'm sure I've gone on about nightingales before in this column, but that's not going to stop me doing it again I'm afraid. For all of my 27 years of working at the Sussex Wildlife Trust at Woods Mill, nightingales have been an integral part of my life and as spring approaches it won't be long before that wonderful song will permeate across the reserve and for a couple of glorious months 'my' nightingales will provide the soundtrack to my life.

Why does this small, pretty but non-descript brown bird have such an impact on not just mine but many people's lives? The answer to that would seem obvious; it is the song.

Throughout the centuries, musical, literary and artistic references abound to the beauty of its song and that still is the case today. Just a few weeks ago on Desert Island Discs the author Vikram Seth was the guest and of the one records from the eight he would save from the waves was a 1942 recording of a nightingale singing to the backdrop of a low, but increasing throb, of RAF Lancaster and Wellington bombers on their way to a raid on Germany.

The song gets right to your soul and it just makes you wonder how such a small living being the size of a robin produces such a beautiful, evocative and complex sound.

When you delve a bit further into their lives you get a picture of how remarkable these birds are. We know they are migratory and they spend the winter somewhere in West Africa but which way they go, how long do they take to get there and what do they need when they arrive to survive. There have been remarkably few nightingale ringing 'recoveries', that is birds that have been caught and have had small rings attached to their legs, but recent developments in microtechnology has led to more information being discovered.

teaching Assistants and even the Headteacher for the day. 

### LIVING WITH FUR AND FEATHER

### NEWTS IN THE CELLAR

Our old cottage has a cellar. There are three doors on one kitchen wall, one leads to the pantry, one to the front hall and another to the cellar. The cellar door has always been kept locked ever since a fleeting visit from our local doctor. He hurriedly gave instructions for our young sick son as he was leaving. He quickly opened what he thought was the hall door behind him, and stepped smartly backwards. He froze on hearing a shouted warning just in time to prevent him falling down the steep brick steps leading to the cellar.

This cellar is a fascinating place. It has a brick floor and because the cottage was built into the hill it has a gully all the way round so that water can come in from the upper side, flow round and go out on the lower side. If it rains very hard it can flood the cellar, usually only a few inches. It is unpleasant when not expecting it when icy water splashes over your toes when wearing sandals. In the centre is an ancient gnarled tree trunk that holds up the dining room floor. It is interesting to see the tide marks of earlier flooding on it.

On Christmas morning, busy doing the festive lunch, I clambered down to the cellar to collect sausages from the freezer. Being in a hurry, I wasn't as watchful as usual, and nearly stepped on a large dark newt just in front of the freezer. We have always lived with the wildlife that treats the damp cool cellar as a convenient temporary lodging. Recently a frog decided its favourite place was again just in front of the freezer. Each time I visited the freezer I would peer at the wet mottled bricks knowing the frog would be almost invisible there.

We now have an oil fired Aga, but for many years we had a coal fired one. Our local coal merchants were wonderful and very careful to check the cellar for visiting wildlife before tipping the coal onto the cellar floor. Life was very stressful and time consuming as the newts apparently liked to play king of the coal heap where they would lurk disguising themselves with coal dust making it almost impossible to see them. I was terrified of inadvertently scooping them up on the shovel, putting them in the hod, then tipping them into the Aga. Because of this worry it took ages to fill the large hod every day as each single lump had to be inspected to see if a sooty newt was playing dead thinking that would keep it safe.

Over the years the cellar has been very useful for storing wood, coal and surplus Wellington boots. These are kept upside down in case an odd mouse falls in and can't

get out again We could also call it the wine cellar as I spotted a lone bottle of wine in the wine rack the other day. I am also frequently visiting the freezer which has to be done carefully to avoid squashing any visiting creatures lurking there. The other problem I have is that the cellar steps have become strangely much steeper as the years have passed! The first step down from the kitchen is much deeper than the rest. As you descend the steps become shallower. Young children and puppies are never allowed near this hazardous staircase. However I decided that when the family were not around to help take food to the freezer or bring it up again I would train Connie my last Newfoundland to help me. And now Chloe my present Newfoundland has taken over. She carries in the shopping, then if it's going down to the cellar I climb down the first step or so first, then Chloe carefully leans forward and passes me the bag of chicken etc. If she hears me unlock the cellar door as I go down to collect something for dinner, she immediately goes to the open door peering down at me waiting to help. As I get nearer the top she reaches forward so I can pass her the bag. She then backs off while I negotiate the deep step into the kitchen. It is quite a sight looking up and seeing a huge ten stone dog towering above me, I must be trusting!
