

By the time you read this Easter will be upon us; the time of year when we lament the death of Jesus on Good Friday but rejoice in His resurrection on Easter Sunday.

Traditionally we associate Jesus' death with the forgiveness of sin for all of mankind but all too often in our thinking Jesus is left on the cross rather than living in the good of the resurrection. The cross of Christ is a place of transition where the old life is done away with and the opportunity for beginning a new life is waiting in the wings; should be wish to embrace it.

One of the questions I have been asking myself and others over the past few years is why aren't there more people with a living faith? Is it because folk see the church or God as irrelevant in today's society? Is it a lack of knowledge or knowing the difference between faith and religion? Perhaps the name 'Jesus' is off-putting? The reasons are many and varied but one thing is for sure – we will all have thought about God at some point in our lives.

Consider these words from St Paul – '...if you declare with your mouth, 'Jesus is Lord,' and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. ¹⁰ For it is with your heart that you believe and are justified, and it is with your mouth that you profess your faith and are saved. ¹¹ As Scripture says, 'Anyone who believes in him will never be put to shame.' (Romans 10:9-11).

'Believe in your heart' is mentioned twice in this passage but what exactly is it to believe in your heart? From a biblical perspective the heart has nothing to do with the organ that pumps blood around our bodies as it clearly resides in our brains! The heart is at the very centre of our souls (our mind, will and emotions). It is the place where we think about the world we live in, where we make our value judgements about ourselves and others and ultimately the choices we make and then put into action.

The emotional state of the heart affects us physically, mentally and spiritually i.e.

"A happy heart makes the face cheerful, but heartache crushes the spirit" (Pv 15:13).

God places the highest regard on our hearts as it is here that we believe in Him or dismiss Him. God speaking through King Solomon said this - My son, pay attention to what I say; listen closely to my words. ²¹ Do not let them out of your sight, keep them within your heart; ²² for they are life to those who find them and health to a man's whole body. ²³ Above all else, guard your heart, for it is the wellspring of life. (*Pv 4:20-24*).

It is through the six senses (sight, hearing, touch, smell, taste and spirit) that we absorb information and the experiences of life – good, bad or indifferent but it is all stored in the heart and processed in the heart and here lies the problem; the heart is full of mixed messages and emotional turmoil.

Is it any wonder that there is so much negativity in our lives when we expose ourselves to gossip, bad news and violence, particularly through the media? We end up by being brain washed into particular patens of thinking that are neither true nor healthy. I believe this is why God makes the statement in Jeremiah 9 - that the heart is deceitful above all things and beyond cure. Who can understand it? Greek evangelist J John says 'The heart of the human problem is the problem with the human heart'. We just don't fully understand ourselves – if we did we would have resolved our own problems and the problems of the world years ago.

So is there a solution? In my experience it is often when we are at our wits end, when we are rung out and admit that we have failed to solve our own problems or that we are so desperately unhappy that the doorway to God is prised ever so slightly open. It is 'out of the abundance of the heart that the mouth speaks' and the words are uttered 'God help me'! This is baseline honesty between you and your creator and the light of the risen Christ floods in. The veil of deception is lifted and the gift of faith is implanted in your heart and you know with certainty that God is real - ¹⁰ For it is with your heart that you believe and are justified, and it is with your mouth that you profess your faith and are saved. This is Easter!

Community Fire Safety in Wealden

The Community Safety Team in Wealden delivers free home safety visits and talks on request within the Wealden District.

Home Safety Visits are a free, fire safety inspection of your home undertaken by East Sussex Fire and Rescue Service. If you have any concerns about your existing smoke alarms or would like any advice on fire safety, the Fire Service can visit you in your home and conduct a free home safety visit. We are also able to fit new smoke alarms during this visit to protect your home, where appropriate, for free.

The Community Fire Safety teams can give you advice on protecting yourself from fire risk, making an escape plan and maintenance of your alarms.

For example, making simple bedtime checks by shutting doors and switching off unused electrical items before you go to bed can reduce the risk of a fire developing.

In the Wealden area, these are undertaken by the Wealden Community Safety Advisors (George Stonehouse, Kate Graham and Gaidagh Chapman). They, and the five other teams covering the whole of East Sussex can be contacted on 0800 177 7069 for an appointment.

The Community Safety Team will also organise and attend events on behalf of the Fire Service within your area. Please get in touch if you wish to request our help!

Blackboys Church of England Primary School

There have been lots of exciting events and opportunities at Blackboys School since we last wrote.

We have sadly missed our Class 2 teacher Miss Bodfish this term, who had an accident in the first batch of snow. Her class has been taken by Mr Fifield, who has impressed children, staff and parents with his dedication and enthusiasm. Always one to take on a challenge, he organised the class for a very successful assembly based on their Fire and Ice project. We look forward to welcoming back Miss Bodfish and thank Mr Fifield for all his efforts.

Red Nose Day was a real success at Blackboys with the idea of "Doing Something Funny for Money" taking the form of a Pyjama Day. For a donation, staff and parents came to school in their nightwear, donning PJs, dressing gowns and slippers. Nature Notes

I've just experienced a real spring-like day on 18th February! Honeybees are flying around looking for pollen and nectar, and also for people to sting if they get too close to the colony. The target flowers will be mainly Crocuses and Snowdrops, but there are a few Celandines, Primroses and Violets around as well.

A pair of Buzzards was courting over the South Downs this afternoon, and being shouted at by two Carrion Crows. These and other raptors are now on the increase as thankfully, they are not persecuted as much as they used to be. I heard a report of a Goshawk near the Holy Cross Church Centre a few days ago; it was plucking a Pigeon, and eventually flew away with it. Watch out also for Kestrels hovering as they search for prey, especially by roadsides, and Sparrowhawks either soaring overhead or shooting like an arrow through the trees and along hedgerows ready to pounce on an unwary Sparrow, Bluetit or other small bird.

There is a country rule that all hedgerows should be trimmed by 6th March, in order to avoid disturbing nesting birds and dormice etc. I have been trimming a hedge at the University Ecology Field Trials Plot today, and was delighted to see that Elder is well into breaking bud, and Hawthorn is just starting. Soon these hedgerows will be transformed from brown to green, and will provide cover for nesting Chaffinches, Long-Tailed Tits, Blackbirds, Songthrushes, Dunnocks (Hedge-Sparrows), Robins, Wrens and many other birds. Dormice also will use the hedges as motorways to get between woodlots. Many birds that nest on the ground such as Yellowhammers, Chiffchaffs, Whitethroats and Blackcaps will use the hedges as singing posts. If you are awake at about 06:00 hrs. you will be treated to the dawn chorus from Blackbirds, Songthrushes, Dunnocks, Robins and Chaffinches right now. These will soon be joined by many other birds as we progress through March, but as the days progress, so sunrise will get earlier, until it will be 05:30 by early April that the best chorus will be heard.

There will be other seasonal movements to be seen and heard as the amphibians wake up from their winter sleep, and there will be croaking from the ponds and Frog spawn will soon follow.

they feed like hoovers, sucking up vegetation and any other life forms attached to it.

During the removal operation, 1,762 carp were removed, but there were other species as well, native to the UK, including 1,777 rudd, a fish much smaller than the carp. In addition, 11 tench came out and these are known as 'the doctor' fish as they are particularly slimy and it was believed that other fish rubbed up against them to heal any scars. There were also 10 eels and 77 perch - the prodigy of the 20 or so I released into the lake over 20 years ago when I was warden to try and predate on the carp fry to help manage the population; it obviously didn't work! We are not sure how the 10 goldfish arrived, someone obviously sneaked in and surreptitiously released them. In the end a total of over 800lbs of fish was removed. We are grateful to Miles Gosling of Mayfly Aquacare near Lewes, who organised the safe removal and re-homing of all the fish.

As the draining progressed, our ecologist Graeme Lyons surveyed for invertebrates and found two, both great diving beetles, and that was it. It is not going to look brilliant for a year or two but eventually the lake will return (we are going to let it fill up naturally) and this time we hope it will be full of dragon and damselflies, skaters and whirligig beetles which will dance across the surface, while water boatman will hunt just beneath. Frogs and toads will have a greater chance of successfully spawning and a greater diversity of aquatic plants will colonise. All this will attract more birds to feed on the increased food supply.

That's the plan and it's going to be very interesting to see how it all works out and hopefully, once visitors get over the shock of seeing the drained lake without fish, they will understand why we have taken this action.

Shock to the System by Mike Russell of the Sussex Wildlife Trust

Visitors to the Trust's headquarters at Woods Mill, Henfield will be in for a bit of shock this year, no fish! Even worse, no lake! Over the winter the Trust has carried out a long-planned and much needed fish removal programme which involved draining the lake so that the fish could be more easily captured and moved on to other waters.

Understandably, people will be disappointed; one of the reasons that people visit Woods Mill, especially those with young families, is to feed the fish and they come armed with whole loaves of bread to throw into the lake causing a feeding frenzy. We too as a Trust have been guilty of perpetuating the frenzy as for decades part of the schooldays here is to bring the fish to the surface so that that the children can see them and discuss and learn all about them. And that is the cause of the problem; a well-fed fish population has blossomed to the detriment of any other wildlife.

Woods Mill nature reserve should demonstrate good wildlife management to encourage a diverse range of species and one of its great strengths is in the amount of different habitats within a fairly small area. At the centre of the reserve is the lake. It is not a natural lake; it was dug out in 1945 by Canadian squaddies stationed nearby for the then owner of Woods Mill, a Mr Chaplin, and then stocked as a fishery for local people. The Trust acquired the reserve in 1966 and, when fishing ceased, the fish proliferated.

The great majority of fish were common and mirror carp which are not native species to Britain, although they have been in the country since medieval times. They originally stocked moats and were introduced as an important source of food, but quickly became a favourite species for fishermen. Although we had a lot of fairly big fish in the lake, they rarely reach into double figures in terms of weight because of the density of the population, whereas carp exceeding 50lbs in weight can be occasionally caught in some ponds. The problem is with carp is that

The Parish Council (PC) is a statutory consultee on planning applications and as such is invited to make comments along with the public during a specified 21-day consultation period. Due to the requirement to determine applications as soon after the 21-day deadline as is reasonably possible, Wealden District Council (WDC) can no longer be guaranteed to be able to allow an extension of time for comments to fit in with Committee meeting dates. As applications are sent out by WDC at any time, the deadline for comment might be before the next Parish Committee meeting.

The Chairman will therefore give his permission for applications to be discussed and commented upon under delegated authority in line with the terms of reference of the Committee. Subject to there being no additional information coming forward within the 21-day statutory consultation period, the comments will be passed onto WDC in the usual way.

If any member the public, whether the applicant in an application or an interested party wishing to make representation to the PC, please contact the Clerk at the earliest opportunity once they are aware the application is live or the yellow site notice has been put up on site.

Letters of support or objection should be addressed to WDC in the first instance and copied to the PC for information.
