#### **Nature Notes**

Flaming June has arrived at last. Yesterday (19th June) the temperature rose to 27°C. in the afternoon. The hottest day of the year so far. However today there are thunder storms forecast. At least the old adage that an English summer is "...2 hot days and a thunderstorm." Seems to still hold true despite the other inconsistencies of our disrupted climate.

The Wrens nesting in our porch fledged today. I think there were about 5 babies. The Latin name for Wren is *Troglodytes troglodytes* meaning cave dweller. Wrens are insectivorous and love to go inside caves, buildings and other cavities. They are Britain's commonest bird, which is surprising as many people rarely see them. The reasons they are rarely seen are that they are very small, they hide in undergrowth and apart from when they have freshly fledged babies, and they are rarely seen in groups. However, if a winter is particularly cold, they do sometimes roost in a group inside a cavity to keep warm. This could be a nest-box, hole in a tree or building. There are many ways in which Wrens are unique in Britain, for a start, they are apparently the only species of British bird whose ancestors evolved in the New World. There are many species of Wren in the Americas, but only one in the Old World.

However, all other species of British birds apparently had ancestors that evolved in Europe, Middle East, Africa, Asia and Australia. Basically everywhere else apart from the Americas. Wrens are also unusual in as much as it is the male that usually builds the main nest, but the female can sometimes line the inside. The reason that Wrens are our commonest bird is that they can occupy almost every type of habitat, e.g. coast, hills, forest, garden wetland, and they distribute themselves throughout the land, and the male defends a territory of which there are estimated to be around 7.1 million in Britain. So the actual population is about double that. You may not see a Wren very often because of its shy skulking disposition, but you will certainly hear it, it has one of the loudest songs of all British birds, and will also make a very loud tick – tick call that can sometimes be very fast and long such that it sounds a bit like a chain being pulled through a pulley. Probably the main predator of the Wren is the domestic cat, but maybe the main cause of death is probably cold in the winter.

All dogs must be on a lead in the church yard and if your dog has an 'accident' please come prepared with a plastic bag to pick it up.

Incidentally any anti-social driving can be reported to Operation Crackdown which has a website and a telephone number (01243) 642222). If a car is reported, their registration number is retained and I believe a letter sent – I gather if it is reported again a visit is made to the driver by the Police which then seems to deter them for driving in this fashion in the future!

Whilst on roads Sandy Lane is to be closed from 15 July to 8 August to allow South East Water to carry out works to install a new drinking water system. I do endeavour to put news such as this on the website for those that have access to the internet.

There will be provision for the Police to issue Fixed Penalty Notices on the spot of £75.00. Let's hope this deters the offenders who still seem to be prolific at the moment.

The replacement of the village signs is underway. The Horticultural Society have also kindly offered to do some bulb planting in various locations in the Parish, one of which might be around the village signs which is good news.



#### LIVING WITH FUR AND FEATHER

#### MARIGOLDS AND GOSLINGS

In May we went for a holiday on our boat on the Norfolk Broads. On one of the rare sunny days we moored up to the bank for lunch. We were entertained by a goose family, Mum, Dad and their very young fluffy offspring. They were all on the water then the parents decided to bring them up onto the bank. With much fluttering of immature wings and scrabbling feet the babies managed it. Geese are incredible parents, always keeping the goslings safely between them. These tiny creatures immediately started eating the short grass while the adults kept guard. Some more Greylag geese arrived but were quickly chased off by the parents, necks stretched out threateningly, forcing the newcomers to retreat. We were amused to see that all the goslings were eating at the same time and later preening together. After all this activity it was time for them to rest, all together. A chilly wind sprang up and blew along the bank, so mum gathered her brood, spreading her wings, while the young family huddled warmly beneath her. Dad stood on guard, head up constantly looking around for danger. Our lunch break was over. The geese also thought it was time to return to the water. With a flap of wings Dad was afloat. The babies walked to the edge of the bank and looked over. One by one these fluffy balls spread their miniature wings and flopped into the water. Mum had stayed on the bank to supervise their departure. We noticed one smaller gosling was left and would not take the plunge. Would they abandon this weaker one? No Mum decided to find an easier way down to the water further along the bank and carefully led it there. A moment later all the family were united back on the river and off they went. One adult at the front, one bringing up the rear with the well-disciplined children safely between them.

Ducks are terrible parents and neglect their offspring terribly. They have large broods but I don't think many survive. They are usually brought up by single mothers. However the females are very clever, like us female humans and know how to get what they want! They have different tactics for getting food. When moored up you often hear the pitter patter of webbed feet as they walk round the side decks. They always know where the galley is and peer pathetically through the window as you prepare a meal, begging for a scrap. Another method is to land on the cabin roof as you cruise along; reaching the front edge they put their heads down peering in at the driver. The following incident we have seen many times. A duck, always female of course, flies on to a boat going up river. It then uses its cunning tactics until its demands are met. It then flies to a boat going down river and repeats the performance.

These piratical creatures target unsuspecting sailors, boarding boats as they travel up and down the river.

Swans have a more polite way of asking for food. These visitors swim up and tap on the side of the boat. They know the occupants will look out, wondering what the noise is. Seeing a beautiful swan, holiday makers can't resist feeding them some bread. I am sure all these birds must think, "oh no not bread again".

Lots of birds were nesting while we were there. The swan's nests are huge and are built high up on the banks so they are not likely to be flooded. While the female sits regally on the nest the male patrols up and down the river or edge of broad fiercely guarding his territory from any intruders. It is wise to keep well away. On the other hand grebe build their nests practically in the water so are extremely vulnerable when unthinking boaters make a lot of wash flooding the nests. Coots were still busy building nests, while others had young ones that the parents were busy feeding. We always see gloomy looking herons, usually standing at the waters edge, hoping to catch a fish. I watched one for twenty minutes and was rewarded by seeing one eventually make a catch.

I was very excited when I spotted an unusual bird, thinking it must be very rare I grabbed the bird book which said "The lapwing is a very common bird" what a disappointment! However I was thrilled to see an otter. We were moored quietly up to the bank when to my surprise an otter came out of the river, crossed the path just in front of the boat and vanished into a reeded area on the far side. That was the highlight of my holiday.

What about the marigolds you are probably thinking? I was wondering what I would write as I stood on the deck, coiling up the ropes and glanced down at my hands, clad as usual in bright yellow gloves. I wear them practically all the time for boat washing duties, handling ropes when mooring and of course all the washing up.
