Out with old, in with the new.

As I am writing this end of year letter it is with the expectation that the refurbishment of Framfield Church will indeed be complete by the first week of December.

The major works are nearing completion. The interior of the church has been cleaned and repainted. New lighting installed and the last of the re-leaded stained glass windows installed. Then there is the big clean and reinstallation of the various fixture and fittings. Everyone is very grateful to the Friends of Framfield Church who have raised the majority of the funding necessary to undertake the much needed work. We are also very grateful to John Mordaunt for project managing the work and his many skilled helpers who have worked tirelessly behind the scenes.

However, it is a sound investment for the future. Churches are public places but also places that reflect our Christian heritage down through the ages.

Whenever you undertake a major project be it in a church or indeed at home, it does give opportunity to de-clutter. Sometimes we hang on to old or out-of-date things when in reality they should have been discarded long ago and the new embraced.

The familiar Christmas story is one such event that encapsulates 'Out with the old in with the new'. The religious order of the Old Testament had in effect had its day. Not that there was anything intrinsically wrong with the hub of testament i.e. the familiar Ten Commandments. It was the simple fact that left to his own devices mankind couldn't keep them. Due to man's corrupted nature that had a propensity to sin (miss the mark) God had to intervene to get mankind back on track so that he didn't destroy himself and the world God created for him to live in. St Paul puts it like this in his letter to the Galatians - 'For if a law had been given that could impart life then righteousness would certainly have come by the law. But scripture declares the whole world is a prisoner of sin, so that what was promised, being given through faith in Jesus Christ, might be given to those who believe. Before this faith came, we were held prisoners by the law, locked up until faith should be revealed. So the law was put in place to lead us to Christ that we might be justified by faith. Now that faith has come, we are no longer under the supervision of the law'.

In effect God was re-establishing the relationship with himself that he originally had with Abraham but extending it to all who believe.

Abraham, the man who believed that he would be the father of many nations, despite being 75 years old when God made the promise to him. It would be a further 25 years before Isaac was born. However, despite his age, now 100 years, he

believed God as an act of faith and as a result God credited righteousness (or right standing with God) to him.

The Old Testament law came into effect 430years later but this was only necessary due to man's sin. Interestingly, the laws we have in the UK are based on the Ten Commandments which demonstrates the need to keep mankind under supervision and spell out right from wrong.

So what changed when Jesus came to earth on that very first Christmas?

Firstly, Jesus came to earth to live as one of us; growing up from a baby through to adulthood. He identifies with us in this life because he lived it himself.

Secondly, in order to break the hold of sin over our lives so that we could be freed, Jesus would have to die - unless there is the shedding of blood there is no forgiveness of sin. The covenant of faith in what Christ has done for us, is ratified through Christ's death and resurrection and is available to all who will believe, just as Abraham believed.

Simple faith enables God to credit righteousness to every believer and the resurrection of Christ graphically shows us that Christ's self-sacrifice for sin was effective and enables us take hold of the promise of life after death in heaven.

Finally, the sending of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. To all who will believe and invite God into their lives, God comes and takes up residence within the individual by his Spirit. Transformation of our waywardness and our thinking and attitudes is accomplished by God from the inside out. His aim; to make us more human or Christ-like as Christ was the only perfect human being to have ever walked the earth.

Out with the old, in with the new? You can try to live a good life in an attempt to unconsciously please God but you will never be good enough - that's the old. Alternatively, acknowledging that you can't manage it in your own strength you can invite Christ in by faith - that's the new. After that, rely on God to transform you into the person God created you to be in the first place.

Jesus came into the world at Christmas. He is God's Son and gift to each one of us. But as I often say to the person holding the present; you will never know how glorious the present is until you take the wrapping off!

To everyone in the parish - have a great Christmas and a very happy and prosperous New Year. Blessings to one and all, *Rev Chris Lawrence*

Nature Notes

The autumn is slowly progressing, but it is 14th November today and there are still plenty of green leaves on the trees. Only 5 weeks to the winter solstice and there are green leaves on oak and ash trees. The Acers such as field maple and sycamore are turning. Birch leaves are yellow and falling like discoloured snow. We have had the first significant frost, and most insects will have either died or found a refuge for the winter. Wintering birds are flooding into the British Isles, and it is a while since I have seen a swallow or a warbler. However I did see a late wheatear on Saturday 9th November on the summit of Mount Caburn near Lewes, there were also a number of meadow pipits.

There are three types of pipit commonly seen in Sussex. Meadow pipits, as their name suggests, live in meadows, or indeed any type of peaceful grassland. We get them in West Park Local Nature Reserve in the winter. There are also rock pipits, which as their name suggests, like to live in rocky habitats, usually by the sea. You can always find them at Splash Point at the easterly end of the promenade at Seaford. Thirdly, there are the rather rare tree pipits, which as their name suggests, live mostly in trees, and can be seen in certain parts of Ashdown Forest. All 3 pipits look and sound fairly similar, but can be distinguished on close inspection with binoculars and a good identification guide. However, their identity is usually given away by their location. All 3 species may be seen all the year round, but most tree pipits fly south for the winter, most meadow pipits remain in Britain all year, and most rock pipits are winter visitors from further north.

I am currently reading a book on skylarks. There are many different species of larks around the world, and most of them live in arid habitats. Some of them never drink water, but get all their moisture from eating juicy insects. In Sussex, skylarks are fairly common, but are declining, and occupy the same type of habitat as meadow pipits. We also have a few woodlarks on Ashdown Forest, but these are quite rare. Rarer still are horned larks also known as shore larks, because they are winter visitors that are only seen on sea shores, and then only very rarely. Horned larks breed in the Arctic, and those visiting Britain are thought to breed in northern Eurasia.

Uckfield Foodbank Festive Update

Christmas really can be the toughest time of the year for many people, not least those without work and where it is challenging to make ends meet. Of course, it can also be a time of celebration for families and friends, the giving and receiving of presents and possibly over indulgence.

This will be the first December and Christmas where Uckfield Foodbank will be open and while we have a tremendous 3,644 kg of food collected so far and available for distribution, we do please need your help.

We have a dedicated and growing team of volunteers, who are equally good ambassadors, spreading the word and yet, we do need everyone to be aware that emergency food supplies are available to those in need within our community. It's bad enough to be hungry at any time but it just seems even harsher at Christmas.

So, how can you help? Please do signpost anyone you may know, who is in need to the Citizens' Advice Bureau in Uckfield; they are able to issue Foodbank vouchers that can be exchanged for three days of emergency food at our distribution centre in Grange Road.

We had a fantastic response from our inaugural Tesco collection day in September and will be collecting at Tesco again on Saturday 30 November. Although our stock levels are good, we will please need more donations especially on this day. Some people have asked about Christmas treats: yes, it will be good to provide 'extras' to our usual offering but please can we ask the good people of Uckfield to stick to our shopping list.

Food donations, from our published list, can be left in collection boxes at The Bargain Store, 94B High Street, or at The Lord's Vineyard, 102 High Street, Uckfield, and at both Buxted and Bird-in-Eye medical practices.

With the rising cost of energy and the restructuring of the benefits system to Universal Credit, we are expecting to see an increase in the number of people needing to access the services of the Foodbank. Without the continued support of the local community we would be unable to support those in need.

More volunteers would be welcome to help with the Foodbank. The opening times of the King's Centre for distribution are 2.30-4.00pm on these days, including Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve. LIVING WITH FUR AND FEATHER

A TALK WITH CHLOE

Many months ago I was asked if I would give a talk to Framfield and Blackboys Wives Group. I said yes, adding optimistically that I would bring my Newfoundland who could do a little demonstration, showing how she helps me in the house. It seemed a good idea when I suggested it but as time went by I started to regret my impulsive offer.

I knew Chloe could carry out a wide variety of tasks at home very skilfully but would she cooperate in a new and strange place. When she was about six months old she did accompany me while I gave a talk in Heathfield library and she was quite good, but that was a long time ago. My other really big worry was whether I could hang on to a very friendly eleven stone dog that might be too enthusiastic greeting the audience.

A few days before the talk I started my preparations. I wrote some short notes on my talk which included my work as a dog behaviourist, Connie my last dog, heroine of my book, 'A Dog In A Million' and of course how and why I trained Chloe. I carefully did it on the computer making the print really big so I could glance at it occasionally without my glasses. I confidently assumed that would ensure my talk flowed effortlessly and logically from one subject to the next.

I then made a list of suitable jobs that Chloe could do in a hall. I decided against taking the vacuum cleaner, washing machine and dishwasher as impractical, pity really, as she is very good helping with these tasks and people love to see her working. However I knew she would demonstrate how she takes off my socks and shoes. I found some new red socks which would show up nicely. I put them on and confidently expected Chloe to take them off. Much to my surprise she gave one sniff and refused. I gave up and wore them for a while hoping the familiar smell would make her change her mind.

Next on the list was Chloe herself. She had been moulting and her coat was not looking its best. However I gave her a good brush, then a bath using Johnson's baby shampoo. She also had her ears and teeth cleaned, so hopefully she would smell nice.

The day came all too soon. We arrived at the village hall; my heart sank as my usually placid dog became very excited and rushed into the building like a runaway express train, towing me inelegantly behind her. It was very embarrassing. I thought she might

and partial refurbishments of Blackboys (which already has a more modern set of swings) and Palehouse Common (which serves fewer residents). The total monies required will then be calculated over the period of repayment (up to 50 years) including interest accrued, and the amount of extra council tax this will cost each household annually – this may only be in the region of £20.00, less than 50p per week and might in fact indeed be a lot less. We will know more once the 'number crunching' has been carried out.

There is one possible proviso in this – the Parish Council may only able to obtain borrowing approval if the majority of residents vote 'yes' if we are required to hold a public referendum should the Government 'cap' parish councils in future years. Any referendum would be held next May.

Over the next few months, pictures and details of the schemes will be put on our website and the schools/pre-schools approached for their opinions. There is already a section on our website where comment can be made. It is hoped to run small exhibitions at both Schools in the run up to Christmas and at the Village Markets.

Although, it is relatively early days, the Council wanted everyone to be aware of their plans and hope that people will support this benefit to the community that the improvements to the play areas will bring for current and future children alike.

Play area equipment is now so prohibitively expensive, the Parish Council will not be able to sustain any of the sites much longer without the facility of a loan and they will have to sadly be decommissioned.

The Framfield Playground Action Group (FPAG) are also continuing to raise funds which will help enhance the refurbishment of Framfield play area so they should be thanked for their efforts on behalf of the people of Framfield.

The last thing is to wish everyone a happy Christmas from the Parish Council.

FRAMFIELD PARISH COUNCIL - REPORT

The Parish Council hopes everyone is pleased with the new village signs. He original signs were not repairable. We have tried to follow the original themes on the new ones and they are also relatively maintenance free and should have a much longer life.

The Council is still involved in protracted discussions with ESCC over the repairs to the village guideposts and we hope to shortly be able to confirm with a couple of sponsors that they can replace some of the signs at their cost, but that they will become the property of the Parish Council thus enabling us to insure them against damage. Something we have not been able to do in the past as the ownership has remained with ESCC.

Concerns have been highlighted in The Street, Framfield over the anti-social way in which some vehicles are parked particularly during School opening and closing times actually making crossing for school children quite dangerous. Please park sensibly and courteously at all times.

On that note, Operation Crackdown has now been enhanced if anyone is seen to be driving badly, it is now possible to report this to the Police as follows: by telephone on the Crackdown Hotline 01243 642222 or by email www.operationcrackdown.org.

On a happy note, the Horticultural Society have spent many hours 'digging' – planting numerous quantities of spring bulbs in various very prominent locations in the Parish, which will only of course be obvious in the spring. A big thank you needs to be directed to the Society for covering the cost of the bulbs and the spade work in putting them in.

As reported elsewhere in the magazine, Sandy and Keith Rogers are 'retiring' their role in running the Framfield Village Market. Huge thanks must go to Sandy, Keith and their helpers for running the market for 10 years – all proceeds go towards the Hall and its refurbishment. The Parish Council will be taking over from the New Year but any help would be greatly appreciated including the provision of cakes for a stall where again all proceeds will go towards the Hall.

As mentioned in the last magazine the Council is well aware that the three Parish play areas are in need of updating. The Parish Council has decided that the only way forward is to apply for borrowing approval so that a loan can be used to carry out this work.

A loan is available through the Public Works Loan Board (PWLB) This mechanism has been used before by the Council and indeed is used by many other local authorities across the country.

Three quotes for the works have been obtained and the most suitable will be chosen. The amount of money required will be based on the scaled cost for the complete refurbishment of Framfield play area (the oldest and in need of most attention and serving the most residents)

"You will now find it easier to report incidents of anti-social driving in Sussex. Sussex Police has re-launched Operation Crackdown - a system that enables anyone to report anti-social driving and abandoned vehicles, either online or by phone Anti-social driving can be driving that is careless, deliberately aggressive or dangerous. If you see this type of behaviour it is important that you report it, so it can be dealt with in the most appropriate way.

Operation Crackdown is a joint initiative supported by Sussex Safer Roads Partnership (SSRP), Sussex Police and all local authorities in the county. It was first launched in 2002 as a way of reporting abandoned vehicles in Sussex, and was expanded in 2007 to cover anti-social driving reports.

The system for reporting anti-social driving has now been made simpler, to encourage members of the public to easily and quickly report this type of incident and users can now keep track of the progress of their case with a specific reference number provided.

Incidents can be reported, either via

www.operationcrackdown.org, or by calling 01243 64 22 22, for those who don't have access to the internet.

Members of the public who are reporting incidents must remember, where possible, the registration number of the vehicle, the make, model and the colour, so the police can identify the vehicle concerned and make contact with the offender.

Every report received through Operation Crackdown is viewed and a decision is made against a set criteria on how best to deal with it. In the majority of cases a letter of advice is sent to the driver or rider, but a report to Operation Crackdown can also lead to arrest and possible conviction, depending on the seriousness of the offence".

High Speed Broadband - the next stages

Please register your interest with the <u>www.goesussex.co.uk</u> website NOW for this important upgrade to broadband service.

The struggle for better rural broadband moves on, but we need your help. Most villages are "under evaluation" for funding from the deal signed on 31 May 2013 between ESCC and BT Openreach.

This means our rural areas have officially changed status. Until recently all exchanges apart from Uckfield were listed as "NC" - ie not currently in any rollout plans for faster service.

Now most of us - Framfield/Blackboys, Buxted, Horam, Halland, according to Openreach, are being "evaluated as part of a government funded program", namely the deal signed on 31 May 2013 between ESCC and BT Openreach.

The next step for Framfield and Blackboys and other villages is to get onto the www.goesussex.co.uk site and register your interest – there's no commitment to buy at this stage but please say "YES we are interested" and add to the numbers which will be taken into account as part of the Evaluation of these other exchanges. Don't be left out of the allocation through lack of interest!!

We also have two definite future exchanges "FE" which are Hadlow Down and Heathfield which, according to Openreach, will be "Operational by end of 2014 With dates to be confirmed nearer the time".
