So, what exactly is the Church?

In the last edition of the Parish Magazine we were living in expectation that the Church renovation project would be finished in time for Christmas. As many of you are aware it was completed to time and budget and reopened on Sunday 8th December and it looks absolutely fantastic! The quality of the workmanship is first class and feedback from the community and visitors over the Christmas period has been really positive. It only seems like yesterday that fundraising for the £70,000 project started. In fact it was the 25th March 2012, but by the beginning of December 2013 all the funds had been raised which is an excellent achievement especially in the current financial climate. The Friends of Framfield Church and the church family are very grateful to everyone who contributed financially and by giving their time and talents in order to get the job successfully completed. However, the renovation project is not for the specific benefit of select groups as the Church only really exists for the service of all within the community and further afield.

Some may ask, what exactly was the point in raising and spending a significant amount of money on a building that promotes a declining religion? It is a valid question, but in reality religion or what we have come to understand as religion has been in decline since the time of Christ, 2000 years ago.

In essence religious practice that we are often presented with either through the media or general misunderstanding has a justifiably bad name. Religion is often associated with intolerance, rules, hardnosed judgement, fanaticism and dictatorial practices. If that was what the church was all about quite frankly I for one wouldn't want to be a part of it! But there is a world of difference between religion and faith in God and where the church fits into this. Simply put, religion is man's attempt to get to God or to hopefully win God's favour particularly in the light that none of us live forever and that at the end of our earthy days we would rather go to heaven than hell. In reality there are very few people who really believe that at the end of our lives they just cease to exist. The Bible tells us that 'God has set eternity in the hearts of men' and as such there is an inner longing that at the end it will all work out ok. Fine in theory except for the fact that we are all sinful human beings. To be in God's presence in heaven requires us to be sinless and no matter how

hard we try to live good lives, do good deeds and keep the rules as we understand them we will never measure up. This is religion at its best and worst but in the final analysis none of us will get to heaven on our own merits or adherence to religious practices!

The beauty of God's plan fulfilled in Christ is centred on the crucifixion of Christ. Jesus never to earth to start another religion, he came to die; but His death was a substitution sacrifice. The sinless Christ dies in the place of you and I, our sins transferred onto Christ and dealt with once and for all. If we can accept what Christ has done for us and most importantly accept it by faith alone then you are almost there! When Jesus is asked by the religious Jews 'What must we do to do the works God requires?' Jesus answered, 'The work of God is this: to believe in the one he has sent.' (John 6:28-29). Have you noticed how much 'work' you have to do to maintain a religious lifestyle? Again Jesus is asked by an individual "What must I do to inherit eternal life"; Jesus' reply: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind" and, "Love your neighbour as yourself." (Luke 10:25,29) i.e. acknowledge and put God first and adopt a lifestyle that has love at its core. That last statement however can be a hard one to fulfil. In today's society many feel unloved or have never really experienced real love so how can they love as a lifestyle? Ask a few friends to give you the definition of what love actually is and you may be surprised at the variety of answers. All I can say is that if you are someone who has not been loved then first base is to allow God to love you. That may sound a bit scary but nevertheless ask God that you may experience His love and see what happens, for too experience the love of God is a life changing event that will envelope you and melt your heart.

As mentioned earlier religion has been in decline for 2000 years but in its place faith in Christ and the gospel of grace came into being and with it adoption into God's family, and God's family is the Church.

I would personally like to thank everyone who has contributed to renovating Framfield Church or should we more accurately call it the Family Home? As God operates by an adoption policy for everyone who would believe then the door is always open and you will always find a warm welcome from other members of the family.

Please note that the Service 318 schooldays only journeys between Heathfield and Ringmer Community College will continue to be operated by Renown. The morning journey will, with effect from the beginning of January, depart Heathfield 16 minutes earlier to improve punctuality.

The enquiries we have made so far with transport providers to replace the Mondays to Fridays service 54 journey from Nevill Road, Uckfield to Uckfield Bus Station at 09:05, indicate that it will not be possible to divert an existing bus service. It is therefore unlikely that this journey will be replaced. The next service 54 departs at 10:33.

Whilst the County Council investigates possible alternative links on service 355 (including taxibus facilities), Battle Area Community Transport will in January extend services to provide some journeys between Netherfield and Battle. These will provide a facility to visit Battle on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. On Mondays and Wednesdays these journeys will also serve Sainsbury's in St Leonards.

We hope you will appreciate that organising these new arrangements has added considerably to our work-load. This does make it difficult for us to be available to callers and to respond personally to individual concerns which are being raised by those who use these bus services. Our aim is, of course, to try to minimise the impact on service users of any changes. We expect to be able to announce the new arrangements in mid-December.

BUS SERVICE REVISION - SERVICE 31

From East Sussex County Council 25.11.2013:

At the end of October we wrote to many of those on our distribution list for bus service information to say that Renown Transport Services had given notice on the contracts with East Sussex County Council to provide the following Rider bus services:

7/27/29: Hastings town services

54: Manor Park Estate – Uckfield Bus Station (09:05 journey only)

317: Heathfield town service

318: Uckfield – Framfield – Blackboys - Heathfield – Broad Oak – Burwash – Etchingham -

Hurst Green

355: Heathfield - Cade Street - Punnett's Town - Rushlake Green - Three Cups Corner -

Brightling - Netherfield - Battle

Renown Travel Services has now informed us they will also be withdrawing two of their commercial services, from 5th January 2014:

95: Little Common (Cowdray Park) – Bexhill – Sidley – Ninfield – Catsfield – Battle – Conquest Hospital – St Leonards Sainsbury's. This is the removal of their Mondays to Fridays service as service 95 on Saturdays already runs under contract to the County Council.

320: Upper Barnhorn - Little Common – Cooden – Bexhill High School – Ninfield – Ashburnham – Claverham Community College schooldays service.

As a result of our previous letter, a number of individuals and organisations have already made their views known to the County Council about the importance of public transport to their communities. I can confirm that following the latest decision by Renown, the County Council is now pursuing ways to replace all the above services. The costs of providing these replacement services will have to be affordable within the limits of our current budget, so it may be that the new services are not as comprehensive as those that they replace.

In efforts to provide replacement services, the County Council has been helped by a decision by theSussexBus.com to provide a service between Uckfield and Heathfield on Mondays to Fridays on a commercial basis. This will be to an hourly frequency as an extension to Service 31, which currently runs between Uckfield and Haywards Heath. Their new timetable is on the SussexBus website at: http://www.thesussexbus.com/pdfs/service-31.pdf?v=6 and on the Parish Council website: http://www.framfieldcouncil.org.uk/31%20Sussexbus.pdf and will commence operation on 30 December. As a result of this development the County Council is seeking prices for a replacement to Service 318 between Heathfield and Hurst

You will now find it easier to report incidents of anti-social driving in Sussex. Sussex Police has re-launched Operation Crackdown - a system that enables anyone to report anti-social driving and abandoned vehicles, either online or by phone.

Anti-social driving can be driving that is careless, deliberately aggressive or dangerous. If you see this type of behaviour it is important that you report it, so it can be dealt with in the most appropriate way.

Operation Crackdown is a joint initiative supported by Sussex Safer Roads Partnership (SSRP), Sussex Police and all local authorities in the county. It was first launched in 2002 as a way of reporting abandoned vehicles in Sussex, and was expanded in 2007 to cover anti-social driving reports.

The system for reporting anti-social driving has now been made simpler, to encourage members of the public to easily and quickly report this type of incident and users can now keep track of the progress of their case with a specific reference number provided.

Incidents can be reported, either via:

www.operationcrackdown.org, or by calling 01243 64 22 22, for those who don't have access to the internet.

Members of the public who are reporting incidents must remember, where possible, the registration number of the vehicle, the make, model and the colour, so the police can identify the vehicle concerned and make contact with the offender.

Every report received through Operation Crackdown is viewed and a decision is made against set criteria on how best to deal with it. In the majority of cases a letter of advice is sent to the driver or rider, but a report to Operation Crackdown can also lead to arrest and possible conviction, depending on the seriousness of the offence".

Nature Notes

We are experiencing a rather mild January this year. This is thanks to the tropical air whisking across the north Atlantic Ocean and picking up a great deal of moisture on its way. This moisture is being dropped on the British Isles making us all feel rather damp.

This offshore group of islands sticks out into the Atlantic Ocean protecting countries such as Holland, Denmark, Sweden and Norway from the full force of Atlantic winds and tidal surges. There are advantages and disadvantages to this. The advantages include good irrigation and generally mild weather that rarely gets too hot or cold. The disadvantages include the potential for floods and wind damage. In short we have a Maritime Temperate Climate, which has served us well in the past and generated a successful seafaring nation with fertile farms. No-one in this land is more than about 70 miles from the coast.

However, our close neighbours on the continent have a Continental Climate, and because of the enormity of the land mass from France to China, the sea has little influence on it. The consequence of this is that less moisture and wind get into the interior. This leads to greater heating in the summer with temperatures in some areas approaching 50^{0} Celsius and cooling in the winter, when the planet tilts Eurasia away from the sun and temperatures in some places drop to -50^{0} Celsius in the winter. Sometimes, the wind changes, and the continent has a greater influence on us than the ocean. When this happens we get a temporary heat wave in the summer or a rather cold spell in the winter as we did last year, and this carried on until well into April, during which the temperature did not exceed 6^{0} Celsius for several weeks.

All this influences our wildlife, and we have a biodiversity that is unique. Seabirds and other wetland birds love the British Isles, and millions come to our shores and wetlands for the winter to escape the ice, which is one reason why an airport in the Thames Estuary would be a bad idea as the risk of bird-strikes would make low level flying there rather dangerous. The mild often damp summers mean that we have plenty of insects which attracts insectivorous birds such as swifts and swallows from Africa to come to our islands to breed. In short, in general, we have a rather interesting green and pleasant land!

Woods Mill Pond is Back! By Mike Russell of the Sussex Wildlife Trust

Through the whole of last year the pond at Woods Mill, the headquarters of the Sussex Wildlife Trust, lacked a certain essential ingredient....water! Visitors to the reserve were surprised and disappointed as a dry arid former wetland came into view where a shimmering pond used to be and a number of disgruntled comments came our way.

We did do a lot of pre-publicity about why we drained the pond and once the reasons were explained many people understood but others remained disgruntled and no amount of explanation would pacify them, we had ruined the place! Well, I'm now pleased to announce that the pond at Woods Mill is now back to its former glory and contains that essential ingredient of water again; in fact it is looking a whole lot better than before as it no longer contains an un-essential ingredient, fish!

The pond had been stocked with fish way back in the late 1940s and was used for mainly carp fishing up to 1966 when the Trust acquired Woods Mill. Since then the carp population grew and grew until there was room for very little else so we finally decided to bite the bullet, drain the pond and remove the fish.

Now, one of the highlights for many people visiting the reserve was to come armed with loaves to feed the fish so one area of the pond became like a liquid bread pudding and the carp got more numerous, bigger and more demanding, leaving the pond largely devoid of any other wildlife.

Carp, for that is what they mainly were, are a non-native species and have been here since the Middle Ages. They are bottom feeding fish that can grow very big, they hoover up much of the vegetation and any invertebrate life attached to it and take great delight in stirring up the mud at the bottom, leaving a muddy, murky vegetation sparse pond. In the past, the Trust has drained the pond down to the silt level but, amazingly, for such big fish, many managed to survive until the pond refilled, so this time the decision was made to bake it dry over the summer to ensure that nothing survived.

Last autumn, when the rains came, it slowly started to fill up. The muddy margins immediately attracted some birds and often a green sandpiper and a grey wagtail were seen picking off insects at the edges and by the end of the successful performance of Camel Hot. This was an alternative version of the Christmas story performed alongside several other schools in the Big Sing at the Congress Theatre in Eastbourne.

After much preparation and rehearsal all the children participated in "The Stars Come Out For Christmas". This gave all the children a chance to perform as well as remembering the true story of the first Christmas.

A huge thanks to all members of the local community for supporting all our events including the PTFA Bazaar. Thanks must also go to our PTFA for providing such an excellent party and contributing towards the cost of the pantomime Aladdin which was enjoyed by us all. They all work so hard and help us with providing all these wonderful enriching extras for our pupils.

This term has started well with the children learning about their new topics, ranging from the frozen cold, Ancient Egypt and India. If you have been fortunate enough to visit any of these places and could share your experiences with the children please do contact the school office.

We will, of course, be monitoring the growth to see what colonises the water and, as well as the much increased number of aquatic plants and insects, we hope to see a lot more amphibians as well and undoubtedly small native fish like sticklebacks and minnows will find their way in.

We have even managed to win over some of our detractors who have been back and seen the pond and now understand why we went through this process. However, we might still have one unhappy visitor should he come back next summer, the osprey that visited us in 2012 that I think helped himself to one or two of our carp!

FRAMFIELD PARISH COUNCIL - REPORT

The Parish Council wishes everyone a happy New Year.

I thought I would give you an update on the borrowing approval/loan to enable the Council to update the three Parish Play areas.

I am still waiting on a Government decision as to whether parish councils are to be capped this year and the possible need for a referendum. By the time you read this article we should have a clearer idea and the Parish Council will have agreed to push ahead for a loan or not.

As mentioned previously a loan is available through the Public Works Loan Board (PWLB). This mechanism has been used before by the Council and indeed is used by many other local authorities across the country.

Three quotes for the works have been obtained and the most suitable will be chosen. The amount of money required will be based on the scaled cost for the complete refurbishment of Framfield play area (the oldest and in need of most attention and serving the most residents) and partial refurbishments of Blackboys (which already has a more modern set of swings) and Palehouse Common (which serves fewer residents). The total monies required will then be calculated over the period of repayment (preferably 25 years) including interest accrued, and the amount of extra council tax this will cost each household annually – this now only looks like to be less than £10.00 a year, less than 25p per week and might in fact still be significantly less.

Play area equipment is now so prohibitively expensive, the Parish Council will not be able to sustain any of the sites much longer without the facility of a loan and they will have to sadly be decommissioned.

The Framfield Playground Action Group (FPAG) are also continuing to raise funds to buy any little extras to help enhance the refurbishment of Framfield play area so they should be thanked for their efforts on behalf of the people of Framfield.
