#### **Understanding Easter**

Writing the Easter message is one of the most challenging ones to write. In essence my thought processes are basically - what can I write about Easter that you haven't read before; the danger that with the familiar you may not get past the first few lines! Secondly, could I write something that everyone can engage with, that hopefully will leave a deposit in your hearts so that you can think it through and come to a reasoned decision as to whether you could accept Christ or not?

In my experience in this fast paced world in which we live we spend precious little time to think about things that really matter. I don't know about you but whenever I make a quick decision it is usually a wrong one. In the end it either costs me financially or emotionally or perhaps both. I have certainly discovered over the years that I have accumulated a vast amount of emotional baggage. Some due to my own shortcomings, ignorance or poor decisions, some due to outside pressures that have been put upon me. All of you reading this will have similar stories. The things you wish you had never done or the things that were done to you or the situations you found yourselves in that were neither wholesome nor healthy.

As life goes on how many of us wish we could just start again? Given the choice would you have worked harder in school; chosen a different career; married a different person or lived in another place etc - the list can be a long one, but it can be very hard to live with regret for what might have been. Hindsight can be a wonderful thing but it can also be a curse.

The majority of us are familiar with the story of Adam and Eve and that fateful day in the Garden of Eden when they ate the forbidden fruit. God had given them everything but the one thing they were told not to touch they did. Giving into temptation can have serious consequences. Despite God warning them that if they did 'they would surely die' it was not sufficient to keep them from finding out. It was not logical to the mind of Adam and Eve that eating fruit would cause them to die because they didn't yet understand that God meant spiritual death, not physical death. This was the point that sin entered the world. Man going his own way, making his own decisions and disregarding godly counsel. Ultimately, everyone since the time of Adam has been tainted with Adam's folly and continues to pay the price for being separated from the life of God. Life was not meant to be difficult or stressful. Life was to be enjoyed and celebrated, hand in hand with our Creator. Unfortunately, there was nothing that man could do to put right Adam's folly. Plenty have tried and continue to try through good works or religious observance. There may be a 'feel good' factor in this but it is no more effective than attempting to bail out the sinking Titanic with a saucepan. The logical question needs to be asked how can the spiritually dead be brought back to life?

The dead cannot help the dead so another way must be sought. It is only in the loving kindness and mercy of God that the seemingly impossible is made possible and this is the point of Easter. The original sin of Adam has to be forgiven and in effect 'paid for' or redeemed, so that humanity can reconnect to the life of God. Additionally, our own individual sin, that we are justifiably responsible for also needs to be atoned for or as St Paul states 'all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God'(Romans 3:23).

In scripture Jesus is contrasted with Adam - Don Stewart puts it like this:-

Adam, the first human, was created perfect from the dust of the ground. But Adam disobeyed and brought sin into the world. Jesus is the "last Adam" in the sense that He was the last man who did not have a sin nature. Although He was like Adam in that He did not have a sin nature He was different from Adam in that Jesus was from heaven. Consequently Jesus (the God-man) was able to offer himself as the sinless sacrifice for the sins of the world.

Perhaps we can now come to see and appreciate how much God loves the human race which he created for himself and the love that He has for each one of us. St John puts it like this:- 'For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life. (John 3:16). Who else would allow themselves to go through the horror of crucifixion if it were not an act of pure love? There never was a 'Plan B' in God's economy - only a pure sacrifice would be acceptable and in this respect logic dictates that only God in his purity and self-sacrifice could get the job done.

The first Easter is associated with the symbol of the cross. It was the place of execution for Jesus but whenever I see it also reminds me of cross-roads. When we are driving around and arrive at a cross-roads we have to decide on which road we are going to take. Metaphorically, are we going to keep travelling in the save old direction or are we going to take a new road and see where that leads?

The fallacy of the human heart is that it likes to cling to the familiar. I've known men and women who have continued to live in abusive relationships because, bad though it is, it's familiar to them and in a weird way acceptable - you know what you are going to get! There is a fear that if you leave, you may get into a situation that is worse than your previous one. However, with God He always brings you to a place that is much better. If you allow Him too, He will heal the past and give you a fruitful future above and beyond your expectations. Reconnecting with God is not a 'leap in the dark' sort of faith but a reasonable step based on solid evidence. So my question is - this Easter are you willing to take a small risk and allow God into your life? True love really is there for the asking!

You will now find it easier to report incidents of anti-social driving in Sussex. Sussex Police has re-launched Operation Crackdown - a system that enables anyone to report anti-social driving and abandoned vehicles, either online or by phone.

Anti-social driving can be driving that is careless, deliberately aggressive or dangerous. If you see this type of behaviour it is important that you report it, so it can be dealt with in the most appropriate way.

Operation Crackdown is a joint initiative supported by Sussex Safer Roads Partnership (SSRP), Sussex Police and all local authorities in the county. It was first launched in 2002 as a way of reporting abandoned vehicles in Sussex, and was expanded in 2007 to cover anti-social driving reports.

The system for reporting anti-social driving has now been made simpler, to encourage members of the public to easily and quickly report this type of incident and users can now keep track of the progress of their case with a specific reference number provided.

Incidents can be reported, either via:

www.operationcrackdown.org, or by calling 01243 64 22 22, for those who don't have access to the internet.

Members of the public who are reporting incidents must remember, where possible, the registration number of the vehicle, the make, model and the colour, so the police can identify the vehicle concerned and make contact with the offender.

Every report received through Operation Crackdown is viewed and a decision is made against set criteria on how best to deal with it. In the majority of cases a letter of advice is sent to the driver or rider, but a report to Operation Crackdown can also lead to arrest and possible conviction, depending on the seriousness of the offence".

# **Nature Notes**

What a contrast with last winter! In 2012/13 we had snow, ice and cold winds. In 2013/14 we had rain, rain and more rain accompanied by strong mild SW winds and hardly any frosts. Now we are getting temperatures of 18<sup>o</sup>C and more, when last year the temperature did not rise above 6<sup>o</sup>C until well into April.

I am seeing brimstone butterflies almost every day now; the male is bright sulphur yellow, and the female much paler and almost white. Their caterpillar food plants include buckthorn, spindle and privet. Another early butterfly that I am looking out for is orange tip. Again, it is the male that lives up to its name and has orange tips on its wings; the female has just black edges to its forewings. Both males and females have greenish speckled hind-wings. The food plant of this butterfly is ladies smock, also known as milkmaids. This is the lovely purple crucifer (cress) related to watercress. This flower is just appearing now, and is common in wet ground, indeed it is a sign of water underground such as a spring or drainage system. I am also frequently seeing peacock and tortoiseshell butterflies. These two species have caterpillars that feed on stinging nettles, and are two further harbingers of the reawakening of nature that is happening right now (mid-March).

Spring is turning out about as good as it could be at present, with long periods of blue sky and warming sun stretching each day a little longer, about half an hour per week. 21<sup>st</sup> March is the spring equinox when day equals night everywhere on the planet. Suddenly, our resident dawn chorus of blackbird, robin, songthrush, chaffinch, wren, dunnock, blue tit, great tit, coal tit, skylark, green and great-spotted woodpeckers, carrion crow and woodpigeon birdsong will be augmented by our summer visitors from warmer climes, such as chiffchaff, willow warbler, blackcap, whitethroat, swallow, garden warbler, nightingale and cuckoo. In May the swifts will arrive, and these aerobatic aviators will be swooping around the houses of Uckfield screaming as they go. I had a report today (March 16<sup>th</sup>) of a probable juvenile red kite in the Framfield area, so please keep an eye out for that. This enigmatic and large raptor is not actually red, but mainly brown with a rufus tail in the adult. Juveniles are paler buff coloured, and tend to roam in first year.

In the Spring of 2012 we made a personal appeal to the residents of Framfield, Blackboys and Palehouse Common, requesting your support for the Framfield Church Restoration Appeal.

So, on behalf of The Friends of Framfield Church, we would like to say a huge thank you for all your gifts, which have helped us turn a very ambitious project into reality.

Our renovated parish church is now a bright, welcoming place for services, concerts and community events over the coming years. But, just as importantly, the restoration also means that this historic building at the heart of our community can be handed on in good order for future generations to use and enjoy.

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# Homage to the Volunteer by Mike Russell of the Sussex Wildlife Trust

A much anticipated package arrived at Woods Mill for me the other week, something I have been eagerly anticipating since 2007 in fact. It was a book; *The Birds of Sussex* produced by the Sussex Ornithological Society (SOS) and is the result of four years surveying birds in Sussex. The surveying was carried out by hundreds of volunteers in the County, and I'm very proud to say that I made my own tiny contribution to this fabulous and informative book.

In fact, this mighty tome is just part of the UK Bird Atlas 2007-2011 a complete survey of the birds of this country and Ireland organised by the British Trust for Ornithology (BTO). This four year survey involved collating, interpreting and then producing a definitive Atlas for the birds of the UK at the present time. A staggering one hundred million plus individual records were submitted from over 40,000 volunteers to provide such a complete picture of our avifauna.

So this article pays homage to the wonderful contribution that volunteers play in the conservation of wildlife in Britain, not just with this project but right across the environmental movement. It is this volunteer involvement that underpins the whole of conservation in the UK and really sets us apart from most other countries in the world when it comes to the preservation of our wildlife. All the major conservation organisations in Britain began as volunteer groups and while they have all grown enormously during their lifetime, volunteering is still fundamental to all of them. There is now also a strong professional conservation input but this enables even more voluntary effort to be coordinated in the fight to conserve our precious wildlife. The Sussex Wildlife Trust is still very much a partnership of professional staff and volunteers with over 500 volunteers contributing to the work that we do throughout Sussex.

Back to the *Birds of Sussex* and the SOS. This is an entirely volunteer based project and publication, from the hundreds of people going out and surveying their 'patch' and then submitting their individual records,

#### **CHRISTIAN AID WEEK**

to the people inputting that data, interpreting its meanings, comparing it with information from previous surveys and then producing the maps and text to provide a very informative and meaningful summary of each species recorded in Sussex. In addition, there are also chapters on habitat and landscape, climate change, migration and ringing records and conservation of birds throughout the County. The book has been co-ordinated by a dedicated band of SOS members, and then drawn together superbly by the editor, Adrian Thomas.

It is a book with a much wider appeal than just to birdwatchers. The individual style of the authors and the clear presentation of the information make it very readable, though it is one to dip into rather than read from cover to cover. Just before the book goes into the summary for each individual species, there is a chapter highlighting the winners and losers regarding birds in the county. Not surprisingly, the science confirms the declining species that many of us were aware of, tree sparrow, lesser spotted woodpecker, turtle dove and willow tit that looks to be extinct in Sussex now. To balance things out though, we have gained little egret, marsh harrier, siskin and Mediterranean gull in the last 30 years.

## LIVING WITH FUR AND FEATHER

#### KEEP FIT FOR THE OVER SEVENTIES

If you want to be fit, flexible and slim in your mature years, I know the answer. There is no need to go to the gym, or slimming club. You do not have to attempt complicated exercises to music at the local fitness class, which are demoralising and embarrassing.

There are just a few requirements. Ideally you need to live somewhere hilly, surrounded by mud, soggy fields and wild woodland. The most important piece of equipment is a very large hairy dog, I can recommend a Newfoundland. This canine coach will demand that exercise is taken every day whatever the weather. With clubs there is always the temptation to sneak off to devour a cream cake and coffee instead of going to the keep fit class.

To those of you who are considering this new beneficial activity I will give you an idea of how I keep fit. The day starts with a healthy walk, puffing up hills and across the fields. Having ones feet sucked down into the mud at every step, I am sure, helps the leg muscles. Deep snow has the same effect. Ice helps with balancing skills as you slip and slide precariously down the hill. Just walking is obviously not enough, so I do some stretching and bending, climbing stiles and gates and crawling under barbed wire fences. One of my favourite places is a fence where I have to lie on my back and slide underneath. I sometimes wonder what will happen if I get my coat caught and find myself trapped, unable to move.

The local woodland provides an excellent assault course where I have to scramble over or under tree trunks and avoid boggy patches. # Changes to the concessionary bus pass scheme Effective from 1 April 2014

On 10 December 2013 East Sussex County Council's cabinet voted to press ahead with a series of changes aimed at reducing the authority's transport budget over the next three years. This includes changing the start time at which concessionary bus pass holders can use their pass on weekdays. From 1 April 2014 this will move from 9am to 9.30am, in line with national rules. A concession which allows concessionary pass holders in Lewes district to travel for free on dial-a-ride services, a legacy of former district funding, will also be removed, bringing Lewes into line with the rest of the county.

The entitlement to free travel for elderly and disabled residents is set by the Concessionary Bus Travel Act 2007 ('CBTA'). The CBTA defines the minimum travel concession that must be provided, although local authorities may offer concessions beyond the minimum if they wish. The national standard concession enables journeys to be started between 9.30am and 11pm on normal weekdays and at any time at weekends or on public holidays, between places in England and on eligible services. Most local transport authorities use the 9.30am national standard start time; however the practice in East Sussex has been to permit free travel from 9am. Moving the start time to 9.30am brings practice in East Sussex in line with our neighbouring authorities of Kent and West Sussex.

As you may be aware, the County Council has already seen a £31 million reduction in funding since April 2010 and is facing a further £78.5 million reduction over the next three financial years. The scale of this financial challenge means that the County Council needs to do things differently and become more tightly focused on our priorities. The decision to change the start time from 9am to 9.30am has not been taken lightly and has been consulted on twice in the last 3 years; between November 2010 and January 2011 and again in July and August 2013.

As part of the latest consultation in 2013 we asked respondents to tell us about the impact a change to the start time would have on their lives. Respondents told us that they were more concerned that the bus services were still available to them rather than that they started half an hour later and that they would be prepared to pay a contribution towards the fares.

#### FRAMFIELD PARISH COUNCIL - REPORT

#### **PLAY AREAS**

In January Councillors set the budget and precept for 2014/15. This took into account the increase necessary to pay back the loan required to refurbish the three play areas. Borrowing approval has been granted by the DCLG.

Detailed below is the budget required to cover a loan of £80,000 with a payback period of 20 years. The Parish Council agreed a precept of £50,198. This equates to an increase to a Band D Council tax payer of £6.80 per year far less than originally anticipated.

Wicksteed have an excellent reputation and I have worked with them before. If all goes according to plan, we could have the play areas complete by the summer – this will be weather dependent of course. All the details and illustrations of the proposals are on our website.

#### FRAMFIELD MEMORIAL HALL CAR PARK

The Council has received many complaints about non-users of the Hall parking their cars in the car park. This is not a public car park and only for those using the Hall. Please don't put people off using the Hall because of lack of parking space.

#### Wealden District Council - DELIVERY AND SITE ALLOCATIONS PLAN

At the February PC meeting Planning Policy Officers from WDC gave a presentation on the next phase of the Local Plan. A general overview of the work to be carried out was discussed and most importantly what the implications for Framfield Parish will be. Countryside policies prevail over all areas of the Parish, although this involves business policies, protection of community facilities, potential gypsy and traveller provision, tourism policies, renewal energy provision and relevant infrastructure to name but a few. One of the main items for Framfield is a review of the Framfield Conservation Area and potential identification of any other areas in the Parish which may be included under this bracket – houses/areas of historical interest etc. If anyone would like to get involved in this work please let me know.



In 2011 the County Council decided not to make any changes to the 9am concessionary start time. However, changes to the County Council's financial situation have meant that the County Council must now remove this discretionary concession from 1 April 2014. The change to the start time of the concessionary fare scheme means that from 1 April 2014 concessionary pass holders will need to pay for any journeys taken before 9.30am.

In 2012/2013 over 8 million bus journeys were made by concessionary pass holders in East Sussex. The County Council has to reimburse bus operators for the cost of the journeys travelled by concessionary pass holders, at a cost to the County Council of over £7.0m per annum.
