#### Does everyone like a bargain? Trading-up.

Do you like to get something for nothing or perhaps at a significantly reduced price? Personally, I believe we do. Car boot sales are very popular and internet sites such as Ebay or Gumtree thrive on the premise that you will find that special item at a bargain price, and when you do there is a certain 'feel-good' factor that accompanies it.

On the other hand when we are offered something too cheaply we become suspicious, the 'too good to be true' syndrome.

The world we live in has become more consumer orientated year-on-year and there is a strong connection between what you possess, your status and self-esteem as a human being. Our possessions are like advertisement boards that tell the world about who we are. The person who advances in their career will seldom be content to live in the same house once they can afford a bigger one. The person who drives the modest car will almost always be looking to trade-up to a model that tells their friends and neighbours that they are successful.

The problem with increasing affluence and consumerism is that it detaches us from reality and the things that are really important. Whatever you have in this life only lasts for this life, none of us will be taking anything with us when we die. In Mark's Gospel - Chapter 10 Jesus meets a rich young man who is looking to 'trade-up'. Despite being wealthy he does have the foresight to consider life after death so he asks Jesus the question 'Good teacher,' he asked, 'what good thing must I do to inherit eternal life?' <sup>18</sup> 'Why do you call me good?' Jesus answered. 'No one is good – except God alone. <sup>19</sup> You know the commandments: "You shall not murder, you shall not commit adultery, you shall not steal, you shall not give false testimony, you shall not defraud, honour your father and mother."

<sup>20</sup> 'Teacher,' he declared, 'all these I have kept since I was a boy.'

So what is going on here? Firstly I need to make it clear that there is absolutely nothing wrong with being wealthy (this just happened to be this young man's

Achilles heel). It's our attitude and actions with regard to wealth that matters. I personally have a number of wealthy friends who are amazingly kind, modest, and generous individuals. However, it is unfortunate that wealth can corrupt or at the least be seen as an attempt to buy your way out of any situation in this life, in a nutshell - self sufficiency with no room for God.

The young man in Mark's account is clearly religious - he has some knowledge of God and lives his life following the commandments. He refers to Jesus as Teacher but fails to see the divine (God) in the man who standing in front of him!

As C.S. Lewis made clear, Jesus is either a liar, a lunatic, or the Lord. He cannot be only another teacher.

He is also unaware of his own failings - he claims to have kept the commandments but in reality like the young man we all fall short or as St John says 'If we say we have no sin the truth is not in us'.

He also misunderstands the plan of grace when he says to Jesus "What good thing must I do to inherit eternal life?" There is no good thing any of us can do to buy God's favour. Only to simply believe in Jesus Christ as Saviour. As wealthy as he must have been, he was spiritually bankrupt, and terribly poor of faith.

Finally, and this is perhaps his biggest mistake: He went away.

To quote Chris Green - A man can misunderstand the divinity of Christ, be blind to himself, and misunderstand God's grace and still be saved if he will commit to staying with God. Peter, Andrew, John, Matthew, and the other disciples did not fully understand the Lordship of Jesus, and they certainly did not fully understand the plan of grace, but they stayed with Jesus. They apprenticed themselves to Him, for the long haul. That is the way to be saved. If you are willing to launch out with Christ on the long journey from brokenness to wholeness, if you are willing to walk all the way, every step, however difficult that may be then you are indeed a wise person, even if you are not young or wealthy.

The inheritance of eternal life is a pure act of God's grace, it is a gift and as such is totally free of any charge, an absolute bargain, but it cost Jesus everything! So it begs the question: Do you want to trade-up to eternal life and receive the biggest bargain of your lifetime?

I hope everyone in the parish has a great summer –

You will now find it easier to report incidents of anti-social driving in Sussex. Sussex Police has re-launched Operation Crackdown - a system that enables anyone to report anti-social driving and abandoned vehicles, either online or by phone.

Anti-social driving can be driving that is careless, deliberately aggressive or dangerous. If you see this type of behaviour it is important that you report it, so it can be dealt with in the most appropriate way.

Operation Crackdown is a joint initiative supported by Sussex Safer Roads Partnership (SSRP), Sussex Police and all local authorities in the county. It was first launched in 2002 as a way of reporting abandoned vehicles in Sussex, and was expanded in 2007 to cover anti-social driving reports.


The system for reporting anti-social driving has now been made simpler, to encourage members of the public to easily and quickly report this type of incident and users can now keep track of the progress of their case with a specific reference number provided.

Incidents can be reported, either via:

www.operationcrackdown.org, or by calling 01243 64 22 22, for those who don't have access to the internet.

Members of the public who are reporting incidents must remember, where possible, the registration number of the vehicle, the make, model and the colour, so the police can identify the vehicle concerned and make contact with the offender.

Every report received through Operation Crackdown is viewed and a decision is made against set criteria on how best to deal with it. In the majority of cases a letter of advice is sent to the driver or rider, but a report to Operation Crackdown can also lead to arrest and possible conviction, depending on the seriousness of the offence".



#### **Nature Notes**

July has brought hot weather and thunder-storms. How great for nature that it is getting both warmth and moisture to make things grow. However, the heat seems to be outgunning the rain, and many streams have stopped flowing, and we are still having to water parts of our garden. If you have a bird bath, please remember to top it up, as lack of water in the summer is one of the most potent killers of birds and other wildlife.

The butterflies continue to be a treat, and it looks like being a great year for them. The honeybees also seem to be doing well, with bee keepers being able to extract copious amounts of honey from their hives. Bumblebees also seem to be doing well. Their life-cycle is rather different from honeybees, and generally gets completed by the end of August. The queens then go looking for places to spend the winter before starting their new nests in the following spring.

The ants went on their nuptial flights during mid to late July. This normally happens when the air is hot and humid. The males and queens fly up towards the sun, mate, the males die and the queens land, bite off their wings and seek a place to start a new colony. The black ants (*Lasius niger*) particularly like nesting under paving stones. The small yellow meadow ant (*Lasius flavus*) prefers to nest in the ground under long grass, and build a tussock. It often lives with a tiny white relative of the woodlouse called *Platyarthrus hoffmannseggii* which wanders the tunnels that the ants make and cleans up any detritus material in the nest.

Lammas (or loaf mass) is the 1<sup>st</sup> August. This is the Celtic harvest festival. Look out for Lammas growth in the trees, especially oak, ash, beech, sycamore, yew, scots pine, and hawthorn. This is a second flush of leaves that the tree produces to compensate for the loss of leaves due to them being eaten by caterpillars or damaged in other ways during June and July. It does not occur in poplar, birch and willow. The old leaves become rich in tannins which makes the leaves bitter and inedible. The new flush is usually too late for the insects. The tannin is also passed to the bark of the oak tree to prevent damage there, but is used by people to tan (preserve) hide to make leather.

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## The Great Starling Spectacular By Mike Russell, Senior Wildlife Advisor at the Sussex Wildlife Trust

They are noisy, argumentative, some would say they are gaudy in their appearance and all over the UK, people stop and admire the fantastic aerial display of thousands and thousands of them as they flock together at dusk before heading for a favourite roosting site. We are of course talking about starlings.

It is hard to believe that ornithologists and conservationists are so worried about the decline in starling numbers that the British Trust for Ornithology has moved it up to the red list as a UK Species of Conservation concern, which means that the population has decreased by more than 50% across the country. It is still a very common bird, but if this rate of decline continues then it very soon won't be.

This loss is more evident in the south and west of the UK, while numbers seem to be stable in Scotland and are even increasing in Northern Ireland. The reasons for this decline are not yet fully understood, one of the possibilities being that the mortality rate amongst the fledglings is very high and increasing. This indicates that the parents are unable to find enough food for the youngsters and is a possible cause for the problems for many of our wild birds in the south.

The sight of the dusk aerial show we can observe in places such as Brighton, Eastbourne and Chichester, particularly in winter, is repeated in many areas of the country and to stand and watch is to see a living art display in front of your eyes. You can only marvel at the intricate patterns that they weave in the darkening skies and wonder how on earth tens of thousands of birds can seem to synchronise their movements in a split second. It really is one of the world's great wildlife spectacles. In Brighton, the flock also provides a virtual home delivery service for the resident peregrine falcon that can fly in amongst the flock and select its evening meal.

Starlings seem to delight and annoy people in equal measure. They can monopolise bird tables and feeders either through sheer weight of numbers or by intimidating smaller birds. However, they are fascinating to watch and listen to. A glimpse of sunlight on an adult starling reveals a glorious cascade of patterns and colours and makes them appear almost tropical.

We need to find out why these declines are happening and take measures to halt it. If we are not careful the spectacular Brighton starling show, could soon be nothing but a memory.

#### Framfield Church - Garden of Remembrance

The Garden of Remembrance in Framfield Churchyard is now in need of urgent restoration. A number of years ago work on improving the look of the Garden was undertaken. However in the intervening years the weather and the establishment of an invasive weed known as Mares-tail has made maintenance of the area difficult. The only effective solution to the problem is to completely remove the existing gravel covering, install a membrane to inhibit weed growth along with concrete edging sections and to provide a new stone finish to the area.

#### BUMBLE BEES AND BABY BIRDS.

By the time you read this the flurry of activity in the bird world will be over in our garden. The residents who live here must think they live in bird heaven. All through the spring and summer I watch their behaviour, either through the windows in the kitchen, or as I work in the garden. Watching all the excitement, drama and occasional confrontation is far more interesting than any of the popular soaps. At meal times my patient husband puts up with my constant commentary while I watch the latest development at the feeding stations

In the spring I went down to the cellar and put my head down into the freezer so I could rummage around at the bottom for something for dinner. Suddenly I heard a funny noise, what was it? I looked around, couldn't see anything, so put my head down in the freezer again. 'Tweet'. I straightened up and looked again. Was it the boiler? No the odd sound was not from that. I walked all round peering in the corners and around the old stone walls and the damp brick floor, carefully avoiding tiny leaping frogs, nothing unusual. 'Tweet'. I heard it distinctly this time, it must be a bird. I glanced at the dirty old window and behind the metal grille was a small bundle of feathers and fluff. How did it get there? It was in a very narrow gap between the grille and the window which faced a deep bricked area. Neither the window nor the mesh would open. At one end was a very small gap in the window frame that the baby bird must have squeezed through. As it was impossible to open the window I had to think of another method. The holes in the mesh were very small. Armed with my invention I gently poked them through the gaps, just behind the fledging. I gently nudged it along towards the gap in the frame. Being surprised it smartly jumped back over my obstruction. Starting again I used several bits of cardboard to make a higher barrier. Using this method I very gently moved it along and nudged it out past the window into the area. I was thrilled with my ingenious method of rescuing this baby bird; but then worried in case the parent could not find its offspring, now down in the area, thick with ferns and tangled grass. Eventually I realised it was a blackbird secretly gathering material to make a nest. She had decided to build it in a bush on the side of the patio under the window right by the french doors. #### Framfield Church embarks on second phase of restoration work

Thanks to wonderful support from the parish the major renovation of Framfield Church was completed last December and, after a three-month closure, was re-opened in time for the Christmas services. If you have visited the church over the past few months you will have seen for yourself how the redecoration, new lighting, and restored windows and stonework have enhanced the lovely building.

However, in a 13<sup>th</sup> century church there is always work to do. That's why 'The Friends' are now embarking on a second phase of internal and external works.

A priority task is the repair of damaged plasterwork and the complete redecoration of our fine Gage Chapel. The tower and clergy vestries will also be repainted.

The tower clock is, literally, in for a facelift! The renovated clock will have numerals and hands detailed in gold leaf on a black painted background. Also in the tower, the louvres will be repaired or replaced.

The final task in this second stage of works will be the repainting of all the gutters and downpipes that were not painted during last year's renovation.

The cost of these works will be around £17,000, most of which will be covered by the remaining money in our Restoration Appeal fund. However, we still need to raise some additional funding so, if you would like to support this second stage of renovation, 'The Friends' would be delighted to hear from you.

Lastly, the Council has been running the Framfield Village Market now since the beginning of the year. Most of my family come along to help, along with Gill and Jeff Goggin and Selina Allen from the Council and Peter Friend has taken his turn making the tea. We have gained some new stalls and each time the Hall really looks fabulous. There is one problem – we need customers! The money raised from the Markets goes directly into the fund for the refurbishment of the Hall which not only the School but many other local and non-local people use for clubs, meetings and one-off events.
