#### If all else fails - read the instructions.

Over the past few weeks I have had three instances where I thought I knew how something worked but somehow got it all wrong. It wasn't just a case of familiarity breeds contempt but more a case of forgetting the fundamentals. So the old adage remains true — 'If all else fails read the instructions'! All things happen for a reason and when they come in threes I usually sit up and take notice.

For reasons best known to God I became interested in the Ministry of Healing some twenty years ago shortly after my conversion experience. The pages of the Bible where like flowing water and I soaked up God's word like an overenthusiastic sponge devouring the pages at every opportunity.

I hold the belief that as human beings we all search for absolute truth. Truth is solid ground and on it you can make firm decisions and act accordingly. The Bible is often maligned as being unreliable and therefore untrustworthy because it was written by fallible human being beings like you and I. But I would beg to differ on two counts. Firstly, we read in 2 Timothy 3:16 that

'All scripture is God- breathed' and secondly in Numbers 23:19 we read that

<sup>19</sup> God is not human, that he should lie, not a human being, that he should change his mind. Does he speak and then not act? Does he promise and not fulfil?

Yes the Bible has been written by human beings but they have all been inspired to write by God who is infallible.

Sooner or later in order to find out if something works you have to put your beliefs into practice. Accepting what God says is true is an act of faith, but it is a reasonable step of faith not a blind leap in the dark.

As human beings we all have faith, and need faith, for our daily living. The expectation that a light will go on when you press the switch requires faith that the unseen electricity will make it happen. Sitting on a chair requires faith that the four legs will support your weight, otherwise you may just crash to the floor. There are many other daily examples we could quote that require faith but we accept them as routine as they mostly happen automatically.

Over a period of time the continual cycle of 'cause and effect' affirms our beliefs and reinforces our faith; that's the way we learn to accept the world around us.

But what about faith for the healing of our bodies or our minds? When you read about the many miracles Jesus performed in the Bible are they true or a figment of someone's imagination, designed to dupe the gullible? I hope that by now that you would at least accept them as historical fact.

If you take the Bible at face value and read about Jesus' healing ministry you may well come to the conclusion that if Jesus was indeed God in human form, then performing miracles was easy for him. If He created the universe and everything in it then the miracles he performed must have been a piece of cake!

Once Jesus started performing miracles crowds flocked to him, he met their needs. Word got around very quickly, no NHS is Jesus' time, people had the mentality and basic faith that 'if he did it for you, he will do it for me'; but why did Jesus do it? He was and still is moved by love and compassion to all who were in need. The great news is that nothing has changed. The writer of the letter to the Hebrews (13:8) confirms this when he writes — Jesus Christ is the same, yesterday, today and forever.

Obviously, Jesus isn't physically with us today, so can we have any expectation that God may move miraculously upon us when we become ill or infirm? Well the answer is a resounding 'yes'. It takes faith to make that statement but I and many others within the local and world-wide church have personally experienced the power of God and witnessed God moving in miraculous ways. When it happens time and time again the evidence stacks up and you should be left with only one conclusion; that God does exist and that He hears and answers prayer. God said He would 'watch over his word to perform it' (Jeremiah 1:12) — and praise God He does!

It is unfortunate but as I write there are a good number locally that need some godly intervention in their lives so (whether you are a believer or not) if I may be so bold as to say please get in touch. God can literally do the seemingly impossible in a second you only need to have the courage to ask - **Taste and see that the Lord is good!**

You will now find it easier to report incidents of anti-social driving in Sussex. Sussex Police has re-launched Operation Crackdown - a system that enables anyone to report anti-social driving and abandoned vehicles, either online or by phone.

Anti-social driving can be driving that is careless, deliberately aggressive or dangerous. If you see this type of behaviour it is important that you report it, so it can be dealt with in the most appropriate way.

Operation Crackdown is a joint initiative supported by Sussex Safer Roads Partnership (SSRP), Sussex Police and all local authorities in the county. It was first launched in 2002 as a way of reporting abandoned vehicles in Sussex, and was expanded in 2007 to cover anti-social driving reports.

The system for reporting anti-social driving has now been made simpler, to encourage members of the public to easily and quickly report this type of incident and users can now keep track of the progress of their case with a specific reference number provided.

Incidents can be reported, either via:

www.operationcrackdown.org, or by calling 01243 64 22 22, for those who don't have access to the internet.

Members of the public who are reporting incidents must remember, where possible, the registration number of the vehicle, the make, model and the colour, so the police can identify the vehicle concerned and make contact with the offender.

Every report received through Operation Crackdown is viewed and a decision is made against set criteria on how best to deal with it. In the majority of cases a letter of advice is sent to the driver or rider, but a report to Operation Crackdown can also lead to arrest and possible conviction, depending on the seriousness of the offence".

"OH to be in England now that April's there, and whoever wakes in England sees, some morning, unaware that the lowest boughs and the brushwood sheaf round the elm-tree bole are in tiny leaf, while the chaffinch sings on the orchard bough in England – now!

And after April, when May follows, and the whitethroat builds, and all the swallows! Hark, where my blossom'd pear-tree in the hedge leans to the field and scatters on the clover blossoms and dewdrops – at the bent spray's edge – that's the wise thrush; he sings each song twice over, lest you should think he never could recapture the first fine careless rapture!

And though the fields look rough with hoary dew, all will be gay when noontide wakes anew the buttercups, the little children's dower – far brighter than this gaudy melon flower."

Robert Browning's Home Thoughts, from Abroad captures the essence of spring and early summer in England for which he pines while in Italy in 1845. I presume to say that such words are as true now as they were then, before tarmac and the internal combustion engine were invented. The only flyers were birds, bats and insects then. It is true that humans have changed the world almost beyond recognition since Robert Browning wrote those words 170 years ago. One wonders what the next 170 years will bring? Dutch elm disease reduced England's population of mature elms, but most elms still exist as the disease only kills the above ground mature stems, the roots remain alive and new shoots soon appear to produce elms that rarely grow taller than about 5 metres before they too submit to the disease. However it has recently been deduced that the English elm is probably not native to England at all, but may have been brought here by (ironically) the Romans from Italy about 2000 years ago! The chaffinch, whitethroat swallow and song thrush mentioned by Browning are also native to Italy. The pear tree too, though probably originating in China, spread through Asia and Europe over many millennia and was certainly a favourite fruit in Italy especially in Roman times. The buttercup also is widespread throughout Europe. We can only suppose that Robert Browning was really yearning for something other than England's flora and fauna.

#### All for the Want of a Piece of String By Mike Russell of the Sussex Wildlife Trust

Now I'm very good at relaxing and just watching; my routine in the morning is to come down, get my tea and breakfast, switch on the 'Today' programme and sit and look out in the back garden and just observe.

In recent weeks, entertainment has been provided by the bit of string used to tie up the raspberry canes as it has become a much desired object for some of the birds in the garden, an essential item to adorn their nests; the problem is that the string is offering up strong resistance to their efforts to remove it.

I have two pairs of starlings making the use of the space under the roof tiles to nest in and they squabble over the rights to hang onto the canes and tug with all their strength at the string, usually to no avail. Occasionally a tiny wisp is borne away triumphantly but it is really scant reward for the effort they've put in.

When the starlings are not struggling with it, a few house sparrows try their luck but again all their hard work goes unrewarded. The canes bend with their effort but the string simply refuses to budge. Even the little blue tits have a go, sneaking in when the starlings and sparrows are off resting, probably trying to regain their strength to give it another go, but it is a futile attempt, the string remains resolutely and firmly attached to the canes, testament to the firmness of the way I tied them together in the first place.

My garden is pretty small but does seem to warrant a lot of interest from the local avian population. A pair of blackbirds think better of expending energy in trying to tackle the unmovable string so they spend the time picking up the debris scattered around and adding to the nest they've started building in the ivy covering the fence. A sense of guilt now encompasses me as I know from past years that as soon as we go out and start enjoying the garden in the warm sunshine, the

encounters. Some pupils even got to stroke a snake! I am not sure whether any of the staff were that brave!

#### LOCAL RADIO

Having found Radio Sussex on line, I had a look at their guest speakers. It looked impressive with a variety of interesting people including members of parliament. I decided to phone the radio station to see if they might be interested in me talking about my dogs, behaviour work and book. Much to my surprise the presenter that I talked to jumped at the idea. Luckily he was a dog person and was fascinated by the unusual work Chloe does. The radio studio is at Bird In Eye Farm, Uckfield, which was not far for me to go.

I arrived at the farm clutching my notes and wandered around the various buildings looking for the studio, then saw the sign by a flight of steps leading up to the upper story of a barn. I was met by a beaming lady presenter who I would be talking too. Sadly the gentleman I had talked to earlier was not well; fortunately she was also a great dog lover. As I was early we had plenty of time to chat about dogs. This was done in short fragments as she had to put on the music, pop out of her mini studio into the reception area and then get back to have a few words on air and put the next recording on. She was so lovely and friendly, but also very efficient, looking through my notes ready for the interview. Soon I was on air, I don't know how I did, hopefully it was ok. I had plenty to talk about so that was not a problem.

I really enjoyed my visit, it was great fun and I would love to visit them again. After that I had an invitation from Radio Sussex and Surry to be a guest speaker on the 31 March. I did my homework listening to their other guests so I would be better prepared. I also had my hair done, a rare event. My husband wanted to know why I needed my hair done for radio.

Unfortunately the weather forecast on the day was not good, predicting high winds, also delays and cancellations on the trains. As there was no parking at the studio we decided to drive to Haywards Heath for me to try to catch a train

As it was very windy so we decided to leave early hoping the trains were running on that line. My husband had to go out in the car before we left but promised to be back in good time. He set off along our lane but had a diversion further on so came back home a different way entering our lane from the other end. Shortly after he returned we left. I eyed the two oak trees close to the cottage suspiciously as their branches thrashed about in the high wind. Luckily they were not in leaf. Part way along the lane where my husband had driven earlier was a huge fallen tree blocking the lane. Chance

is very strange as the tree had come down in the short interval between our two journeys, thankfully! We had to back the car and go a different way. Strangely that was the only fallen tree we saw on the roads to Haywards Heath. Trains were running late but I arrived in Brighton with plenty of time before my early afternoon appointment.

As I was still early I sat in the reception area which is also the BBC Sussex shop where there were masses of products for sale. I sat there mentally going through the topics I wanted to talk about. The radio was on so I heard the presenter say "Soon Hazel Carter will be answering listener's questions on dog training and behaviour problems". What, I thought; I didn't know I was going to do that! I thought I would just be having a chat about my last dog and Chloe and her unusual work and a bit about my behaviour work. Not to worry I thought, remembering at Uckfield there was plenty of time to discuss what we would talk about before I was on air, so presumed it would be the same at Brighton.
