I have a problem with the Christmas story!

I have a problem with the Christmas story and I believe I am not alone. As our thoughts turn toward Christmas up and down the country clergymen and women of all denominations will be praying and fretting about how to deliver, or retell the Christmas story in a way that will be fresh and memorable.

In Framfield Church 2012 we had baby Jesus suspended on six blue helium filled balloons descending from on- high at the back of church into the chancel on a zip-wire. All very dramatic and judging by the response since, everyone loved it.

It was a visual illustration and a play on words from the carol, Once in Royal David's City - 'He came down to Earth from Heaven'. And here lies the problem, the visual image of baby Jesus on the zip-wire appears to be the only thing that was remembered! Exciting as it was I had effectively failed; the true message of Christmas had been lost in the drama of the visual.

The Christmas story is the beginning of the greatest story ever told, but what comes to mind when we hear the word 'story'? We all know about fictional stories, fairy stories, tales, yarns and amusing anecdotes which is fine, but when we hear the word 'story', we tend not to take it seriously. A story is generally viewed as something made-up rather that a real account.

The account of Jesus coming into the world and living as one of us is an undisputed historical fact. No historian would dispute this as there is far too much evidence to the contrary.

Never the less, what's the point of Jesus coming to earth or why do we celebrate His birth in the first place is a much better question. In church circles and beyond we speak about God becoming man or God incarnate, which simply means God in person or as some children say God with skin on! Interestingly, in the entire Bible there is only one general reference to Jesus' appearance which is found in Isaiah 53:2 'He had no beauty or majesty to attract us to him, nothing in his appearance that we should desire him'. In essence Jesus looked like your average Middle Eastern Jew.

Then we come to the virgin birth. Mary is chosen as a pure woman and it is the Holy Spirit who 'overshadows' her as the Bible puts it so that when Jesus is conceived and born He is fully human and fully divine. Not half and half but His humanity fused with His divinity.

The question often arises, why would God want to do that? If God wanted to reveal Himself why wouldn't he just show up as an all powerful celestial being? Personally

I think the answer is twofold. Firstly, in His humanity Jesus would have to experience a human life; He would know joy, pain, hunger, rejection etc so that when we experience the same things we have a personal God who totally understands our situation. In His divinity we see Jesus the all-powerful. The one who could drive out evil, bring sight to the blind, healing to the body, raise the dead, provide food and calm the forces of nature.

God is not aloof as some think, and God is not uncaring as some also think. Traditional views of God can be like figures from Greek mythology ruling from the heavens and throwing thunderbolts down in judgement when we mess up. These 'stories' are very unhelpful when we are trying to discern the true nature of God.

In Christ we see the true face of God, and the true nature of God, and we can be forgiven for not recognising Him. Even the disciples who had been with Him for three and a half years had the same problem. In John 14:8 Philip said, 'Lord, show us the Father and that will be enough for us.'9 Jesus answered: 'Don't you know me, Philip, even after I have been among you such a long time? Anyone who has seen me has seen the Father. How can you say, "Show us the Father"? ¹⁰ Don't you believe that I am in the Father, and that the Father is in me? The words I say to you I do not speak on my own authority. Rather, it is the Father, living in me, who is doing his work. ¹¹ Believe me when I say that I am in the Father and the Father is in me; or at least believe on the evidence of the miracles themselves.

The final piece in the Christmas story is that Jesus was born in order to die for us. At the end of our lives I would expect that we would all like to go to heaven? Prior to Philip's question Jesus speaks to the disciples about preparing a place in heaven for them and how they can get there. ⁵ Thomas said to him, 'Lord, we don't know where you are going, so how can we know the way?' ⁶ Jesus answered, 'I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me. That last sentence is vitally important!

Jesus is the bridge to Heaven and He is also the sin bearer. No one can stand in the presence of God who is pure and holy with their sins unforgiven. We are completely and utterly unable to do this for ourselves, no matter how good we think we are. God provides the way because Jesus is the way. When we are brutally honest about ourselves and understand and accept what Christ offers to us as individuals, as a gift of amazing love, then we are 'through' or as Jesus said 'Very truly I tell you, whoever hears my word and believes him who sent me has eternal life and will not be judged but has crossed over from death to life (John 5:24).

May God bless everyone in the parish this Christmas. Revd Chris Lawrence

You will now find it easier to report incidents of anti-social driving in Sussex. Sussex Police has re-launched Operation Crackdown - a system that enables anyone to report anti-social driving and abandoned vehicles, either online or by phone.

Anti-social driving can be driving that is careless, deliberately aggressive or dangerous. If you see this type of behaviour it is important that you report it, so it can be dealt with in the most appropriate way.

Operation Crackdown is a joint initiative supported by Sussex Safer Roads Partnership (SSRP), Sussex Police and all local authorities in the county. It was first launched in 2002 as a way of reporting abandoned vehicles in Sussex, and was expanded in 2007 to cover anti-social driving reports.

The system for reporting anti-social driving has now been made simpler, to encourage members of the public to easily and quickly report this type of incident and users can now keep track of the progress of their case with a specific reference number provided. Incidents can be reported, either via:

www.operationcrackdown.org, or by calling 01243 64 22 22, for those who don't have access to the internet.

Members of the public who are reporting incidents must remember, where possible, the registration number of the vehicle, the make, model and the colour, so the police can identify the vehicle concerned and make contact with the offender.

Every report received through Operation Crackdown is viewed and a decision is made against set criteria on how best to deal with it. In the majority of cases a letter of advice is sent to the driver or rider, but a report to Operation Crackdown can also lead to arrest and possible conviction, depending on the seriousness of the offence".

Nature Notes

Two striking facts were on the news this evening. One was that we experienced the hottest July day ever in 2015, and the other that we are likely to experience the mildest November weather ever during this month. I write my Nature Notes about a month before it comes out, so you are likely to know if they were right by the time you read this. The fact remains that carbon dioxide in the atmosphere is at its highest level since records began. This is likely to have profound consequences for nature. I was reading my earlier Nature Notes yesterday so that I could avoid repeating myself too much, and even in 2002 and 2004 I was writing about how extraordinarily mild it was in November and December. What seems to be happening is that the trapped heat from the greenhouse effect caused by carbon dioxide and methane in the atmosphere is warming the oceans and large land masses causing more moisture in the atmosphere in some places leading to heavy rain and flooding in some places and drought and forest fires in others. Ice is melting in the Arctic and mountain glaciers, and all this is leading to changes in the ranges of plants and animals. For us humans the consequences are often disastrous with flooded or burnt homes, crop failures, hunger, thirst and heat stroke. In short – it is rather depressing.

So, what can we do? First, we should try to refrain from doing anything that will make things worse. Second, we could watch nature and read the signs and report them where we can. Then for ourselves, we should think positively and live well with nature in the knowledge that all things are interdependent. We depend on nature for all our oxygen, water, food, warmth and shelter. Even our transport systems derive originally from natural things. Nature tells us one thing more than anything else, that is - adapt and survive. This is not as selfish as it sounds. It actually means that organisms that fit in with the rest of nature fill a niche that keeps them healthy by keeping others around them healthy. Animals that eat other animals mostly take those that would not survive in any case. Plants that produce fruit do so to get animals to eat the fruit and the animals disperse the seeds contained therein to places where the seeds can grow. Honeybees collect nectar for their colony and carry pollen between flowers that leads to good fruit and so on. Only by caring for nature will it return the favour.

Included is a recommendation to extend the Conservation Area in Framfield.

Still on the subject of refuse, although of the recyclable variety this time – the owners of the 'bring' site (recycling area) in Blackboys (Blackboys Inn) have asked Wealden to remove it as they have another use for the area. A replacement will not be found because in fact all of the types of recyclables are now collected on the door step.

Red Revolution in Hastings

During September the Sussex Wildlife Trust's WildCall Officer, Jess Price, received a number of calls from people in the county saying that they had seen red squirrels, with a few providing photographic evidence to back up their claim. Now it is well-known that red squirrels have disappeared from the South of England apart from small remnant populations on the Isle of Wight and Brownsea Island in Poole Harbour, where constant battles are being waged against the invasive grey squirrel to keep them out.

So where have these red squirrels come from? The majority of the records that Jess received were from a small area in Hastings. They came from quite a few different people but we're not sure how many actual squirrels there were, whether people were all seeing the same individual or there was more than one of them. However many squirrels there were, it would be interesting to know how they got there. It is highly unlikely they escaped from their island fortresses, while the nearest mainland populations are in the Northern England and Anglesey so again they are not going to be from either of these.

There are some that have been captive bred in Sussex and there are occasional escapees that are reported so this could be the source of the Sussex animals. Or there may be someone who has been captive breeding squirrels then deliberately releasing them into the wild. This does happen quite regularly for a range of animals, plants and birds, usually by well-meaning but sometimes misguided individuals.

Red squirrels are a native species and were once widespread throughout Sussex but the introduction of the grey squirrel and the subsequent expansion of the population has driven the red squirrel further and further north. Conservation organisations are involved in a number of projects in trying to maintain the red squirrel population while curtailing and reversing the spread of the grey.

Releasing or re-releasing species back into areas where they were once resident and common can be a very complex and sometimes costly operation. You really have to know why they disappeared in the first place, you have to assess whether the habitat is still there, with all the ecological constituents are there for it to at least survive but preferably flourish. With the red squirrel, there is no point in trying to bring it into places where the population of grey squirrels is still high. As well as out competing them for breeding sites, they also pass on a disease to the reds, so they will then just die out again.

There is an interesting public relations issue also to contend with. While everyone would like to see red squirrels around again, to achieve this would entail removing the greys and we have become so used to seeing greys around that removal would instigate a public outcry.

So, for the people of Hastings, it has been nice to see the squirrels, but we are still a long way from a population gaining a permanent foothold in the town.

CHRISTMAS TIPS 2015

I thought this might be useful for anybody with a young inquisitive dog this Christmas.

CHRISTMAS TIPS.

Keep to your pet's normal routine, feeding, walking and bed times. This will help to keep them relaxed and contented during the excitement of the festivities.

Feed their normal diet. It is tempting to give lots of rich goodies so they can enjoy Christmas, but you may not enjoy Boxing Day cleaning up the results of upset tummies! Just add a few tiny tasty morsels to the food.

Stick to your usual house rules. If your dog does not normally sleep on the bed or sofa, do not allow him to do it for a special treat for Christmas. He could be very confused by this and not want to revert to the normal routine afterwards. Conversely if your dog always has the entire sofa to lounge on, he will be a bit fed up if he has to share it with houseguests. The same rule applies to feeding titbits at the table, if your family do not do it, tactfully tell the guests that it is not allowed.

Do not forget regular toilet trips, especially for the young or old dog. Provide a quiet retreat where your cat or dog can rest in peace.

With lots of people coming and going do be extra careful that doors

and gates are not left open for the dog to run off or even worse be run over by a guest coming up your drive.

Even a well-trained dog might seize the opportunity to steal the turkey if it is left out on the kitchen unit while everybody is partying at the other end of the house. So check everything is put away.

Rubbish bins. Watch they are not overflowing with rubbish with the lid not fully closed, especially if it has turkey bones in it. One, the bones are dangerous, and two, when a dog has had the reward of raiding the rubbish bin just once, he will go on doing it.

The Christmas tree. Another target for the inquisitive pet. Lots of presents to rip open and investigate. Chocolates for humans are dangerous for dogs, do not let them eat it. Only give them dog chocs. It is now known that dried fruit and grapes can be lethal for dogs so do not be tempted to give them any Christmas cake.

Jealousy between two dogs can escalate with the excitement of having presents, or even watching their humans opening presents. This can result in a fight. Separate the dogs while they open their presents if you think it might happen.

A little thought and planning beforehand should mean that both the pets and owners all have a super Christmas.
