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

Moving on from Easter - Who do people say I am?

One of the questions Jesus puts to his disciples is "Who do people say I am"? You could equally ask the same question of yourself to someone who has known you for some time and as Jesus did you will also get a variety of answers. Our perception and judgement of others depends mainly on two factors.

Firstly, we view others through a 'personal lens' based on our upbringing and experience of interacting with other human beings. Typically when meeting someone for the first time we make a value judgement solely on whether you received a smile or a cheerful hello; whether you were comfortable in their presence; or did they have defensive body language or 'shifty eyes'!

Secondly, we judge over a longer period of time i.e. on what they say or do how they treat you and others, are they kind, trustworthy etc.

Through personal experience it has often been the case that my initial perception of someone has turned out in the long run to be exactly the opposite. The really chummy ones when you first meet them turn out to be not very nice at all, whereas the ones who you were not quite sure about end up as trusted, lifelong friends.

So much for human relationships, but what about God whom we cannot see yet we still feel the need to make a value judgement about his character; because it is on this judgement that we decide whether we are going to have any sort of relationship with Him.

When Jesus says "Follow Me" He asks us to pitch in everything with Him. To trust Him with everything in life whether it be for us, our family, health, housing, job, finance, food etc. For many that is a bridge too far and the chief reason for not trusting Him is due to the projection of failed or difficult human relationships that are transferred onto God / Jesus.

The result is that we are not quite sure that this perfect, all loving God, as described in the Bible and personified by Jesus is in fact all that He is cracked up to be. Sad but true. How often have you heard the comment that 'religion is the source of all wars', result, 'I don't want anything to do with religion'? The door is firmly closed in God's face!

Thankfully, Jesus never came to earth to establish another religion; in fact God hates religion and pious religiosity for its own sake because it inhibits the intimacy of relationship and turns it into a lifeless performance.

God's heart yearns for a genuine relationship/friendship with each one of us. He is the source that meets our deepest needs that no one or anything else can satisfy and yet we still try to run away, but as the saying goes 'You can run, but you can't hide'.

In the parable of the prodigal son when the younger son has demanded his inheritance from his father, left home for a distant land and spent all his money on 'wild living' and is now destitute and hungry he finally comes to his senses. He realises that even the servants at the family home now had more that he did so he decides to return home and make a grovelling speech to his father in the hope that he will accept him back in the role of a servant. But what happens? - Luke 15:11-32

"But while he was still a long way off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion for him; he ran to his son, threw his arms around him and kissed him.

²¹"The son said to him, 'Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you. I am no longer worthy to be called your son.

²²"But the father said to his servants, 'Quick! Bring the best robe and put it on him. Put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. ²³Bring the fattened calf and kill it. Let's have a feast and celebrate. ²⁴For this son of mine was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found.'

The son clearly misread the character of his father and the reaction he was likely to get when he came home. How many of us can identify with the son, put our hands up and say 'yes, I've messed up', done things and said things I shouldn't have and now have to live with the regret and the heartache of a broken relationship.

Clearly, the father in the parable is God. But note that despite the son's speech the father isn't really listening, there is no word or thought of chastisement (he knows everything anyway) he is just so happy to have his son home. In this light, like the son how many have given God a bad press based on faulty perceptions about His character?

The essence of God's character is unconditional love and as the bible says 'Love covers over a multitude of sins". It is time for you to come home and let your heavenly Father greet you?





Nature Notes

Meteorological spring has arrived! However, I think it is colder now than it was in January. The frog spawn has arrived in my pond but some of it looks as though it has suffered in the cold and is not developing. However, there are plenty of full stops changing into commas within the jelly, so there should be sufficient tadpoles to produce a new generation of frogs.

I saw the first hawthorn and elder leaves breaking bud recently in the hedgerows, and the dunnock or hedge sparrow was singing his head off this morning, so he is pleased as well, probably because he and his mate can soon get on with nest-building without being too visible.

The honeysuckle is also leafing up in order to catch the early year light before the tree canopy shades it out. It is a striking ecological phenomenon that the small understory herbs, climbers and shrubs produce their leaves well in advance of the trees so that they can use the spring sunshine to get a growing head start on them before the tree canopy closes up above them. It is rather kind of the large trees to let that happen really.

Our commonest tree is probably oak which breaks bud on or about 23rd April on average. Within about four weeks of this date the leaves of the oak have closed the canopy, but not before the wood anemone and blue bell has grown and flowered. However, there are moth caterpillars that hatch out when the oak leaves break bud and eat them as they are growing. If the caterpillars waited, the leaves produce tannin which makes them inedible and the caterpillars would die. Sometimes caterpillars can be in such profusion that you can hear their droppings falling like rain on the leaf litter below. Also, the caterpillars can sometimes eat so many leaves that the oak tree is almost completely defoliated. However, the caterpillars soon pupate if they are not eaten in turn by blue tits and other birds; so then the oak trees produce a new growth of leaves called Lammas growth because it coincides with the feast of Lammas Day or loaf-mass which is the 1st August and the festival of the wheat harvest. On this day it was traditional to bring to church the first loaf of bread made from the first harvest of wheat of that year, and is an early harvest festival.

The Changing World of the Blackcap

Some of you may have been lucky enough to have been visited by a small greyish bird about the size of a robin with a prominent black cap, taking advantage of the food you provide in your garden. This is the appropriately named blackcap, though the females may not agree as they have brown caps, and the reason you may have seen one is because of what you are doing, feeding birds in winter.

Blackcaps are a migratory species, coming to Northern Europe to breed in the summer and then returning to Southern Europe or Africa to spend the winter in warmer climes where they can feed, as they are essentially insectivores. But the last 50 years, because of the huge increase in the development and usage of commercial wild bird food and the changing climate to warmer winters has seen a continuous increase in the number of blackcaps reported throughout the year, particularly in gardens.

It is easy to assume that these wintering blackcaps are the breeding birds that have just decided to stay over, why take that long hazardous journey south when there is enough food available here and it seems to be a lot warmer than it used to be, but research has shown that this is not necessarily the case. Analysis of data collected by the British Trust for Ornithology (BTO) shows that the blackcaps recorded in the UK during the winter months have likely come from Central Europe, mainly from Germany and Austria, while our own breeding birds still head south at the end of summer.

By analysing BTO Garden Birdwatch data and ringing recovery records over a number of years, it is not surprising that the majority of records come from the southern half of the UK where winters are milder and were more frequent where supplementary food was provided. Where there have been particularly warmer periods in winter there were fewer sightings of blackcaps illustrating that they still have a preference for more natural food when it is available.

There is also increasing evidence that these little birds as well as changing their migratory habits they are changing genetically a well. Blackcaps wintering in Britain have relatively narrower and longer beaks to those that winter in Spain, suggesting that they are becoming more generalist feeders. As these changes can continue to evolve it is possible that eventually they may split into separate species.

These changes have been initiated through actions by us, directly by providing supplementary food during the winter months and then indirectly through our actions that are having an effect on the climate. Most of our birds that migrate to the UK are insectivores so they have to make the long journey south to survive. If they had enough food to survive here in the winter they wouldn't need to leave but genetically they are pre-disposed to eat insects, but this new research shows that we, through our actions, may be speeding up the evolutionary process and who knows, other species may follow in the wake of the blackcap.

NEWS FROM YOUR WEALDEN DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

A few District news items from Wealden District Council -

WDC has agreed to increase the Wealden share of this year's council tax by 1.9 %. This is the first increase after five years, and it will see Wealden's share of resident's council tax bills increase to £3.41 a week for a Band D property. The increase will be 6.5 pence a week for that Band D property."

WDC has welcomed the High Court ruling which overturns a Planning Inspector's decision to grant planning permission for 103 homes within the High Weald Area of Outstanding Beauty at Steel Cross, Crowborough. It's very rare for the Council to take this serious step but sometimes it is a real matter of sticking to your principles and it paid off.

WDC's Wealden Do Sussex 2016 tourist guide was launched in February. An extra 20,000 guides have been printed this year to help build in the District's reputation as a day trip destination. In 2014, Wealden received 5.6million visitor day trips, an increase of 1% on the previous year – but the total amount of money tourism brought into the District rose by 2.5% to nearly £300 million.

I always seem to be saying how busy the terms are, and terms 3 and 4 have been no exceptions! Both schools have been working very hard not only embedding the more demanding curriculum but also developing a robust system of assessment now that the old system of levels has been removed. Staff have spent staff meeting time planning together for joint projects and events as well as supporting each other and colleagues from other schools as all the changes are introduced.

Staffing News

At the end of Term 4 we will be saying a fond farewell to Mrs Holbrook after 23 years of teaching at Framfield School. We are fortunate, however, that Mrs Holbrook will continue to be our Modern Foreign Languages expert for one hour a week at both schools with our KS2 children. FRAMFIELD PARISH COUNCIL - REPORT

Co-option of Parish Councillors - there are some vacancies on the Parish Council. If anyone would be interested in becoming a Parish Councillor please contact me.

Memorial Hall refurbishment, Framfield – an update: the current 'project' is the conversion of the rear urinals into a unisex WC. We are also investigating the possibilities of a new boiler and general hot water system and therefore some changes to the rear corridor. A huge amount of effort goes into organising the works to the Hall, therefore, it is extremely disappointing to find that new items from the kitchen disappear and one of the new work tops has been damaged. If anyone can shed any light on any of these things please let me know.

Bird-in-Eye Hill – speed limit reduction. The Parish Council has applied to ESCC for match-funding for the provision of a reduction in speed limit on a section of Bird-in-Eye Hill (running down from the Farm to the Bridge). We have heard that ESCC have delayed the decision until September when the request will be re-considered.

School Lane, Blackboys. Residents have approached the Parish Council because the situation with discourteous parking has reached an intolerable level during school drop off and pick up times. A site meeting has been held with representatives from the School, Parish Council, residents and Councillor Chris Dowling to see what could be done in an attempt to stop the damage which is occurring to the grass verges and driveways.

Speed limits, Blackboys. The Parish Council is to look again at what can be done to try and reduce the speed of traffic on particularly the B2192 in Blackboys.

Precept. The Parish Council has decided to raise the precept by £1,000 for the year 2017/18. This was done with some reluctance but bearing in mind that the cost of additional highway measures as detailed above will have to be in the very least part funded by the Parish Council, they felt that this increase was justified. It represents approximately a 2% increase.


