How's your Mental Health?

Last week (8th-14th May) was Mental Health Awareness Week. Personally I'm really encouraged that the whole subject is now much more out in the open. The stigma of struggling with mental health issues is at last being overcome and it's ok to speak openly about them.

The main problem when suffering with mental health problems is that from the outside there doesn't appear to be anything wrong with you. There is no bandage, no pair of crutches, no bruises; it's all on the inside, invisible to the casual glance.

It may come as somewhat of a surprise but God has a lot to say about mental health and how we can overcome mental health problems when they arise!

There can be a variety of complex issues matter surrounding serious mental illness - I don't wish to go there at this point. However, in general we will all suffer varying degrees of mental illness during our lifetime. It could be through bereavement, a failed relationship, a victim of crime or violence, the aftermath of an accident, redundancy, news of a life-changing illness or simply an unkind remark. All of these and many others are hurtful and produce stress which then affects out mental health and general wellbeing.

It used be said that when we were suffering from mental problems we ought to get our heads examined. God begs to differ! Generally it's our heart that's the problem. Not the heart that pumps blood around the body but rather the centre of our being. Proverbs 23:7 says 'As a man thinks in his heart so he is.' Have we ever thought that our hearts have the capacity to think? Proverbs 4:23 says 'Above all else, guard your heart for it is the wellspring of life'. It raises the question, why does my heart need guarding? Simply put, if you don't guard your heart it is likely to get damaged and if it does the spring of life within ceases to flow properly. This is one of the reasons why for example victims of abuse experience so much mental turmoil and find life and relationships very difficult. The unexpected event gets under our defences and injures the heart. Personally, I believe that childhood traumas are the most damaging because children in their innocence don't have the capability or awareness to handle challenging situations.

As you think back on your life can you identify any events which have been injurious to your mental well being? Do you still live with the sting when you reflect back? Memories (with all the attached emotions), good and bad are held in the heart. The good ones are fine, they engender happiness, joy and contentment, but what of the bad ones that we wish weren't there?

Have you ever thought about your heart in relation to a computer? Every so often we need to reorder the hard drive, get rid of any unwanted temporary files, delete the browsing history and empty the recycle bin. When we do so have you noticed how much better the computer runs. Rather than being sluggish in operation it gets a new lease of life; quick and responsive. So what about the painful stuff we've got filed away; can we really get rid of it?

Part of Jesus' mandate (Isaiah 61:1) was/is 'to bind up the broken hearted, to proclaim freedom for the captives and release from darkness for the prisoners. The root meaning of 'broken hearted' is to cure those with fractured emotions. It was a few years ago that God showed me that we record everything in life rather like a movie film. The individual frames were not pictures though, but pockets of emotion (we record through our five senses). Suddenly I had insight into the mental problem of holding all this negativity in so I asked God how do you deal with it? The reply came back 'I'm the great film editor, just ask me to remove the bad frames and rejoin the good ones back together'.

On behalf of others I've asked God to do that on numerous occasions and it has been amazing how life transforming this simple prayer can be! God does indeed heal the broken hearted, you just have to give Him the pieces (that's your part).

Christianity used to be about 'is it true'. Today it's about 'does it work'.

If any of the above has touched a chord or you're suffering mentally do get in touch. It's free, confidential and it does work!

Years 3 and 4 truly embraced their topic, Extreme Earth! This was generally a Geography and Science based theme, looking at natural disasters. The classes enjoyed Disaster Day together with an art focus.

Our older pupils took the overall topic of "Rivers", developing their skills in Geography, getting to grips with atlases and finding out about key geographical points like countries and continents. They then looked more closely at the different part of river and the ways in which rivers are used, comparing two very different rivers and finally visiting the Cuckmere.

The books studied in English have for the most part run alongside these topics and the enthusiasm with which pupils are reading and writing as a result of this creative push is heartening to see – it really shows the impact of the high quality teaching in both the schools – it is not mean feat keeping the pupils inspired at the same time as teaching these essential skills.

Our English and Maths leaders have also been very busy running various workshops for parents including Phonics, Reading, Spelling and Maths Problem-Solving. These have been very useful and parents have greatly appreciated them. Many thanks must go to both Mrs. Amy Clarke (English) and Mr. Russell Boorman (Maths) who have not only worked hard to support our schools in these subjects, but have also run twilight sessions for other schools in the area.

As I am sure you are all aware, the funding of schools is a contentious issue and on Friday 28th April, Mrs Katharine Rabson Stark, our Chair of Governors, and I attended a meeting with our local MP, Nus Ghani, to discuss the impact of the proposed new funding formula on our schools. This is a topic which is of great importance when we are making decisions for the future of our schools and we were able to present the impact on our schools of the proposed new formula along with a number of other headteachers and Chairs of Governors. Assuming the MP is re-elected, she will be taking the concerns back to the minister after the election.

As the climate within education continues to be challenging, our Federation is proud of the way it makes sure that it takes all these changes as opportunities and runs with them! Our hard-working and committed team of staff and Governors,

Both schools have had visits from the Community Chef Robin Van Creveld who worked with the children with an hour of hands on cooking. Robin really inspired and engaged our children with his love of healthy cooking, making a number of delicious meals that tempted even the pickiest of appetites. He will be returning shortly with a focus on healthy lunchboxes! This alongside the Daily Mile and an increase in sports clubs and fixtures, means that our pupils are really thinking about how to keep fit and healthy.

All classes worked hard on their various topics for last term - enjoying their stunning starts which truly inspired the children to challenge themselves and "Be the Best they Can Be". Our youngest pupils had "An African Adventure" where the focus was mainly on Kenya. They learnt about the different animals that liver, the fruit that grows there and a little about the Maasai tribe. They then took part on a very exciting drumming workshop.

For years 1 and 2 the topic started with the appearance of a mysterious chocolate egg in each class room - for the term's topic was "Chocolate". They looked at the history of chocolate, how its consumption has changed and where it comes from with a focus on Fair Trade.

Nature Notes

Continuing with the marine theme, sea-birds are moving along the coast; generally, from west to east during May. They are following the fish and heading for breeding grounds. These birds include Sandwich Terns, Common Terns, Arctic Terns, Little Terns, Pomarine Skuas, Arctic Skuas, Black-throated Divers, Red-throated Divers, Great-northern Divers, Bar-tailed Godwits, Black-tailed Godwits, Common Scoters Velvet Scoters, Red-breasted Mergansers, Whimbrel and Gannets. They have spent winter at sea and on coasts in warmer latitudes. Some of these birds may be understandably unfamiliar to some readers; because in order to see these birds it is usually necessary to be on a suitable beach at about 6:00 am on a sunny calm morning in May with a pair of good binoculars and a telescope. This can be rather cold and frustrating, but when the birds start to appear, it can get quite exciting. Observers often post their sightings on the Sussex Ornithological Society on-line web-pages. Popular beaches include Selsey Bill, Splash Point in Seaford and the beach at Rye Harbour.

These and other sea-birds are heading for their breeding grounds, a few of these birds breed on Sussex beaches, but such sites are very rare. Others are heading for North-West Europe, and in the case of some of the Arctic Terns – the Arctic Circle and the Svalbard archipelago.

It remains that marine habitats are fragile, and when they are close to Human populations, they get disturbed by visitors, boats, fishing, dredging and other Human activities. It is often difficult for these birds to find a quiet spot to lay their eggs and raise a family. This is why such places as the Rye Harbour Nature Reserve exists and volunteers protect the habitats from too much disturbance. However, it is often possible to watch from special hides strategically placed to protect the birds but allow visitors to see them nesting and raising their young. Entry to Rye Harbour is free, but a good level of fitness is required to walk around the site which takes a minimum of about 3 hours for a reasonably fit person. There is a visitor centre where information can be obtained and simple refreshments and souvenirs can be purchased.

Understanding and protecting nature has never been more important as the Human population continues to increase beyond 7.5 billion.

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Never Mind Coldplay, Here's the Cuckoo By Michael Blencowe of the Sussex Wildlife Trust

Is it me or are rock bands today getting less and less offensive? I sometimes find myself harking back to a simpler, happier time when young punks were lining up to shock us. Nowadays, when I feel the need to be outraged, I turn to a bird whose scandalous behaviour still embodies the filth and the fury of The Sex Pistols in their prime.

The cuckoo creates avian anarchy in the UK every summer. If you delight in watching the honest, hard-working attempts of birds to build a home and raise a family then the cuckoo sticks two feathers up to you. Its non-conformist lifestyle is "a monstrous outrage on maternal affection", "a blight on creation".

The male cuckoo doesn't hide his contempt for society. Each spring he announces his arrival by shamelessly shouting his name across Sussex. It's the one bird call in Britain which everyone recognises. Two simple chords (just like all the best punk songs). Cuckoos also utter a callous cackle that would make any panto villain proud. It's almost as if they can't stop the evil within from bubbling out; 'Mwah-ha-ha-ha-ha'.

But save your boos and hisses for the female cuckoo. She coldly targets a couple of unsuspecting love-birds, patiently stakes out their nest and then strikes. After snatching one of their eggs in her beak she fires her own replacement egg into the nest and scarpers. It's over in ten seconds. The parents return to the same number of same-coloured eggs; they suspect nothing. This perfect crime can be re-enacted in a further twenty nests.

With baby cuckoos there's no nature or nurture argument. They're simply born bad. Upon hatching the evil infants first instinct is to eject all other eggs from the nest. Once alone this bully incessantly screams 'feed

The Parish Council is still involved in discussions over a scheme to provide a morning Saturday bus service provided by the North Wealden Community Transport Partnership. The funding has been agreed but there is still some fine-tuning to be done.

Framfield Village Market – please do come along and have a look at local craft wares and produce and have a cup of coffee. All proceeds go towards the refurbishment of the Memorial Hall. Since the Parish Council took the market on two years ago £4,000 has been raised – thank you to all of those involved.

The new sports pavilion on Blackboys recreation ground is now complete. This is a Parish asset in a similar way to the Village Hall and Memorial Hall, although it will only be available for sports activities and will not have a premises licence for music etc. If anyone has a sporting event that when they believe they could use the Pavilion please contact me in the first instance.

Recreation grounds, play areas etc. If anyone believes they have discovered a fault or problem with in particular one of the play areas, could they please contact me immediately. Although the areas are inspected on a weekly basis by one of our contractors, any additional notification is important to the Council.

Six new benches have been ordered for Blackboys recreation ground and a new seat for the grassed area at the top of Beckets Way. New noticeboards are also in the process of being sourced. The Council has also formally adopted from ESCC seven of the historic white guideposts so that they can be kept in a good state of repair. The number should gradually increase, finances permitting.

LIVING WITH FUR AND FEATHER

A FISHY TAIL

I am writing this in early April. I have just returned from my early morning walk with Chloe. It is a beautiful day. The banks along the lanes were covered in primroses, violets, wood anemones, and early bluebells.

We have a pond in our wood. A few years ago we had some grass eating carp to keep the water clear of weeds. Over time they gradually vanished and the weeds came back so I ordered some more. A couple of weeks ago we went to collect them from a fish farm in Kent. As I was driving along a bendy narrow lane, very carefully, as my husband was watching me rather like a stern driving instructor, a car coming towards me smashed our wing mirror which spoilt my day. I had not realised how often I looked in the mirror until it was not there. We had a walk round then enjoyed lunch in the restaurant overlooking the lovely lakes. The five fish were placed in a big plastic bag, obviously in water. They looked rather surprised as they swam round their temporary home in the back of the car. They also did not like the bendy lane as we could hear lots of fishy tails flapping about, a strange sound in the back of a car. I drove as slowly as possible for our rather nervous passengers.

Back home the heavy bag was carefully loaded into the wheelbarrow which was pushed up through the wood to the pond. We had been instructed to carefully lower the bag into the pond, keeping it closed for about twenty or more minutes so the water in the bag would be the same as the pond water. I was left in charge while the broken mirror could be investigated. I bent precariously over the edge hanging on to one end of the bag. At first it was quite fun watching the new arrivals swimming around in their miniature bag pond, while floating on the big pond. After a while I shifted my position as I was getting stiff; that was better for a while. I twisted round to look at my watch. Another fifteen minutes to go. I moved again slightly, now my arm was aching. I needed to relax my hand holding the bag. I cautiously flexed my fingers. Suppose I let the bag slip? Off would go the bag, across the pond, like a small boat with its fishy cargo. The minutes dragged slowly past. My elderly back was really aching. The twenty minutes was up, but where was my husband? I twisted my stiff

neck round to see if he was coming through the wood. It was time to undo the knot securely keeping the bag water tight so the fish could be slowly released into the pond. At last he arrived and the fish all swam out of the bag then promptly all vanished into the depths of the pond. I staggered to my feet and tottered off to the cottage for a nice cup of tea.

It was an expensive day, buying the fish, paying for lunch and a big bill for a new mirror. I have not seen the fish again, but it is a good excuse to sit peacefully by the pond enjoying all the wild life.
