I would firstly like to thank Jeff (Goggin) for the many years voluntary service he gave to the community as a Councillor and Chairman. I would also like to thank all of the Councillors - new and old for volunteering their time to help make our community a great place to live. Thanks also to the staff – booking clerks, cleaners, RFO, caretaker and service providers for doing their part in keeping the Council running smoothly. Last but not least, I would like to express my sincere thanks to Ann – our Clerk. Ann works tirelessly to keep us on the right path and is integral and invaluable to our team. With a wealth of knowledge and commitment to our community Ann is one of the parish's greatest assets.

The past year has been a bit of a roller coaster. From taking up the post of Chair it has been a non-stop journey looking at the short and long-term objectives for the Council. It is a privilege to lead this forward, but it can also mean making decisions that are unpopular. The coming year and years ahead are going to be financially challenging for us all. With year in year out cuts by County and District Councils, changes in the way that the Police force operates, government initiatives and directives, it is the Parish Council left at the bottom of the pile to pick up the pieces.

Our precept has remained constant for several years but it is likely that it may be challenged in the future to pick up the short falls of services cut by those around us. The current climate has seen partnerships and alliances forming with other Councils and organisations to help make savings whilst retaining such things as rural bus services, grass cutting and road & path improvements to name a few. Despite this, the Parish Council is in a good position at the moment. To keep this up we must increase our efficiencies and be smarter in how things are done.

There are also some new projects underway to improve our other community assets in the coming years.

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Nature Notes

I shall focus on swifts today. These small almost black birds of the air should be familiar to all of us because they scream as they fly through and above the buildings of Uckfield and other European towns. They often breed in the roof of Holy Cross church and other tall buildings.

Swifts can live for more than 20 years, most of which is spent flying. Swifts are fast flyers and hold the record for maintained flight, often not landing at all for more than 10 months! They feed, drink, sleep and mate all while flying. When they want to sleep at night, they fly up to over 1000 metres above sea level and drift in the semi darkness sleeping as they fly, sleeping for short periods at a time. Then, when dawn breaks, they descend to the insect zone, where they snap up all the insects they encounter as they fly. Swifts are 100% dependant on insects and other invertebrates such as ballooning spiders for food.

The latter statement deserves explanation; ballooning spiders are small spiders which make gliders from the gossamer threads they use for webs. They then launch themselves into the wind and travel vast distances, but some are also snapped up by swifts and other birds.

Swifts arrive in Europe from the end of April to mid-May, find their nesting cavity, usually in a building and lay 2 or 3 white eggs in just one brood per year. Each egg requires about 19 days of incubation, this duty is shared by the male and female. Both parents collect invertebrates on the wing for their youngsters that take about 6 weeks to grow and mature before they are able to take their maiden flight, and are then independent, finding their own food on the wing as they fly with their parents in screaming flocks around the towns that they inhabit. They also fly off into the countryside searching out good places to catch flying insects and spiders. Most swifts will have left Europe by the end of August. They are among the last migrants to arrive on their breeding grounds and the first to leave.

Swifts spend the winter south of the Sahara Desert, flying around Africa finding food and water on the wing as they move to almost anywhere that insects can be found.

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Mute swans

I'm going to come right out and say it. I don't like swans. Never have done. Just seeing them smugly swanning around acting all hoightytoighty annoys me. And back in the spring I took a particular dislike to a pair of them.

2018 is the 50th anniversary of the opening of Woods Mill, Sussex Wildlife Trust's nature reserve and headquarters near Henfield. We've been getting the place all ship-shape, ready to welcome visitors for celebrations throughout the summer. I turned up for work one Monday to find a pair of swans had inconsiderately started building their huge woven nest right in the middle of the main path. I thought I may try and heave the heap back into the pond but you can't disturb nesting birds during the breeding season and I'm sure I once read that the Queen legally owns all the swans in Britain. I certainly didn't want Her Royal Highness leaping out of the undergrowth and bopping me with her sceptre. So the nest was here to stay and our visitors would have to take a small diversion. Perhaps it's this royal association which give swans their snooty attitude but I would like to remind any swans reading this article that the reason that they were once bestowed this protection was because the Royal Family enjoyed eating them and didn't want us common folk depriving them of their swan supper.

One morning I checked on the swans and found five whopping great eggs in their obstructive haystack nest. But the parents were elsewhere, arrogantly gliding about on the pond. Had they abandoned the nest? Surely the eggs would perish in the cold? I suddenly became uncharacteristically concerned. despite being the archetypal swan pose is actually an aggressive threat). Before I knew it they were upon me, hissing and raising their mighty wings. When you're being attacked by a swan you really appreciate what formidable creatures they are. Weighing up to 13kg, mute swans are one of the world's heaviest flying birds. The story that they can break your arm with their wings is nonsense but I didn't hang around, just in case. After giving me some evil stares Lord and Lady Muck settled back to incubating and guarding their future family. For another few weeks they sat on their throne in the middle of the path, being photographed by crowds of admiring visitors while I stood ankle deep in the mud, muttering curses under my breath and begrudgingly hammering in a fence to keep them safe. It's obvious who rules the roost here at Woods Mill. Last month those eggs hatched – and now there's seven swans aswimmin' round the pond. If you want to see the swans and lots of other wildlife, take a trip to Woods Mill this summer. Directions are on the Sussex Wildlife Trust website (sussexwildlifetrust.org.uk) and in the 'What's On' section you'll find details of loads of free events being held on the reserve - thanks to generous support from the ScottishPower Foundation - as we celebrate our half century.

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NEWS FROM YOUR WEALDEN DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

Local Plan – The Local Plan was published on 27 June 2018 and goes to Full Council for adoption on 19 July 2018. There will then be a period for Representations (consultation) from 13 August to 8 October 2018. The Plan details the policies for housing, employment, infrastructure, planning and the environment for the next ten years. All being well it will go before a Secretary of State Inspector at the end of the year and we hope to have it in place by early next year. This will give a structure as to how our District will evolve until 2028. Anyone wanting details of what is planned for the Parish, the Local Plan is available on the WDC website – or you can call me for any further information.

Enforcement of Unauthorised Advertisement Structures – WDC now has the power to serve Removal Notices in respect of unauthorised advertisements, and to take steps to secure the removal of any such structure in the event of a failure to comply with the Notice, and to recover any expenses reasonably incurred in exercising this power.

The powers are considered to be a potentially useful tool for ensuring that any unauthorised advertisements, which do not fall under the category of flyposting, can be removed effectively and with significantly quicker outcomes than prosecution. However, in cases where repeat offenders fail to comply with removal notices, the use of prosecution would still be available.

The Littering from Vehicles Outside London (Keepers: Civil Penalties) Regulations 2018 - The Council now also has the powers to issue civil penalties and to the issuing of Fixed Penalty Notices (FPN) for littering offences under new Regulations.

This Council takes a robust approach in investigating reports of littering. However, the only option available to the Council for the enforcement of littering from a vehicle up to this point has been the issue of a warning letter, due to the difficulties of identifying the person responsible for dropping litter from a moving vehicle.

Under the new civil regulations, where an authorised officer of the authority has reason to believe that a littering offence has been committed in respect of a vehicle they may give a penalty notice to the person who is the keeper of the vehicle. The amount of the Fixed Penalty Notice (FPN) is already in place for the criminal offence of littering under section 87(1) of the EPA, namely £75. If a payment is not received within 28 days the penalty will double and become recoverable. If the FPN remains unpaid a decision may be made to recover the amount via debt collection.

And lastly missed bins. The situation is dire within the Parish at the moment. I am ringing and emailing relevant officers on a daily basis and trying to keep the Parish Council website updated. There are also updates on the WDC website. Please don't forget to always contact Wealden District Council if your bin is missed and if you have any concerns please let me know particularly with ongoing problems.

HOME AND HOLIDAY

It is sometimes very stressful living in the countryside. The blackbirds who decided to make their nest on the coil of hose pipe in our open fronted barn last year returned this spring. The crafty birds had been collecting twigs and other useful bits for nest building. We were under the illusion that this was for a different site. We had as usual been in and out of the barn constantly, but it was only when my husband reached up to get the hose pipe he saw the nest, snugly built on top of it. He was not pleased. How had they managed that? We had a serious discussion about what we were going to do about this situation. We decided not to give in like we did last year. If they wanted to have their nest in our barn they must put up with us going in and out every day. We would not give any concessions. They would just have to put up with the bang of dustbin lids, the clatter of wheelbarrows and the smaller hose reel, near their nest being used. They soon had their clutch of eggs and the parents took turns on the nest. We hardened out hearts as we heard a flutter of wings and a disgruntled bird would leave the nest and hide in a thicket of holly by the barn. It quickly returned when it was quiet again. I was the first to weaken. One of the wheel barrows was very near the nest. I decided to leave it outside. We had both adopted a heads down approach when we went in the barn keeping our eyes focused on the floor as this reassured the birds. The eggs were hatching. It was so difficult not to clatter the dustbin lids and disturb them. The bins came out. In the end everything came out. We worked out how long it would be before the youngsters would leave the nest. Perhaps it would be more sensible to not to disturb them till then. It wasn't really giving in was it?

I have been enjoying watching the woodpeckers. I watch them feeding the babies, then teaching the older ones to come to the nut feeder on their own. I always know when a youngster is there as I hear the parent shouting encouragement from a nearby tree. I was thrilled to actually see a young one feeding just a few inches away on the shelf attached to the window sill

We had a holiday on our boat on the Norfolk Broads in early June and the banks beside the rivers were festooned with wild roses from the deepest pink to delicate white. The stems laden with roses climbed up in the trees and arched down to the water. It was a beautiful sight. One morning I decided to take our dinghy and go for a row along the river taking refreshments and picnic lunch with me. I was out of practise and it was hard work. It was very hot so I tried to keep on the shady side of the river. Eventually I found a perfect place for lunch, tucked well under some willow trees. It was magical, a secluded leafy bower above my head with the odd fluttering of birds. Quite unperturbed by the quarrel it resumed its fishing peering down at the water and then, quick as a flash dived down for a fish.

There were lots of dogs on boats but an unusual sight were dogs in canoes. One was a little dog sitting in a small canoe, paddled by a lady followed by a large dog standing proudly in the bows of a big canoe paddled by a man. Both dogs looked very happy in their owner's choice of transport on the water.

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
