Christmas - have we missed the point of this familiar story?

How time flies; another year has virtually passed and Christmas is upon us once again. I managed to fend off the August emails telling me that I should get ready for Christmas! I did send a polite but short reply stating that I really didn't even want to think about Christmas during mid-summer. In my book it's akin to wishing your life away and only serves to dilute the true meaning of Christmas. So it begs the question; has the true meaning of Christmas been lost? I think the answer is 'yes' and 'no'.

No, it hasn't with respect to the giving of gifts and the opportunity to spend time with family and friends. A time to feast, sing carols, decorate the tree and take life down a few notches and relax. Perhaps it's also an opportunity and look back over the year and look forward to the New Year with a fresh outlook and a new hope. However, if we only view Christmas in this way then we have lost the true meaning.

The true meaning of Christmas is to celebrate Jesus' birthday. It's very unlikely that He was born on 25th December but this was the date that was adopted in the early-to-mid fourth century. Unless you have been bought up in a Christian family or went to a church school you might be thinking - so what? The symbols of Christ and the Christmas story are all around us but they can be like the pieces of a jig saw without the box lid that has the picture on it i.e. very difficult to make sense of.

One of my other thoughts was, what do atheists or humanists think about Christmas - do they celebrate it, after all you can't take Christ out of Christmas? In my quest to find an answer I went to Google - the fount of all wisdom! Some folk were sort of ok with Christmas though awkwardly so. Others were dead against. Jim MacIver wrote:

I am totally, completely against Christmas. It is a terrible holiday that makes people into greedy consumers. It is even worse if an atheist or humanist celebrates it because we lose credibility. God-worshipers laugh at us because we become "December Christians." How will anyone take us seriously if we can't give up this silly holiday? How often are we accused of really believing in God?

The most damaging thing of all is that for most people, Christmas is the first experience they have with religion. If they cannot see people not buying into Christmas, why shouldn't they? How can we get people to renounce religion if they see us celebrating the biggest holiday on the Christian calendar? They will see us as hypocrites. Jim has a point, but he's missed the point!

Christmas has nothing to do with religion. When I read Jim's reply it reminded me of a common scenario I often find myself in. i.e. during a social gathering. At some point in the course of conversation someone asks or discovers I am a vicar. The first comment is "you don't look like a vicar" to which I reply "what's a vicar supposed to look like?" The next comment is usually "I'm not religious", to which I reply "neither am I"; then comes the, "but you have to be – you're the Vicar!"

When someone can't play the religion card in an attempt to disengage, it opens the door to having a real conversation. Religion is such a terrible stumbling block to faith.

Celebrating Christmas is firstly about God coming to earth in human form so that we can understand what God is like. It doesn't matter whether you are atheist or a humanist or any other category of human being you might like to mention. Human beings are all made in the image of God and what you believe or don't believe is irrelevant. Just like you can't take Christ out of Christmas you can't take the image of God out of a person. Secondly, the clues in Jesus' name i.e. When the angel appears to Joseph he says - "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife, for the One conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a Son, and you shall give Him the name Jesus, because He will save his people from their sins". (Matthew 1:20-21) The bottom line - Sin separates.

Christmas is the beginning of Jesus' earthly life which will culminate in His death, but ultimately it will enable us all (if we choose to accept it) to have our sins forgiven and wiped out so that we may once again be joined to God. Man cannot save himself but Jesus gives Himself on the cross as a gift to mankind. This is the greatest gift that anyone could offer us collectively and individually but like all good gifts you have to unwrap it, see it for what it is, enjoy it and receive its benefits. This we do when we ask the resurrected Jesus into our lives. As our former Bishop Wallace Benn used to say "We don't worship a dead hero, we worship the living Lord".

Jesus really is the God's gift to mankind and the only genuine gift that keeps on giving. If He comes knocking on the door of your heart this Christmas be sure to let Him in -you won't regret it!

Gods to Ancient Greeks, Gauls and Romans have been trying to claim that the first snog under the mistletoe was their idea.


In the wild Mistletoe plants look like bushy green pom-poms which have been tossed into a tree by an over-enthusiastic cheerleader. Birds feed on their juicy white berries, which appear to be as messy to eat as a treacle and melted mozzarella pizza. Gooey beaks have to be wiped on a nearby branch, allowing any seeds to stick and sprout someplace new. Either that, or the birds disperse the seed in the more traditional intestinal way.

This Christmas keep looking high in the treetops for mistletoe, I haven't seen any yet as I walk around Sussex – but I've seen plenty of proof that it's still working its ancient magic on the people down below.

Christmas Eve 1989. After months of completely misreading the direction in which our friendship was going, I made an ill-informed attempt to snog Anna from accounts under the mistletoe at the work's Christmas party. It was all a bit embarrassing but, in my defence, I was just doing my bit to uphold what has been described as 'the last surviving remnant of plant magic in the sophisticated western world'.

There are other plants which could claim similar magic powers. Half a bottle of fermented French grapes or a tumbler of Scottish malted barley will conjure up enough Dutch courage for some botanically inspired Christmas smooching. But what special power compels us to kiss under the mistletoe? It's certainly easy to see why mistletoe could appear to hold mystical qualities. As autumn strips a tree back to its bark bones it reveals an evergreen mistletoe heart; a beacon of life in the dead of winter. This apparent immortality inspired many ancient fertility rituals. Druids, armed with gleaming golden sickles, would perform a mistletoe harvesting ceremony under a waxing moon (and maybe slaughter two white bulls for good measure).

The plant's secret to eternal life is that it is a hemi-parasite, obtaining its water and nutrients by vampirically sucking them from its host tree. It still has the decency to do a bit of photosynthesis itself (so it's not 100% evil). In fact, research has proved that mistletoe is an ecological keystone species. Without it, there just isn't as much life in a woodland.

The practice of hanging mistletoe at Christmas didn't turn up in a written document until the 1600s and mention of lips meeting underneath it didn't appear in print until 1817. Unsurprisingly, any 'tradition' involving kissing quickly became popular and since then everyone from Norse

Funding available for local community projects

The Framfield and Blackboys Summer Show is enjoyed by many in the community and now it is hoped that it can benefit the villages in other ways. The profit from the shows will be split three ways: one third to the Horticultural Society, another to the Show Committee and the final third set up as a 'Community Fund' to support projects which benefit the local community.

There is £400 available from the 2018 Show but how it will be spent depends on which project is chosen from the proposals that you put forward. Application can be made via a simple form available from the people listed below. The form also sets out the rules of the scheme, for instance the 'local community' means the residents of Blackboys, Framfield and Palehouse Common. Applications need to be submitted by 30th April 2019 and if awarded funding can start from November. There is no specific remit for the fund other than to help provide 'benefit' to the community; for example this might be to buy equipment for a play group, support an activity that helps the elderly or something that marks a significant event for the community. As an example of the latter, money from the 2017 Show, in conjunction with funding from the Parish Council, is being used to plant an oak tree on each of the three village recreation grounds to commemorate the centenary of the end of World War I.

Framfield Parish Council now has a social media account with Facebook (www.facebook.com/framfieldparishcouncil) where useful and pertinent information will be posted. This method proves very useful in today's technological society and can often be a rapid way to disseminate information rapidly. The Parish Council are trialling this for 6 months but would like to stress that if residents have any concerns or issues, they should contact the Parish Council either by phone or email in the first instance. I am in France again monitoring the autumn movements of birds in Aquitaine. We have seen chevrons of hundreds of European common cranes flying over and calling to each other as they go with little mechanical 'purrs'. We have also had a grey heron in our garden, I think it was hunting the moles that punctuate the lawn with their hills of graded soil. This morning we saw a flock of about 40 northern lapwings landing in a ploughed field. These elegant waders often feed together on worms and other invertebrates and seeds, unusually for birds, they like to feed at night by moonlight.

There are currently large flocks of common chaffinches here forming winter foraging flocks, searching out seeds in the arable fields, especially those fields that were used to grow sunflowers. Chaffinches go into eclipse during the winter, which means that their colourful feathers are obscured by brown extensions rendering them cryptic in the brown winter fields. However, these brown feather tips get sloughed off in the spring revealing the pink breast and slate blue head.

We have a resident pair of cirl buntings living in the garden all year round. In France these are called bruant zizi because the male cirl bunting sits at the top of a tree calling zizi – zizi – zizi all day. Bruant simply means bunting. Cirl buntings are rare in Britain.

We have also seen flocks of cattle egrets in the fields nearby. These birds are usually associated with zebras and wildebeest in Africa, but are becoming increasingly common in Europe, including occasionally in Britain. Cattle egrets are similar to the little egrets that we now often see in coastal Britain which started colonising southern England about 30 years ago. Little egrets have black beaks and yellow feet and are usually solitary, but cattle egrets have yellow beaks and black feet and are usually seen in groups. Both are a type of white heron but are smaller than our common grey heron.

We have also seen many very large flocks of woodpigeons flying over as they head south for the winter. These are seen as fair game by the hunters of France who are referred to as Palombiers or pigeon hunters.

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

On Saturday 11th August all the fun of the Framfield and Blackboys Summer Show took place, bringing together the residents of Blackboys, Framfield and Palehouse Common for the biggest event of the year. All the while, the array of over 40 stalls of all kinds kept young and old amused. From the traditional Hoopla with its fiendishly difficult requirements to win to a seemingly simple Welly Throw. A memorial plaque will also be put beside each tree. The red oaks in time will grow very large and it is hoped make quite an impact on each recreation ground.

LIVING WITH FUR AND FEATHER

CHRISTMAS TIPS 2018

I thought this might be useful as a reminder to think about your pets before the hectic Christmas season is here.

CHRISTMAS TIPS.

Keep to your pet's normal routine, feeding, walking and bed times. This will help to keep them relaxed and contented during the excitement of the festivities.

Feed their normal diet. It is tempting to give lots of rich goodies so they can enjoy Christmas, but you may not enjoy Boxing Day cleaning up the results of upset tummies! Just add a few tiny tasty morsels to the food.

Stick to your usual house rules. If your dog does not normally sleep on the bed or sofa, do not allow him to do it for a special treat for Christmas. He could be very confused by this and not want to revert to the normal routine afterwards. Conversely if your dog always has the entire sofa to lounge on, he will be a bit fed up if he has to share it with houseguests. The same rule applies to feeding titbits at the table, if your family do not do it, tactfully tell the guests that it is not allowed.

Do not forget regular toilet trips, especially for the young or old dog.

Provide a quiet retreat where your cat or dog can rest in peace.

With lots of people coming and going do be extra careful that doors and gates are not left open for the dog to run off or even worse be run over by a guest coming up your drive.

Even a well-trained dog might seize the opportunity to steal the turkey if it is left out on the kitchen unit while everybody is partying at the other end of the house. So check everything is put away.

Rubbish bins. Watch they are not overflowing with rubbish with the lid not fully closed, especially if it has turkey bones in it. One, the bones are dangerous, and two, when a dog has had the reward of raiding the rubbish bin just once, he will go on doing it.

The Christmas tree. Another target for the inquisitive pet. Lots of presents to rip open and investigate. Chocolates for humans are dangerous for dogs, do not let them eat it. Only give them dog chocs. It is now known that dried fruit and grapes can be lethal for dogs so do not be tempted to give them any Christmas cake.

Jealousy between two dogs can escalate with the excitement of having presents, or even watching their humans opening presents. This can result in a fight. Separate the dogs while they open their presents if you think it might happen.

A little thought and planning beforehand should mean that both the pets and owners all have a super Christmas.
