#### The importance of family

For a short time in the early 1990s, Amar Kanim was famous. His scarred face and desperate story featured on newspaper front pages around the world. He was introduced to diplomats and ambassadors. He even attended a session of the United Nations. He was known as the little boy who had lost everything in a napalm attack. He came to personify the suffering of the Iraqi people at the hands of their own president Saddam Husain.

Amar was brought to the UK from Iraq three decades ago, an orphaned child with terrible burns from a napalm attack by Saddam Hussein's forces. His cause was taken up by MP Emma Nicholson who arranged for him to be bought back to the UK for medical treatment.

At the time Emma was on a humanitarian mission, she said: "He's a complete orphan; he's lost his life, his home his family."

His treatment and recovery in the hospital were followed closely by the world's media. When the spotlight faded Amar went to live with Emma and her family and he settled into a quiet life in Devon.

Thirty years later Amar received a mysterious message from a stranger, saying his mother is looking for him. Amar was naturally sceptical as several other women had previously claimed that he was their son. However, technology has moved on and DNA testing proved conclusively that the lady in question was his natural mother and that he also had a brother.

Amar's story was shown in a recent Panorama documentary (13<sup>th</sup> May 2019) and ended with Amar being flown out to Iraq where he was reunited with his mother and brother.

In a world where the media appears to stream virtually nothing but negative news, it was great to see a story with a happy ending. The story also went some way to describe the years of anguish suffered by Amar and his mother and brother as they tried to come to terms with losing each other in such tragic circumstances.

The journalist who interviewed Amar asked him what it was like when he thought he had lost everyone. Amar said "There is nothing more important than feeling that you belong to someone and are loved by someone. Without family you don't belong to anyone, you can't relate to anyone; born out of nothing."

Amar's words are intense, to say the least. Belonging and being loved in a family context is to Amar and probably all of us, vitally important. It also begs the question, 'What about the single people today; the widows, the orphans the marginalised; where do they find a family?'

Thankfully everyone can belong to God's family if they desire to. God may be referred to as 'Father' but fundamentally He is Father to a worldwide family. Jesus makes reference to this in Matthew's gospel (Matt 12:46-50).

Jesus was still talking to the people when his mother and brothers arrived. They stood outside, asking to speak with him. <sup>47</sup> So one of the people there said to him, "Look, your mother and brothers are standing outside, and they want to speak with you."<sup>[b]</sup>

<sup>48</sup> Jesus answered, "Who is my mother? Who are my brothers?" <sup>49</sup> Then he pointed to his disciples and said, "Look! Here are my mother and my brothers! <sup>50</sup> Whoever does what my Father in heaven wants is my brother, my sister, and my mother."

We may or may not have living relatives but in the church 'The Family of believers' we all have fathers, mothers, brothers and sisters. We have a place to belong and thrive. We may not be blood relatives but when a person comes to faith in Christ they are adopted into God's family. In essence, we become spiritually bonded to one another, to Jesus and to Father God through the Holy Spirit.

If you have ever thought that God doesn't like you or want you in His family take to heart the following words from Hebrews 2:11-12

Both the one (Jesus) who makes people holy and those who are made holy are of the same family. So Jesus is not ashamed to call them brothers and sisters. <sup>12</sup> He says, 'I will declare your name to my brothers and sisters; in the assembly I will sing your praises.'

Whenever someone is baptised in the church we close with the words of welcome i.e. We welcome you into the fellowship of faith: we are children of the same heavenly Father; we welcome you. You have a place to belong.

May God's blessing be upon everyone in the Parish. – Revd Chris Lawrence



### Nature Notes

Well, spring has well and truly sprung now and even the oak trees now have leaves changing the tree-scape from the greys and browns of winter to the greens of summer. April, May and June are an intensive period of regeneration in nature, a time when lawns have to be mown regularly, because if they are not, they would turn into a hay field. Hay-making traditionally starts in June when the grasses are ripe and full of energy for feeding to live-stock during the rest of the year when required. If the hay is not cut, succession starts as seeds from other larger species of plants such as acorns from oak trees germinate among the grass-roots and attempt to create an oak woodland.


Every grassland hides a forest trying to get out. If it does, this is called succession. Succession id helped by the animals that visit the grassland, especially the birds. Oak jays are especially adapted to recreate oak woodlands. In the autumn, oak jays obsessively collect acorns from under the oak trees and carry them in a pouch below their beak to an open area (field) and plant them in the soil, ostensibly as a potential cache for the future, but in reality, many are not re-found and germinate. These will get mown down by the next hay-cut, but if the hay is not cut, will develop a new forest. Black-berries will also be eaten from the brambles in the hedgerows by field-mice which will also roam the fields looking for other food. In the process, the tiny seeds will pass through the mice and be expelled, still viable, in the mouse droppings and will germinate among the grasses. Thus, the brambles will also spread into the fields to protect the young oak trees. The many thrush species such as song thrushes, mistle thrushes, blackbirds, redwings and fieldfares will eat the hawthorn berries (haws) in the winter and likewise disperse the seeds in their droppings as they also fly over or forage in the fields. So, young oaks, brambles and hawthorn trees are common successors to grassland and will rapidly grow to create a new woodland. However, it takes centuries to create an ancient woodland in which dozens or scores of other plant species will develop as the cycle of life continues with old trees dying or being blown over to create new clearings into which new species will be introduced by woodland animals and wind such the seed of willows and poplars. Not so much wind in the willows as willows in the wind.

#### NEWS FROM YOUR WEALDEN DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

I am very grateful to residents for re-electing me. I was lucky enough to have a healthy majority in these difficult times – and for electors to be able to differentiate between national and local politics. Be assured I try to do the best for residents through my work – I live here, why wouldn't I? I have retained the Cabinet post for Planning & Development, and also the role of Deputy Leader to the Council.

I would just like to take this opportunity to explain how the process works with regards to planning applications.

In the first instance if you have an interest in an application (applicant, supporter or an objector) always contact me if you wish to express your views because although I receive a list of recently submitted applications on a weekly basis, I will not necessarily know if there are to be any concerns. My contact details are at the bottom of this page.

Although only a consultee, it is also wise to contact the Parish Council and find out when an application will be discussed by them. Agendas are always put up on their website three days in advance of any Planning Committee meeting – www.framfieldcouncil.org.uk and on the three village noticeboards. Ad hoc meetings are sometimes scheduled so don't rely on all the dates being in the annual meeting schedule.

The Parish Council was returned uncontested on 3 May 2019. Anyone who thinks they have the time to become a Councillor, as there are some vacancies, please let me know.

The Council now has quarterly meetings with ESCC regarding highways issues. There are significant problems with HGV's along Palehouse Common as well as the speed of vehicles on the B2192 and B2102. Our County Councillor Chris Dowling is also involved in these discussions.

The basketball area on Framfield recreation ground has been re-furbished with the assistance of a grant and the steps behind the Memorial Hall are also in the process of being replaced. There have been problems with children climbing onto the storage container on Framfield recreation ground. This is highly dangerous and it will soon be painted with anti-climb paint.

The seat outside the Hare & Hounds is going to be removed due it's unsafe condition. If anyone knows to whom the bench was dedicated I would be pleased to hear and we will contact the relatives. (The inscription has long since worn away).

Litter-picking equipment has now been purchased and although very disappointing that only two people attended the recent open session in the Memorial Hall to volunteer to help, the equipment is still available.

Its name should be warning enough (and if not, colloquial nicknames such as 'Satan's Rhubarb' and 'Death Cherries' underline the message). In 1597, Elizabethan physician John Gerard warned us 'banish it from your gardens' and steer well clear but we obviously weren't paying attention. An internet search today reveals recent stories of accidental deaths, comatose children and a naked, hallucinating German monk.

It is reported (but possibly exaggerated) that just three berries will kill you. Symptoms start with a dry mouth, dizziness and urinary retention (ha – so there was a link to urination after all!) and progress to delirium, convulsions and a heartbeat so furious that it can be heard from several feet away. It's all downhill from there. Incredibly, the berries are the safest part of the plant – you wouldn't want to go anywhere near the roots.

Wicked witches would use the berries in a potion to make their broomsticks rise. Wicked women in Venice, looking for a similar reaction in their men, used deadly nightshade eye drops to dilate their pupils. The plant's scientific name belladonna means 'beautiful woman.' The potential side effects of this beautification would later be the answer to the question 'how do you make a Venetian blind?'

Barcombe botanist David Lang tells a tale of a student found staggering the streets drunk and disorderly. Nothing new there – until a police doctor saw his wide eyes and realised he had been poisoned by belladonna. He was rushed to hospital where it transpired that his landlady was trying to extract medicine from the berries and was straining them through the same strainer she was using to make his coffee each morning. You won't get a kick like that in Costa. So, be cautious of this killer as you walk the Downs in June to ensure that your life, which to paraphrase Mr Joyce is already a 'parenthesis of infinitesimal brevity', is not made any briefer.

### **Deadly nightshade** by Michael Blencowe of the Sussex Wildlife Trust

"A poison bouquet to strike him down"

June 16<sup>th</sup> is Bloomsday, a celebration of the life of James Joyce, whose novel Ulysses follows Leopold Bloom's escapades on that June date in 1904. Throughout Ulysses, Joyce uses flowers to symbolize romance and the lure of the exotic. Aside from fornication Joyce also tackles expiration, hallucination and urination. All of which (well, apart from the urination) remind me of another bloom that will be raising hell around Sussex in June.

Deadly nightshade looks innocent enough. A tall plant with lush leaves and purple, bell-shaped flowers. Later in the year the glossy berries will catch your eye; dangling temptingly like black pearls. It's in the plant family Solanaceae; related to potatoes and tomatoes. But deadly nightshade isn't the sort of relative you'd invite round for dinner. And you certainly wouldn't want it anywhere near the food. It is lethally poisonous.

# Water main replacement at Palehouse Common, Framfield

This area has suffered a number of water pipe bursts which have resulted in customers not receiving any water or suffering low pressure and to help rectify the situation we will be replacing the old unreliable water main.

Work on an engineering scheme to install approximately a mile of new water main will take place along Palehouse Common between the B2192 Lewes Road junction and 12 Palehouse Common.

As a safety precaution for pedestrians, motorists and our contractor we will need to close Palehouse Common to <u>through traffic only</u> for the entire scheme length. A diversion route, which has been agreed in conjunction with the East Sussex County Council Highways department, will be clearly signed for the duration of the work.

Local people will be able to access their homes or businesses throughout this project although access may be subject to short delays depending on the location of work in relation to individual properties.

Construction is planned to start on Tuesday 28 May, 2019, and the project is expected to take approximately 11 weeks to complete but our contractor's staff will work hard to complete the work as quickly and safely as possible.

#### TWO HORSE EVENTS

On Easter Monday I decided to have a day out on my own, abandoning the family and even the dog! The only thing I took was my super shopping trolley loaded with my food and drink. The trolley also has a fold down seat which is so useful. The event was the London harness Horse Parade which was at the South of England showground Ardingly. Originally there was the London harness horse parade and also the London van horse parade. They were later amalgamated into the London horse parade, which is now held at Ardingly. This is very different from a horse show as it is not a competition. The object of this event is to check the condition of the horses, harness and carriages.

This is a wonderful opportunity to see a wide variety of horses and ponies and even donkeys, pulling all kinds of vehicles from an invalid carriage to impressive carriages used for weddings and funerals. There were also London trollies, milk floats and many more. Lots of the vehicles were very old and beautifully restored. A most impressive outfit was a covered wagon train.

There were the tiniest Shetlands, welsh ponies, heavy horses and many other breeds. There are no show rings, it is all open so you can walk round where you like and watch the horses on the move or being inspected. I chose to sit and watch the veterinary and farrier inspections. The turnouts were immaculate and the horses were the picture of health with their gleaming coats. Some were very high spirited. I was surprised and impressed to see very young children confidentially driving their ponies.

The commentary was informative and there was lots of information in the catalogue a very enjoyable day out.

The second horse event was a wonderful present from the family for my last very big birthday. This event was a day at Hurst Green Shires, near Oxted for a driving and riding experience day. I was accompanied by my niece who had her own pony some years ago. I was interested in driving as it was something I had never done and it looked easy enough. I had been taken in a pony and trap as a very young child and loved it.

We had a brief talk by the owner and were introduced to all the horses, many had been rescued. Being close to them they looked huge. I glanced at one horse and was very surprised to see a very small girl in the pen giving him a stroke and a cuddle, this massive creature gently put his head down to nuzzle his little companion. I was amazed to discover this was a stallion that would make most people very wary.

We then did some grooming and "helped" harness up the horse we were going to drive. It seemed very complicated and was extremely heavy. We then went into the sand school and practiced driving using an exercise cart; it was much more difficult than I thought it would be. I was interested that voice commands are used a lot. After lunch we practised driving outside.

Being rather old and crotchety I had no intention of riding. I had a pony when young and the last time I rode was on our honeymoon in Ireland in 1969! However the owner thought I should at least sit on one. The horse was over seventeen hands and I am very small. They optimistically brought over a set of three steps so I could reach the saddle and climb on. I was still too low but with several members of staff pushing and shoving I was more or less up there but found it very difficult getting one leg over the saddle due to my artificial hips, with someone pulling on my leg I was at last in position, feet in stirrups. It looked a very long way down to the concrete floor. They had kindly provided me with a hard hat, a child's one with a colourful bobble on the top! I was taken into the sand school and actually rode round on my own, rather nervously wondering if my mount would suddenly run off with me. In fact he was sweet and walked very carefully with his elderly rider. There was a low step leading out of the sand school. He stopped and I could not persuade him to move forward. The owner explained that he know I was worried so just stood still. Interestingly he walked straight out with my niece who was more confident. It was now time to dismount. The steps were in position. I tried to swing my right leg backwards over the saddle but it wouldn't go. I tried again but could not lift it high enough, someone tried to help but it still would not go. I was stuck. I wondered what it would be like living the rest of my life stranded on the back of a horse! There I was surrounded by all the staff and my
