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

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The face of Jesus is our face; time to start again?

Imagine a billboard 1000 kilometres long x 491 metres high, covered with A4 photographs. Each photograph is a portrait of every person who is currently living on the planet. If you were to add them all up the number of photographs would total approximately 7.9 billion. In its entirety this vast collage of humanity would represent the person of Jesus for as the Bible says **we are all made in the image and likeness of God** (Genesis 1:26-27).

In our increasingly godless society try as we may there is no getting away from God. Every time you look in a mirror the face of Christ is looking back at you; challenging but true all the same.

Image is very important in today's culture. What you look like and what you wear and how you conduct yourself is part of the image that we project onto our fellow man; but is that the real you? As scripture reminds us **'Man looks at the outward appearance but God looks on the heart'.** (1 Samuel 16:7)

As we journey toward Easter perhaps the most vivid image that we associate with the season is of Jesus dying an agonising death on a rough wooden cross over 2000 years ago. Without any background knowledge, the death of this innocent man would appear to be pointless. Even in Jesus' day his death was seen as pure foolishness to some religious groups. However, there is always more to life if we choose to stop and ask ourselves a few questions and look beyond the superficial.

Personally speaking, I view the Cross of Christ as a culminating point in history where the waywardness of human nature stained with sin is brought to an end. Here we see the mercy and grace of God being lovingly brought to bear on us and for us.

Jesus' crucifixion horrendous as it was is almost overshadowed by the flogging and scourging that preceded it. The detail is seriously distressing and anyone who has seen Mel Gibson's - 'The Passion of The Christ' could not fail to be moved. It fact the prophet Isaiah foretells Jesus' suffering in Chapter 52:14 'His appearance was so disfigured beyond that of any man and his form marred beyond human likeness'.

There is always a price to be paid for sin but thank God literally that Jesus has already paid the price. The ugliness of sin that over the years had marred the perfection and beauty of God's creation once seen in humanity could now be transformed. It's there for everybody, but if you are to benefit from it you have to understand Christ's sacrifice and not dismiss the Cross as purely a symbol associated with Easter.

So what of appearance you may ask; is God in the makeover business? If you were to accept that through Jesus God has paid the price for your sin would he also make you beautiful, after all, the Cross is a place of divine exchange? The answer is no and yes!

For a woman, if you think you may go to sleep one night and wake up looking like a super model then you will probably be disappointed and no chaps you're unlikely to wake up miraculously transformed into the likeness of George Clooney! However, if you were to wake up with a new heart brought back to life and overflowing with love and joy; the burdens and trauma of your old life erased then you would be beautiful indeed and yes, that would be written on your face for all to see! This is where the transformation of beauty takes place and it is firstly when your innerself is renewed that you start to radiate the beauty and love of God that is truly wonderful and attractive.

So is it time to start over; time to give to God your old life, and with it the pain and grief that you have lived through or may be currently living through? If it is time then 'seize the day' with this prayer:

Lord Jesus Christ, I am sorry for the things I have done wrong in my life. (take a few moments to ask His forgiveness for anything particular that is on your conscience)

Please forgive me. I now turn from everything that I know is wrong. Thank you that you died on the cross for me so that I could be forgiven and set free. Thank you that you offer me forgiveness and the gift of your Spirit. I now receive that gift.

Please come into my life by your Holy Spirit to be with me forever. Thank you, Lord Jesus. Amen

NEWS FROM YOUR WEALDEN DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

Local Plan – planning applications. I wanted to clarify the reasons for the failure of the Local Plan. Wealden believed they had enough evidence to constrain our housing numbers across the District because of the protection we felt the Ashdown Down as a Special Area of Conservation within the Habitats Regulations was entitled to. This was something on which our neighbouring authorities did not concur with us and ultimately when it came to the Public Examination in front of a Government Inspector, neither did she. She failed our Plan and automatically increased our numbers in line with a Plan without any constraints.

I wanted to make it clear because there seems to be a great deal of mis-information on social media that Wealden have caused the recent flurry of planning applications. If we hadn't taken the stand that we did, we would have those housing numbers in any case and much of the District including Framfield Parish would still be 'open season' for developments. We are putting together a new Local Plan with the higher numbers but that does take time – and has a timetable set out by Government. However, as we progress into next year the Plan will have some weight so will be able to be used as a guide for the delivery of housing etc.

In the meanwhile, there has been and no doubt will continue to be applications submitted which are unpalatable to residents. These will be determined by Wealden in line with the fact – would they be putting them in the Plan in any case? and if so, all things being equal, will receive a recommendation for approval. If they don't 'make the grade' refusal will be given. Wealden are not approving everything which crosses their desks.

Much of the Parish is designated Low Weald and therefore has no protection against development such as the AONB (Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty) which does cover some of Blackboys in the east. Therefore, development proposals will be considered seriously by planners, although I would like to think that Blackboys has had its share of housing for the time being.



And from Sylvia Webb a favourite recipe:

APPLE CAKE INGREDIENTS

145g Soft Margarine 225g Caster Sugar 3 x Medium Eggs 225g Self Raising Flour 1.5 teaspoons Baking Powder6 drops Almond Essence285g Cooking Apples.

METHOD

Heat oven to 170c. Well grease a 20.5cm (8") round cake tin with butter. Approx. baking time 1 hour.

Peel and chop apples - small cubes are ideal, place in water with lemon juice to stop apples turning brown.

Place the other ingredients apart from the apple together in a mixing bowl. I use an electric whisk to beat the mixture. Once mixed place some of the mixture in the baking tin. Strain and dry apples and place a layer into the baking tin, then add more cake mixture. Carry on layering, finishing with cake mixture on the top. Bake in the top of the oven.

After baking leave cake in tin for about five minutes. Remove onto a wire tray until cold. Sprinkle with icing sugar.

Keep cake in refrigerator and eat within 3 days of baking - if it lasts that long!!.

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Nature Notes

From about 21st March to September 21st, days will be longer than nights. We are still learning how important this is to us and the natural world. Many of us suffer from Seasonal Affected Disorder (SAD) or low mood due to a lack of day light. A tortoise, dormouse or hedgehog will hibernate and sleep through the dark months. Humans evolved in the tropics where animals don't need to hibernate. We tend to retire into our houses to keep warm and cosy on dark winter days and nights. Many of us take vitamin D tablets to make up for the lack of sun.

Blue tits are tightly connected to phases of the sun. Male blue tits start singing on 22nd December and from then to March 21st demonstrate potential nest cavities to females. Female blue tits start to take nest material such as honeysuckle bark and moss into the cavity around the 21st March. They aim to have their nestlings fledged and flying by 21st June. Humans have celebrated solstice and equinox for thousands of years and Christian liturgy links its major celebrations approximately to these times (Christmas, Easter, Feast of the Sacred Heart, Harvest Festival). Grasses mature and flower in June and farmers know that June is the time to cut good hay. That is when the grass pollen count is highest. Wind pollinated grasses don't need the help of insects for that.

In temperate zones, the growing season is from the spring equinox to the summer solstice. Most terrestrial temperate organisms know that, even deciduous trees. I find it fascinating that most trees in the tropics and arctic zones are evergreen, but most trees in temperate zones are deciduous. They *decide* to shed their leaves in the autumn and grow new ones from the spring equinox to the summer solstice. During this time most folivorous insects such as moth caterpillars flourish and feed on the juicy young arboreal leaves and in turn the birds, such as blue tits, feed the caterpillars to their nestlings. Plant leaves are the solar panels of the planet, generating stored, carbon rich, energy and oxygen for all life. They can also regulate the water cycle as they take water from the soil and release it into the air from their leaves often making it rain in the tropical and temperate rain forests of planet earth.

My Back Pages by Michael Blencowe of the Sussex Wildlife Trust

I love old natural history books. It's not just the information they contain. I love the smell, I love the binding. For the past twelve months I've avoided Covid anxieties by burying my head in old books, scientific papers and traveller's journals. I've been researching a book of my own, an account of my travels in search of what remains of the world's iconic extinct animals. A journey which took me from the dark forests of New Zealand to the ferries of Finland and finally to an inflatable crocodile floating on Widewater Lagoon in Shoreham.

After spending long lockdown nights writing at my computer it was somewhat surreal to receive an advance copy of my book in the post this morning and to run my hands over its embossed cover. I finally filed it on my bookcase where it rubbed shoulders, and spines, with *On The Origin of Species* by Charles Darwin and *Animal Magic* by Johnny Morris.

My bookshelves sag with old natural history books. Just holding these tomes transports me to another time. Tucked away inside my battered (but beloved) copy of *The Butterflies of Eastbourne* (1928) by Robert Adkin is a map, which I always unfold eagerly as if I've discovered the concealed directions to some longlost buried treasure. Indeed, in the book Adkin describes bounteous butterfly riches which could be found in the woodlands and downland coombes between Lewes and Eastbourne. You can almost hear Rudyard Kipling whisper of "something lost behind the Ranges. Lost and waiting for you. Go!" At the time, many young explorers answered the call and Adkin claimed that "almost daily during the summer, one meets small armies of schoolboys each armed with a butterfly net."

Perhaps Adkin's eager Eastbourne entomologist army had been inspired by another of my favourite books. *The Outdoor World* (1900) by William Furneaux aimed to distract children from "victimising their schoolmates" and give them "a taste for something better." Back in 1900, it seems pinning butterflies and collecting birds' eggs fell into the "something better" category. Furneaux encouraged young naturalists to make "killing bottles" in which they could dispatch butterflies, and instructed children to ask the local chemist for some cyanide. The chemist will, Furneaux assures you, sell you cyanide if "he is satisfied with your intentions." Although it all sounds rather macabre now, this popular book went on to inspire a generation of young naturalists (and probably one or All agendas are put on the village noticeboards and website. FRAMFIELD PARISH COUNCIL – REPORT

The Parish Council met remotely and agreed the budget for 2021/22. Some items currently under discussion are – the refurbishment/repair of two bus shelters and the possibility of replacing all the benches on Framfield recreation ground with new ones. Any memorial plaques would be transferred to the new benches. If anyone wishes to discuss this who might have a connection to any of the benches please get in contact with me.

We have also been instructed by East Sussex County Council that our streetlights might no longer conform to current standards by way of the number, positioning and design. Therefore, we are in the process of commissioning a survey to look at the issue in more depth. Framfield Parish has an extraordinarily high number of streetlights for a relatively rural Parish so any changes are going to be very costly.

Planning applications – residents are no longer being sent letters by Wealden District Council (WDC) as part of the consultation process, only advice notices will be on sites/households – this is all part of WDC's 'Drive to Digital'. If any anyone, whether the applicant in an application or an interested party wishing to make representation to the PC, please contact me at the earliest opportunity The Parish Council receives weekly lists of applications which can also be accessed on the WDC website so I can easily pinpoint if an application has been submitted. <u>http://www.wealden.gov.uk/</u><u>Wealden/Residents/Planning_and_Building_Control/Leaflets_And_Public ations/Weekly_List_of_Planning_Applications/Planning_Weekly_List.as px</u>.

ESCAPE FROM THE FIRE

Set up from scratch 15 years ago, Tickerage is a boutique family owned and run vineyard making still and sparkling wines situated along the Wealdway in the heart of Blackboys. It is a hidden gem - you may have walked past without even realising it!

Having retrained in viticulture at Plumpton College, Anthony undertakes every aspect of the vineyard work from pruning to picking. From 5 acres under vine, Zena and Anthony handcraft their gold and silver award-winning wines including a Rosé, Blanc de Blancs and Classic Cuvée. Their latest developments include a White Pinot Noir and Chardonnay, the latter has recently been awarded Silver by the independent and prestigious IEWA.
