Goodbye, Au revoir, Auf Wiedersehen

Greetings to everyone in the parish. This will be my last parish magazine article as my retirement date of 31st August looms ever closer.

The beginning of September heralds a new chapter in the life of the church and community. As C of E tradition dictates, the church goes into a period of interregnum until a new priest is appointed.

There is much we could say about the inevitability of change. The world is in a different place to when Sarah and I and our four daughters arrived in November 2007. Climate change was only being talked about as something we should all take seriously, yet today we are having to address the real effects worldwide.

Warfare on a large scale was something that we would never have conceived in the 21st Century yet Russia has decided its ok to invade Ukraine and if left unchecked possibly other neighbouring countries. In the case of Russia, I always find it amazing how the lies and manipulation of one man can have such a detrimental effect on such a large number of people.

The tragedy is that Mr Putin doesn't realise that he is the one being manipulated. Akin to the ruling parties of Jesus' day He challenges them to believe in Him and His words, yet they won't accept Him or what He has to say. On the contrary they are looking for a way to kill him! Jesus then identifies the root of their problem. You belong to your father, the devil, and you want to carry out your father's desires. He was a murderer from the beginning, not holding to the truth, for there is no truth in him. When he lies, he speaks his native language, for he is a liar and the father of lies.

Yet because I tell the truth, you do not believe me! (John 8:44-45).

The point about mentioning Jesus' words as truth are important. If we don't know or accept God's word as truth, then we are open to manipulation. Over the years I've had many conversations of the like that the church needs to update itself and fall in line with a changing society. However, to my mind that's a huge mistake. It begs the question, who has the right to rewrite God's word?

Apart for all the amazing accounts in the Bible, God's word is a mirror for us as individuals to look into. The only problem is that you may not like what you see!

In the early days I used to read the proverbs over my Cornflakes, but it often proved too much. I quickly realised how far I had fallen short as a human being and how deceived I was in thinking that I was one of the good guys. As Paul reminds us 'for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God' (Romans 3:23).

The deception is in the fact that we compare ourselves to others. It's a horizontal plane in which our shortcomings aren't seen as that bad, therefore in our own analysis we are righteous. Furthermore, If we are righteous in our own sight then we have no need of God or indeed of Jesus the Saviour.

God begs to differ! The truth of self-analysis is when God says don't compare yourselves to others but compare yourself to my Son. Now the view isn't horizontal, its vertical. I've only ever heard of one account where a man reckoned that he had never sinned in his entire life: absolutely squeaky clean. To which the interviewer said, "I bet you're really proud of your achievement". And that was his point of failure – the sin of pride.

God offers us salvation and a place in Heaven as a gracious gift for all who will accept that their righteousness is insufficient, and that Jesus' righteousness is all sufficient. However, we shouldn't take the view that belief in Christ is an insurance policy that you cash in when you die. From the moment you believe God gently goes to work, making you a better version of yourself.

Personally, I'm grateful to God that I haven't had to live the second half of my life relying on my own will or intellect. Two are better than one and having God's guiding hand has saved me from may pitfalls and poor decisions. Additionally, I and many of the faithful in Framfield know the God who provides, not just materially but physically, mentally and spiritually.

Well, it's time to sign off. Abundant blessings to all in the parish, both now and in the future. I'll leave you with the words from 3 John 1:2-4:

2 Beloved, I pray that all may go well with you and that you may be in good health, as it goes well with your soul. 3 For I rejoiced greatly when the brothers came and testified to your truth, as indeed you are walking in the truth. 4 I have no greater joy than to hear that my children are walking in the truth.

Nature Notes

It is early July as I write, and Uckfield is full of fledged birds hungrily looking for food. Now is a good time to put out those bird feeders to help them succeed in the competition for food. I always advise against using peanuts because these can choke and kill nestling birds. However, I do use sunflower hearts which are ideal and popular with many species of birds, and can still be purchased. They can be pricy but it is worth it.

Birds visiting my 'squirrel buster' RSPB feeder includes nuthatches, blue, great and coal tits, greenfinches, goldfinches, robins, house sparrows, great spotted woodpeckers. Blackbirds, song thrushes, dunnocks, collared doves and wood pigeons pick up crumbs on the ground dropped by other birds. There are more resident birds at this time of the year in Britain than at any other time because of all the fledglings, but their numbers are regulated by food abundance, and will decline.

There has been a dramatic decline in the numbers of insects in Britain recently, I admit that I do not have the precise answer as to why. Even many predominantly seed eating birds require insects when raising their young, so this is very worrying. Possibilities include the overuse of insecticides, climate change, aerial pollution and disease. I monitor 46 blue tit nest-boxes in Lake Wood every year, and I am pleased to say that 36 boxes were used by pairs of blue tits to breed in. However, many boxes had one or more dead chicks left in the nest which indicates that the parent birds had difficulty in feeding all of the nestlings, leading to brood reduction. Blue tits feeding nestlings require an abundance of moth caterpillars that in turn feed on oak tree leaves. They often lay an extraordinary number of eggs. The largest clutch that I have recorded in Lake Wood is 14 eggs. They lay one egg per day for 14 days. However, they can start incubating those eggs at any time during those days such that eggs laid after incubation start hatching later than the rest that were laid before incubation started. The consequence is that late hatched nestlings are smaller than the others, and are sacrificed if food is scarce.

All we can do is try to care for all levels in the ecosystem so that we fit in with, rather than dominate, the wildlife that shares our planet with us.

Speed limits in Blackboys. The Parish Council has funded the cost of a feasibility study to see what ESCC suggest will enable a 40-mph speed limit to be implemented on the Lewes Road. The Parish Council will then apply for Community Match Funding where ESCC can cover a maximum of 50% of that cost. In addition, dialogue is ongoing with the developer of the 50-house site who are willing to implement and cover the cost of a 30-mph speed limit from the entrance of the site in Framfield Road along the High Street as long as ESCC are in agreement.

Community Speed Watch is still looking for volunteers – please contact me in the first instance.

Palehouse Common – issues with HGV's. The Council is still waiting for the costings to erect some new signs to discourage HGV's from entering Palehouse from the western end.

Rural Verges as Wildlife Corridors – A Reduction in Rural Grass Cutting Trial

The Parish Council have agreed to take part in a trial to reduce the number of rural verge cuts during the year. ESCC conducted a similar exercise in 2021 and involved twelve Parishes.

The trial reduced the grass cutting service of rural verges in those areas to:

- One visibility cut undertaken around May/June
- One 1 metre Swathe with Visibility cuts in the Autumn

This change meant that they would not cut rural verges (except for visibility) at a time when flowering is often at its peak and it is the most beneficial time for pollinators. Flowering plants would then be able to complete their lifecycles and set seed, providing further biodiversity benefits.

However, safety issues remained their priority, with any visibility or access issues being picked up and rectified through the usual process.

If during the year there are concerns about visibility or access issues they should be reported to ESCC via their website.

MY LIFE WITH FUR AND FEATHER

PROBLEMS

I am sorry I have not been writing my articles, but life has been rather difficult for some time. It all started in early February. Having just finished putting my Tesco's delivery away I managed to catch my foot in the chair leg and finished up across the kitchen falling heavily on the brick floor. I knew I had broken something and finished up in hospital with what they called a femoral fracture. I already had two artificial hips that had been wonderful for many years. They thought I might need an operation but luckily decided to try physio instead. Part of this treatment was walking. This went extremely well as my instructor was a charming man who happened to have dogs, my favourite subject. I so enjoyed our conversation I had forgotten all about my injury and he was very pleased with my progress.

What I did find very annoying was that if you were an older person, like me a lot of the staff treated you as though you were senile, incontinent, or incapable of any physical activity. I was asked a lot of ridicules questions for example did I clean my teeth!

I was for some reason moved from ward to ward. I was at one time I was next to a lady who had one foot propped up in plaster and opposite was another lady with exactly the same problem! Intrigued by this I asked them both what had happened. They had both been pulled over by their dogs. They did not know each other and had totally different breeds of dogs.

Moved to yet another ward I noticed the lady opposite, propped up against her pillows. She had no interest in anything going on about her, staff or other patients; though she was awake there was no reaction. I thought how sad it was. That afternoon she had a visitor, she suddenly looked interested and brighter. I gathered it was her son and he told me she was quite deaf and did not have much sight. I was intrigued to see he produced a large pad of paper and wrote big messages on it that she could read. I asked him why she was in hospital and he explained that his mother had lots of Dachshunds and she had damaged her leg falling over one of them!! I told her son that I had owned a most adorable long

haired miniature Dachshund for over seventeen years. Using his huge pad of paper he was able to tell his mother what I had said. He then drew a brilliant picture of my little dog that he showed her. She was thrilled and gave me a lovely smile. She looked so different and happy. I admired the lovely picture he had done and I said how talented he was and he modestly said his brother was the artist in the family.

He came back the next day and kindly brought me a book he thought I might like to read and I another chat to his mother via the pad of paper.

I was discharged but was back in the hospital again within a day or so with a related problem. I was in a cubicle with curtains round me waiting for attention but could just see out and could here people's conversations. I pricked up my ears when I heard the word dog. It was a lady talking to the man who was with her who was a neighbour. This is what I gathered happened; the lady had a fall in her garden and had her little dog with her. Agitated it barked and barked staying with her for a while before running off to find help. The neighbour followed the dog who led him to the lady and he was able to take her to hospital. I have heard other accounts of this happening where a dog has gone for help.

I was back in hospital yet again a while later. I was in terrible pain in the ambulance the attendant in with me was getting very worried about me, not very reassuring! She then spoke to the driver and told him to drive as fast as he could as it was an emergency, she then phoned the hospital again saying it was an emergency and they should be ready for me. It was really very exciting speeding round the bends and tearing through the towns. It was just like a TV documentary!

I have been recovering and trying to get fit going for walks. It is amazing what you see walking slowly and quietly along peering into the hedgerows to see tracks, wild flowers and wildlife. The garden is a wild life haven with the long grass and overgrown flower beds. For extra exercise I have been climbing up on stools and balancing on the low wall surrounding the porch so I can reach the birds feeders, then I can enjoy watching the different birds from the kitchen window.

"Go wild in the country, where snakes in the grass are absolutely free." I can still remember Annabella Lwin, of new-wave pop group Bow Wow Wow, singing those words on Top of the Pops back in 1982: a clarion call for early eighties urbanites to get out into the wild.

Annabella was ecologically correct. There are indeed free snakes out there, a fact that still thrills me each time I encounter one slithering through Sussex. As a child I thought snakes were exotic creatures, which hung off African jungle branches in Johnny Weissmuller Tarzan movies to convey a vague sense of something sinister. But there's nothing sinister about the Grass Snake; the commonest of Britain's three native snake species. Mesmerising eyes, gorgeous sleek scales of olive-green and a series of stripes along their flanks. For a cold-blooded reptile they sure look hot. A key identification feature is that yellow collar encircling the back of their head. Grass Snakes have been rather short-changed when it comes to their name; they're much better at swimming than they are at sitting in the grass (a bit like Johnny Weissmuller, who performed better in the water than he did on dry land). You'll find Grass Snakes gliding through wet ditches and dykes or even in your garden pond as they hunt for their favourite food: frogs and toads.

These amphibious feasts really pile on the pounds, so when their snakeskin suits become too tight they slip out of them to reveal a larger, shiny set of scales underneath. They undertake several costume changes each year and can grow to an impressive size – two or three feet is typical but there are rumours of six-foot long monsters out there. Of course they're nothing be scared of. If threatened they either pretend to be dead, hiss a lot or, according to my reptile book, "release a pungent, foul-smelling substance from their anal gland."

In July the female Grass Snakes excavate a chamber in a mound of decaying vegetation – a compost heap is perfect. Inside, she lays 5-20 leathery eggs and the heap's heat and humidity cooks them to perfection. Set your egg timer for ten weeks and you'll return to find pencil-sized baby snakes emerging into the world.

I guess not everyone followed Bow Wow Wow's advice back in 1982 because when leading my wildlife walks I'm always amazed at how many adults have never seen a snake in Britain. But it's never too late to go wild in the country.

Local County Councillor Chris Dowling is working with Parish Council and a community group to press East Sussex County Council and Sussex Police to review the speed limits and take action.

To help address the speed issues in the High Street, a Community Speed Watch (CSW) group of volunteers could be set-up. The CSW system is a Police project and it is robust, with speeding motorists who are 'caught' by the CSW team reported online to the Police. The system has a rising level of contacts and warnings sent to offending motorists. Motorists who offend repeatedly and are reported can face Police prosecution.

Unfortunately, due to Police procedures and insurance cover, CSW cannot operate in Lewes Road.

The Parish Council would like to see a CSW set up in the Parish again, but a group of volunteers is needed- approximately 6 people. Training, equipment and support is provided.

The Tail End

This is the first of what may become an occasional series about church bell ringing, so let's begin with a paragraph, not more, on ringing history.

Bells have been part of monastic life from before medieval times. Most of these early bells were lost when Henry VIII dissolved the monasteries. In the 1600s, following the reformation, churches started rehanging their bells and the English practice of 'Change Ringing' began.

In most of the Christian world churches have a number of bells. They are either hung mouth down and swing side to side so that the clapper inside strikes the bell causing it to sound, or they are spun round and round continuously on their horizontal axis causing the bell to sound once each revolution. Either case gives what I would describe a joyous but cacophonous sound because the precise moment when any bell sounds is somewhat uncontrolled.

In the particularly English practice of change ringing all the bells start stationary in the mouth up position where they remain until a ringer pulls a rope. The bell then revolves 360 degrees, through the mouth down position, to end up stationary again with it's mouth up having sounded one "Dong" on the way. This extra controllability allows the bells to be rung in any order and that order to be changed at will. Here we have the origin of the phrase "Ringing the Changes". There can be up to twelve bells in a tower with one ringer per bell. Six or eight bells are more common.

St. Thomas À Becket in Framfield does not have a ring of bells so there is no change ringing. This is a pity as this very British tradition is at risk of dying out. Here comes the commercial bit! We are looking for volunteers who might like to try bell ringing. The church

of St Margaret the Queen in Buxted Park has a small but friendly band of ringers who practice most Wednesday evenings from 7:30 to about 9. We have eight bell the oldest of which dates from 1686 but it still rings well!

NEWS FROM YOUR WEALDEN DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

The bin strike is now over but I realise not everyone may yet have received a collection of each bin. Biffa are working hard to clear the waste and I thank you for your patience. Please contact me with any problems.

Please could residents be aware of not blocking or causing obstruction to the pavement by placing their bins in an inappropriate place. They should be placed, when waiting for collection, within the curtilage of a property, at the point where it meets the public highway. Whilst many residents do this correctly, I realise that some may not have sufficient space eg if they don't have a driveway and only a path and a gate onto the highway so bins are sometimes placed outside the gate. This should only be for a limited time until the bin is emptied and only where it does not block access along the pavement.

Framfield pumping station – residents will be aware that there is a problem at the pumping station and waste is currently having to be tankered away. I am in touch with Southern Water and will send out further information when I have it. Always contact me for any updates.

At the time of writing Government seems to be in somewhat of a muddle (!), but I have it on good authority that we will be in a position to reduce our housing numbers although this will not now be known until the early Autumn. We are therefore not publishing our Draft Local Plan until after this time which will still give us time to present it for Examination in front of a Government Inspector in 2023 even if it is towards the end of that year in line with what is required.

Since becoming Leader I have attended meetings of the Board of Conservators of Ashdown Forest and the High Weald AONB Unit (Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty) plus the Joint Waste Committee, TES (Team East Sussex), East Sussex Leaders and WSP (Wealden Strategic Partnership). It's very interesting to be a part of these organisations discussing strategic issues across the

District but never forgetting Framfield Parish which of course is close to my heart.

Elsewhere in the magazine you will see a post from David Jenner who is retiring from organising the Poppy collection this year. I would personally like to thank David for doing this for so many years along with everything else he has done and does for the Parish.

Gardening tips for Jenny Bacon,

Hello all

We hope you are enjoying the Summer and your own garden or green space. With the dry spell in July and with the threat of a hose pipe ban anything that can help conserve water has to be a consideration. Mulching your pots with either bark or gravel will help keep the moisture in for longer and keep any weeds in check, it may also be worth placing your pots somewhere with some shade rather than full sun. If you are not already doing so, why not reuse your washing up water this can be decanted into a watering can or bucket and used later, or you could fill up old milk containers and use them as a mini watering vessel and they are lighter to carry around the garden and you are effectively using the water twice. The other thing I find is our hot water takes time to come though so rather than let the cold water go to waste down the drain I fill up other containers and give as many plants as possible an extra drink especially if they were only planted this year, they will almost certainly, be thankful.

Now is a good time to take cuttings so if you have a friend who has a shrub you admire ask if you could take a few snipping's or if you have something in your garden that you would like more of it's worth a try, the worst thing that could happen is they don't take the best thing is you will have some new plants for free. Some plants take easier than others and ones that I have found that are relatively simple to do are Hydrangeas, Buddleia, Salvia's and Penstemons so if you haven't tried it before have a go, all you need

is a flowerpot, gritty compost and somewhere sheltered to keep them safe, remember to keep them well watered if it's hot and dry.

PS When taking the cuttings have a plastic bag or jug of water at the ready to keep the cuttings hydrated.

Final top tip: Now is a good time to choose and order your Spring bulbs ready to plant in the Autumn
