

Nature Notes

The climate change emergency we are experiencing is a bit of a paradox. We are currently experiencing a drought in many places around the world. However, the truth is that with the high temperatures, more surface water from planet Earth has evaporated and is suspended within the atmosphere above our heads and around us, and I mean billions of tons of water! So, why does it not fall as rain? The answer is – that it does, but only when the atmospheric conditions allow it. The Met Office say "The Earth's atmosphere exerts pressure on the surface. Pressure is measured in hectoPascals (hPa), also called millibars. Areas of high and low pressure are caused by ascending and descending air. As air warms it ascends, leading to low pressure at the surface. In general, low pressure leads to unsettled weather conditions and high pressure leads to settled weather conditions." The strength of these conditions is governed by solar energy.

The problem now is that when it does rain, more of it falls than it has in the past and this causes floods. All of this is because greenhouse gasses such as carbon dioxide and methane are trapping heat energy within the global atmosphere. So, the average temperature of the planet surface is rising leading to more extreme conditions, namely, more heat and more rain. There is also likely to be stronger wind. Such as in 1987.

So, what does this mean for nature (the biosphere)? These factors, heat, floods, and strong wind act as selective forces. Those animals and plants etc not coping, will become victims, and those that are able to cope with the conditions, will survive to breed. In the long term, this will lead to new species evolving on the planet. A process that takes many centuries. It was climate change due to a meteor that did for the dinosaurs.

What does this mean for humans? Well, if we are causing these changes by burning fossil fuels, our conscience should induce us to reverse the trend, because this natural selection will differentiate the survivors from the victims. In France, 15,000 people died of heat related causes in the very hot summer of 2003. Also, I am seeing animals in France now that books published in 1999 say should be further south. The one thing that is constant in nature is change. We surely must stop burning fossil fuels.

FRAMFIELD PARISH COUNCIL – REPORT

Community Governance Review – the Parish Council has asked to be included in a CGR organised by Wealden District Council. The request is to ask for the number of councillors to be reduced from 11 to 9. We will know the outcome in due course.

Hall hire rates – the rates which hadn't been reviewed since 2017 have been changed to an hourly system but retaining local and non-Parish rates. These new rates are in line with neighbouring parishes.

Speed limits in Blackboys. Awaiting an update from ESCC.

Palehouse Common – issues with HGV's. The Council is still waiting for the costings to erect some new signs to discourage HGV's from entering Palehouse from the western end.

Blackboys Allotments – emails have been sent to tenants who appear not to be using their plots. If anyone is struggling and wishes to relinquish their plot please let me know.

Village Market – there are two markets left this year - 29 October and 26 November. The December date has been cancelled. Markets run from 10-12 noon in the Memorial Hall, Framfield. Everyone welcome.

If anyone believes they have discovered a fault or problem with play equipment at one of the play areas, could they please contact me immediately. Although the areas are inspected on a weekly basis, any additional notification is important to the Council.

After a refreshing summer break, the staff and children of St Thomas a Becket Church of England, Blackboys and Framfield Schools, have been busy making a great start to term 1.

In the first week of term, both schools enjoyed a drum circle workshop, learning to play drum rhythms and working together as a team. Also, to celebrate our church school status, the children worked in their houses to make a recreation of Understanding Christianity's 'Big Frieze'; a visual representation of the whole bible. These big pieces of artwork now grace the hall at Blackboys and the main corridor at Framfield. Finally, all classes studied a picture book called 'My Beautiful Voice', which tells the reader about the impact an inspiring teacher can have on pupils who might usually be a little shy. The children used the book as an inspiration for their own writing, be it in poetry, narrative or non-fiction form.

Our two schools are working really closely together at the moment. Both are currently working on their upcoming Harvest Festivals. Lorraine from the Uckfield Food Bank has spoken to both schools to inspire their harvest food collections and the schools are filled with lovely singing of traditional harvest hymns and songs.

In the summer, Framfield School had an external re-fresh, with new paint at the front of school and repairs to brickwork and roof. At Blackboys the outside area for Class 1 was totally re-vamped with an exciting new reading den added. The Federation Football kit was also replaced with a smart new look sponsored by local company MJD Designer Homes. Thank you to them for their support. The kit has arrived just in time for the boys' and girls' football tournaments at Uckfield College.

Although the new academic year has only just begun, we are thinking already about opening our schools for show rounds ready for Reception pupils for September 2023. At the time of print, the new Prime Minister has stepped in replacing the energy price cap with the energy price guarantee. MY LIFE WITH FUR AND FEATHER

INTRUDERS

I am writing this in early September so by the time you are reading it; it will be quite dark and gloomy. This summer the weather has been very strange, from heat waves to torrential rain. The pond in our wood hardly had any water in it and was surrounded by thick mud. My son's black and white Spaniel decided to take a short cut across the pond to come and see me and come out completely black. She was not pleased when I hosed her off and made horrible cries of protest. Incredibly just after this we had a rainstorm and the next morning, I was amazed to see the pond was completely full. A few days earlier a new telegraph pole was installed in our garden right next to the drive. I walked down the drive and saw that all the filling for the pole had been washed out as the water rushed down the drive. The electricity people had to come out and fill the hole to make it safe!

The first intruders I noticed were bees who decided to make a nest neatly tucked behind the weather boarding above the kitchen window. They were fine, no trouble at all. Eventually they all vanished. Meanwhile wasps arrived and decided to build a nest again under the weather boarding on the opposite side of the cottage by the French doors leading on to the terrace that is used frequently by family, visitors, and dogs. They were fine, very good tempered, ignoring all the comings and goings. I could stand directly under their nest building and quite enjoyed watching them. However, one night when the lights were on they suddenly changed. The outside of the French doors was covered in agitated wasps, luckily, they were closed. I went to bed and had the light on and could see some wasps on the window. It was closed so I was not bothered. I then became aware of something flying round the room, it was a wasp, and then I noticed another one. I climbed out of bed and went into the kitchen to find a container and suitable cover so I could catch the wasps and put them outside. Eventually I captured the two now angry wasps The French doors were still covered in wasps so I could not open them. I unlocked another door and let them out. I then went back to bed to read my book. Something whizzed past me, another wasp then another, soon there were lots of them flying round the room. I climbed out of bed, looked behind me to see a wasp crawling about on my bed, then managed to step on one who reasonably enough

stung the bottom of my foot. I know people love going to the gym or going to keep fit classes but why bother when you can get all the exercise you need trying to catch a room full of wasps. Eventually after an hour or more I had collected all of them, no wasp was hurt during this exercise! I then bravely went outside to see how they had managed to get in, taking a long-handled broom so I could bang all-round the window frame. Eventually I found a tiny gap that they had managed to squeeze through.

It must have been the strange weather as I was then getting bitten by midges that came indoors and then had lots of flies who would fly into my mug of tea and drown. I am quite happy with spiders and spent some time gently guiding them into suitable hiding places so I would not stand on them. They also liked the bathroom, so I had to remove them before showering. One day I saw a big thing on the French door I could not work out what it was then realised it was a huge slug I had never seen anything like it before.

The wasps all settled down again and did not try and come indoors again and the midges stayed outside and so did the flies.

On the plus side the wildlife is wonderful, and the woodpecker eats from the feeder attached to the window, so I get a wonderful close-up view of him and today the Long-tailed tits are back, it used to be November of December when they arrived so are seasons are changing

Just for the record, I've never trusted them. Unlike all the other familiar, friendly faces on my back garden bird table there's just something about the Great Tit that's always made me suspicious. Perhaps it's my mistrust of uniforms. The Great Tit's smart plumage with a collar, black tie and a glossy black cap makes them look too official, too authoritative. And that bright yellow chest? Far too garish for the garden.

Their behaviour isn't exactly endearing either. Great Tits are the bullies on the bird table. They'll aggressively assert their authority and violently peck at other birds as they plunder the peanuts. When a house-hunting Great Tit can't find a suitable hole to nest in, it'll simply evict a Blue Tit and move in.

Their dominance is also heard in spring when their two-note song, "Tea-cher! Tea-cher! Tea-cher!" rings out through our woodlands. It was this "Tea-cher!" that taught me my first lesson in bird song identification; an easily recognisable two-note war cry used to proclaim the tit's territory. But I was soon to learn that not everything was how it seemed. Each male actually has an average of four different songs, which can be sung at three different tempos. This varied repertoire is a sly Beau Geste trick employed to trick other Great Tits into thinking that a woodland is more crowded than it really is. The birds who know the most tunes secure larger territories and breed more successfully. And it's a trick that fools me each year too; if I don't recognise a bird call in the woods it's always a Great Tit.

Through aggression and deceit, these birds have successfully established an empire that spreads from England to China. And it's from the far-flung corners of this empire that we've recently received reports of some rather worrying behaviour. From Finland came news of a group of Great Tits changing their vegan diet of seeds and nuts to something much more meaty: other birds. In Hungary, scientists made the chilling discovery of a population of Great Tits which have developed a taste for the brains of hibernating bats. Sure, these are isolated incidents at the moment but with human society plunging rapidly towards the abyss and an army of Great Tits acquiring a taste for blood and brains, is it unreasonable to hypothesise a postapocalyptic future where humans are at the mercy of plagues of zombie Great Tits? Close your windows people – they're coming for us.
