

Letter from Revd James Vine as read out on 22nd January

Following an interview on 5th January we are pleased to announce the Bishop has appointed Revd James Vine as Priest in Charge of Framfield and Priest in Charge of Chiddingly with East Hoathly. The appointment was announced at Sunday service on 22nd January. As part of the announcement, we received a letter from Revd James, which follows below:

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

I am so excited to have been called to serve you all in your three wonderful communities. Now that the official announcement has been made, I thought it would be good to introduce myself....

I was born and brought up in the Village of Westham, and attended schools in Westham and Eastbourne. I began a nursing career in Hastings in 1985, qualifying as a Registered General Nurse in the May of 1988, working initially in paediatrics, then moving on to Adult Cardiac Care. I responded to a call to Ordained ministry towards the end of the 1990's, attended theological college at St. Stephen's House Oxford, and was ordained in the summer of 2000.

Having served my Curacy at Eastbourne Parish Church, I have been Vicar of Saint Luke's Stone Cross with North Langney since 2003 and Priest in Charge of Pevensey Parish since September 2021. I am married to Clare and we have two grown up children; Chloe who is a Piano Teacher and lives with her husband in Rye, and Sebastian who lives with his Fiancé in Bournemouth and

manages a large Wetherspoons in the town centre. We have two dogs; Zorro, a Border Collie and Wicket, an English Cocker Spaniel. We also have a lone cockatiel called Eccles!

I am eager to begin this next chapter of my ministry with you all, particularly working with the schools in the Parishes as well as continuing the excellent work achieved by Chris and Phill. I hope to strengthen the links between the churches and the communities that they serve and can't wait to get to know you all over the coming months.

I'm also very pleased to announce that Bishop Martin has agreed for me to continue my role as training to my current Curate, the Reverend Janice Bartholomew. Janice is a part time, self-supporting minister, currently in Deacon's orders. Janice will be ordained as a Priest in June and is looking forward to continuing her training with you all in Framfield, Chiddingly and east Hoathly.

Please be assured of my prayers for you, and I look forward to meeting you all in person following our move to East Hoathly.

Appeal for Church Office Re-organisation and Electrical Supply

The Church Diocese intend to rent out the Vicarage as from the 1st of December 2022 following our Vicar Chris Lawrence's retirement.

The church diocese will then terminate the electrical supply from the vicarage for the office on the 30th of November 2022. We are then required to arrange an alternative supply from our Church Hall to the office. This requires electrical and ground works to establish this new supply.

The total cost of these works amounts to £2100 which could not be planned within our budget. We have raised £1400 to date leaving £700 still to raise. Many thanks for your contributions.

This matter has come at a time close to Christmas and we appreciate our appeal is not happening at a good time.

Framfield Church Hall is well placed in the village next to the Church. It is ideal for regular meetings, social & business events, special occasions, keep fit, exercise groups, birthday parties and other activities.

Albedo (Latin for whiteness) is a term used in science to describe the amount of light from the sun that is reflected back into space. Namely, by clouds, snow, ice and anything white on the planet surface. In other words, the more light is reflected, the cooler the planet will be. For example, a white car, or any other white object, will reflect a little of the sun's rays, and be more visible than a dark colour, and also have a minute beneficial effect on global warming. Many animals have dark areas on their bodies to absorb light from the sun to keep them warm. It is not only humans that like to sun-bathe. As the days lengthen and the sun gets higher in the sky, many animals will sun themselves to get warm. Look out for birds doing it, also, reptiles and insects such as bumble bees.

Less light is reflected into space as polar ice and snow diminish. We should expect another hot summer this year. A good way to prevent drought affecting your garden is to install water butts to catch any rain that does fall. South-East Water Company often have offers to supply water butts at a subsidised price. Also, plant a tree, but make sure it is at least 7 metres from the house. I planted several trees in my Uckfield garden when we moved to our current house in 1987, now, the largest, a sessile oak (*Quercus petraea*) is about 10 metres tall and shades parts of the garden, absorbs CO₂ and is a magnet for insects, birds and squirrels.

I had a camera 'trap' for my birthday this year, so I set it up in my garden to record moving animals. It has an infra-red light and camera that is triggered by movement, day or night. The camera also has a solar panel on the top to charge its internal batteries in daylight. With this camera, I have discovered that there is a wonderful healthy fox visiting our garden almost every night. The camera also records animal sounds. Other animals recorded and filmed includes humans, cats, squirrels and birds.

It has become increasingly important for us to understand, conserve and live with the rich and vital biodiversity that lives around us. Human populations are increasing and we are invading more of the natural world that we depend on. I have found it very rewarding to observe and study the natural world around me. Unless we understand it we cannot value it.

FRAMFIELD PARISH COUNCIL - REPORT

Community Governance Review – the Parish Council has asked to be included in a CGR organised by Wealden District Council. The request is to ask for the number of councillors to be reduced from 11 to 9. This has now progressed through the various stages and will hopefully be in place for the May 2023 elections.

Speed limits in Blackboys.

<u>Lewes Road</u> – the Parish Council has applied to ESCC for Community Match Funding to help cover the cost of reducing the speed limit on the Lewes Road through Blackboys.

<u>High Street, Framfield Road</u> - as part of the Reserved Matters application on the 50-house site, the speed limit on the Framfield Road to just beyond the site entrance will be reduced to 40-mph. The Parish Council is working with the developer and ESCC to progress options to reduce the High Street to 30-mph.

Old Nursery House appeal – the news came in that this has been allowed. The Parish Council will now concentrate on the Reserved Matters application when it is submitted to make sure that the village obtains, in the way of infrastructure, what is needed from the development.

Budget/Precept – at their November meeting the Parish Council agreed a budget of £72,838, but set the precept at £69,000, taking the balance from general reserves. This equates to an increase of £6.41 per year to an equivalent Band D Council Tax payer.

Pavilion – works to provide a ramp which is DDA compliant will commence in late February.

If anyone believes they have discovered a fault or problem with play equipment at one of the play areas, could they please contact me immediately. Although the areas are inspected on a weekly basis, any additional notification is important to the Council.



We usually look together at the readings for the coming Sunday but during Lent we expect to be following the Chichester Diocesan Lent Course. We look forward to seeing and hearing some of you if you're able to join us.

It's around about now that I start getting a bit bored of winter. Don't get me wrong, I enjoy a bit of bleak beauty: bare trees, frosted landscapes and all that. But now I need something to get my heart racing. Send me a sign – some life in the graveyard of winter, a promise of those dynamic spring months ahead, a flash of colour. In February my light at the end of the tunnel is an oncoming butterfly.

On sculpted, vibrant yellow wings the Brimstone makes his elegant entrance into the New Year on those bright February days when you feel the warmth of the sun on your face. Its distinctive yellow wings have given birth to a legend – that this 'butter-coloured fly' inspired the word butterfly. This claim may not entirely be true. Also untrue is the notion that these February Brimstones are the first signs of the year's new life. Because by the time Brimstones appear in February they are already on their last (six) legs.

Fresh Brimstone butterflies emerged from their chrysalises in late summer, so by February they could be seven months old – and in butterfly years that's ancient. Admittedly almost all of that time they've been asleep in a hedge, sheltered from the storms under Holly and Ivy. Yet despite the worst winter weather they always emerge immaculate in the spring. They must be made of Teflon.

When they awake the (bright yellow) males search for a mate, they mate, the (pale yellow) females lay eggs and then both die. Still, an adult life of over ten months earns them the title of our longest-lived butterfly. An insect OAP.

The Brimstone's caterpillars feed on the leaves of Buckthorn and Alder Buckthorn, unobtrusive shrubs which, like the butterfly, are widespread across Sussex. When I first became the proud owner of a garden it was only a matter of days before I evicted the gnomes and planted an Alder Buckthorn. The following spring I was excited to watch a Brimstone laying her tiny skittle shaped eggs and I studied the caterpillars as they hungrily defoliated my tree. It's funny, people often complain to me about caterpillars eating their plants —

especially cabbages (the food of Small and Large White caterpillars). Why people are concerned is beyond me. Cabbages are horrible. The only reason I would ever plant a cabbage is for the pleasure of watching something else eat it.

The first Brimstone sighting in February doesn't exactly mean that spring is starting but it's certainly a sign that winter is starting to end. And right now that's good enough for me. Either way this yellow butterfly is a welcome messenger of what's to come – the first sulphurous spark to ignite the blaze of spring.

NEW LIFE CHURCH BLACKBOYS

'Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; In all your ways acknowledge him, and he will make your paths straight.' Proverbs 3 v 5-6

As we embark on a New Year - these words from the Bible are so precious - whatever lies ahead we can trust in Jesus - who is the same 'yesterday, today and forever!'

Just last week we looked at so many of God's promises to us that help us navigate these difficult times of bereavement, financial strain, anxiety over exams, jobs - so many things that will crowd in to steal our joy and peace. The young people learned the verse from Proverbs with actions - so good for them to have something true in their lives in times of increased pressure on them.

One verse that is so helpful as we ponder how to cope with all that the world throws at us is this one from John:

'Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid.' John 14 v 27

Our desire at New Life Church is to share this peace that we have found to be real and true in our own lives - through sickness, grief, troubles - and we want to share that with those around us. As you go into this New Year we pray that you may decide to investigate who Jesus is and get to know how he can transform your life - he is good and he keeps his promises! SPEEDING TRAFFIC IN BLACKBOYS

There are concerns amongst residents in Blackboys about speeding traffic in the High Street and on Lewes Road. Local County Councillor Chris Dowling is working with Parish Council and a community group to press East Sussex County Council and Sussex Police to review the speed limits and take action.

To help address the speed issues in the High Street, a Community Speed Watch (CSW) group of volunteers could be set-up. The CSW system is a Police project and it is robust, with speeding motorists who are 'caught' by the CSW team reported online to the Police. The system has a rising level of contacts and warnings sent to offending motorists. Motorists who offend repeatedly and are reported can face Police prosecution.

Unfortunately, due to Police procedures and insurance cover, CSW cannot operate in Lewes Road.

The Parish Council would like to see a CSW set up in the Parish again, but a group of volunteers is needed- approximately 6 people. Training, equipment and support is provided.

NEWS FROM YOUR WEALDEN DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

Good News – in December Government at long last announced that they were going to consult on potential ways to make decisions on what housing and infrastructure is needed locally. There is now a live consultation which runs until the beginning of March. This was only as a result of pressure put on Government by MP's supported by us/me/you. The devil will of course be in the detail and I understand that the MP's involved want out continued support to make sure we end up with what we need for where we live. We have therefore delayed the publication of our Local Plan during the consultation period.

A few other items which may be of interest – please contact me for the full details:

Electric vehicle charging points are due to be installed in Wealden-owned car parks soon.

Wealden is proposing to administer and manage a business grants programme so that rural businesses can apply for capital funding for projects which lead to job safeguarding. This might include the purchase of equipment and lasting assets or the conversion of buildings etc.

Councillors have agreed to earmark a £250,000 fund to help ease the current cost of living pressures.

As a Licensing Authority, Wealden is consulting on whether CCTV within both Hackney Carriages and Private Hire Vehicles would have a positive effect on the safety of passengers including children and vulnerable adults.

A new Wealden Vineyard guide for 2022/23 has been produced. In Sussex only there are roughly 50 vineyards, 16 within Wealden – they are all showcased in the guide.
