Nature Notes

As an ecologist, I am constantly wrestling with my conscience concerning life decisions. The world, like individual life forms, is fragile and can be damaged by meteors, volcanos, and life-form occupants. However, the biosphere is also robust and will change in response to an insult from the life forms that occupy it. An insult can be a physical abuse as well as a vocal one. Currently, humans are insulting the planetary biosphere by digging up the composted, fossilised material of past life and burning it in the atmosphere for energy that destabilises in the global climate. With this in mind, we all have to make day-to-day decisions that may *contribute* to this condition or *ameliorate* it.

I am committed to working for the maintenance of biodiversity and a healthy globe, and I regret any consequence of my actions that may lead to the death of some life form. Examples include insects killed in collision with my car as I drive, or damage to ecosystems when I release pollutants. However, sometimes self-preservation kicks in and I find myself having to deliberately control some organism or other. I always mentally express my regret for doing so. The other day, I noticed a paper ball being formed in my garage roof. It was an Asian hornet (Vespa velutina) colony forming. There was a gueen and about 20 workers building this nest. However, a sting from this species has been known to kill a human, so I had to make a decision to stop this colony from increasing. Therefore, sadly, I had to humanely send them to the great hornet's nest in the sky. Asian hornets have only recently found their way to Europe (c. 2004), and this is almost certainly due to human activity. However, European hornets (Vespa crabro) are altogether more passive, more so than their sometimes-aggressive smaller common wasp (Vespula vulgaris) cousins, and I for one am content to leave the native hornet species, even though it is larger, to complete its life cycle. Generally, they will not bother a human if a human does not bother them.

So how do I try to offset my negative consequences? Well, I try to adjust my lifestyle, for example, planting and cultivating new trees, establishing nest-boxes for animals, recycling as much as possible, mowing as little as possible, reducing meat consumption, using legs, cycles and public transport when appropriate, but not flying in planes if it can be avoided.

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Water Shrew by Michael Blencowe for Sussex Wildlife Trust

I love Jaws, the 1975 movie which sent three men out into the Atlantic on a fishing boat in search of a marauding Great White Shark. There's another aquatic monster hunting in the ponds and shallow streams of Sussex. But to find a Water Shrew...you're gonna need a smaller boat.

Water Shrews weigh 15g and measure just 16cm. Unlike other shrews they have an amazing ability to swim and hunt underwater. They're covered in dense fur – vital insulation against the cold and wet. This sleek wetsuit also traps air bubbles, transforming the shrew into a furry Aero helping it stay buoyant. Powerful, extra hairy hind feet propel this tiny torpedo through the water.

Water Shrews and Great White Sharks have a common feature that sets them apart from their close relatives. They both have a striking demarcation between their dark upperparts and their white underparts. Looking from above, their black backs blend with the pond bottom or seabed. From below, their pale bellies make them invisible in the sunlit water. It's a submarine survival strategy that helps conceal both hunters and hunted. And the Water Shrew is both.

With sharp, red-tipped fangs, a Water Shrew's jaws are as fearsome as any shark's. But the Water Shrew has a trick up its teeth. It's Britain's only venomous mammal. When it bites it injects a stupefying saliva which subdues its victims. In Jaws, the grizzled skipper Quint (Robert Shaw) relates the chilling true tale of the torpedoed WWII cruiser Indianapolis, which sank leaving hundreds of sailors adrift in shark-infested waters. Well, my mate Barry was once bitten by a Water Shrew in Newhaven and his finger went all tingly for about two hours. OK, it doesn't exactly compare, but the fact that a tiny shrew can make such an impact on a human is pretty impressive.

Slice open a dead shrew's stomach and rummage inside and you'll find bits of beetle legs, snail shells, and fishbones. They are relentless, frenetic hunters. If the shrew goes without a meal for more than an hour it will die. What we are dealing with here is a perfect engine, an eating machine. All this machine does is swim and eat and make little shrews. Between April and September, the mating of the shrew can produce 2-3 litters of 3-15 young. They live a fast, brief life. Few of them will survive for more than a year.

The best way to see a Water Shrew is to sit by a Sussex stream as the sun sets. Bring a couple of friends and some Apricot Brandy, share some tall tales, and wait for a shrew to strike.

Nature Notes

By the time you read this (in July) we will have had the longest day (21st June), but that does not mean that it will be any cooler. Sometimes we get our warmest weather as late as August. As I write, we have had about 2 weeks of persistent north-easterly wind and no rain. We are being effectively blow-dried. The prevailing wind here in England should be a wet south-westerly. Therefore, I am finding it a bit odd, and I expect the rest of nature is too. I have been filling my bird water-baths daily.

The lovely thing about June is that days are long, but it is not normally too hot nor too cold. It is a good time to be out and about. I was watching 4 well grown fox cubs from our upstairs window this morning at about 06:00 h. just playing with anything they could find. We have seen them with their mother on previous evenings. Sadly, our singing male blackbird has been caught and part eaten by either the foxes or one of the neighbours' cats. However, that is nature, and I am sure he will soon be replaced. The female is still foraging, presumably for her offspring. I was also watching some swifts feeding on flying insects over Uckfield's houses this morning. These aerial wonders arrive from Africa in early May, breed in buildings or cliffs, then return with their youngsters to Africa in August. They are among the last spring migrants to arrive and the first to leave after raising normally 2 offspring per pair. However, they are one of our longest-lived small birds, regularly living 10 and sometimes as long as 21 years, during which time they rarely land. They feed, drink, sleep and mate while flying, stopping only to care for young.

I was alarmed to see the news yesterday about the forest fires in Canada, covering 40,000 hectares, that is 98,000 acres. The smoke from these fires was making it hazardous for breathing as far away as New York. I fear this may be a harbinger of things to come in other parts of the planet this summer. It has been predicted that we may have record breaking temperatures this year. We all need to be prepared for that.

One way that we keep our roses lush is to put fresh lawn clippings around them. If lawns have to be mown, the very best thing to do with the clippings is to put them, fresh, around the roses. This may not work for other shrubs and trees as it can induce fungal infection, but not on roses.

NEWS FROM YOUR WEALDEN DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

Waste collections - Wealden District Council have been formally told that the dispute between BIFFA and the Union is now full resolved. For the record this was very different dispute to the previous strike and not related to pay.

Water Outage – Large areas in the north of the district were affected by a water outage earlier in June. This followed with similar in Polegate and more recently Buxted. The actions and explanations from SEW water have been woefully inadequate and their Chief Executive has been asked to attend our next Scrutiny Committee where he will be questioned on the recent failures and their failure to maintain an adequate supply of water to residents. There is no shortage of water but when demand is high, the equipment which cleanses the water cannot work in the necessary speed to supply it. This is due to lack of maintenance of infrastructure and lack of funding for new infrastructure. We also understand that the regulator, OFWAT, is now investigating.

Wealden Local Plan - Sustainability Appraisal/Strategic

Environmental Assessment - Scoping Report Update - To support the development of the new Local Plan, the Council is required by law to undertake a Sustainability Appraisal (SA). The SA is an integral part of the plan making process and from the outset; it must consider ways by which the plan can contribute to improvements in environmental, social and economic conditions as well as a means of identifying and mitigating any potential adverse effects that the plan might otherwise have.

The Consultation on the SA Scoping Report runs from 26^{th} June 2023 to 05.00pm on the 7th August 2023 and all parish and town councils have been advised.

Annual Report from the Chairman of the Parish Council

I would firstly like to inform everybody that Councillor Peter Friend has decided to retire from the council after just over 16 years' service to the Parish Council. Peter will be greatly missed from the team who has offered a wealth of experience and wisdom over the years. "Thank You Peter, we wish you well, and hope to see you at the village markets".

We also welcome new councillors to the team – Councillor Trishia Blewitt and the return of Councillor David Jenner. We had an uncontested election this year, and still have seats available for coopting. If anybody would is interested in joining the Parish Council, please pop along to one of our meetings and/or email us for more details.

The Parish Council is financially in a good place. Whilst we have some higher reserves than normal, there are plans for some upcoming major works/projects throughout the parish that will require significant funding.

We have some ongoing projects and issues that are being addressed with various stakeholders. At the time of writing this, I can confirm that I and other councillors that have re-stood for election will be able to continue with this work, avoiding further delay. Details can be read in the meeting minutes. The quickest way to access these are on our website.

Between the Parish Council and Trusts, there is plenty of work to do. Our costs have increased significantly which is why there was a modest increase in the Precept. As already mentioned, if you think that you would like to be a councillor and take some of the workload, please get in touch.

The Wealden Community Lottery has now been active for a few weeks. Unfortunately, we only have 4 supporters at present, and so our hopes of new outdoor gym equipment may take some time.

Whilst the village market was very busy in April, it would be nice to see more engagement from the local community. Funds raised from this go towards to the upkeep of the Memorial Hall.

2023-2024 is going to be extremely busy and challenging. Our biggest challenge at the moment is the campaign to reduce the speed limit in Blackboys to 30MPH. This is an extremely complicated process, and updates will be available in the village magazine, and on our website.

Finally, thank you to the staff and councillors for all of the work put in over the past year and term. Thank you for all of the comments and thanks from within the community, it is wonderful to know that even small differences are appreciated.

SPEEDING TRAFFIC IN BLACKBOYS

There are concerns amongst residents in Blackboys about speeding traffic in the High Street and on Lewes Road. Local County Councillor Chris Dowling is working with Parish Council and a community group to press East Sussex County Council and Sussex Police to review the speed limits and take action.

To help address the speed issues in the High Street, a Community Speed Watch (CSW) group of volunteers could be set-up. The CSW system is a Police project and it is robust, with speeding motorists who are 'caught' by the CSW team reported online to the Police. The system has a rising level of contacts and warnings sent to offending motorists. Motorists who offend repeatedly and are reported can face Police prosecution.

Unfortunately, due to Police procedures and insurance cover, CSW cannot operate in Lewes Road.

The Parish Council would like to see a CSW set up in the Parish again, but a group of volunteers is neededapproximately 6 people. Training, equipment and support is provided.
