#### From the Vicar's desk

I seem to have been spending an inordinate amount of time on Rotas this month! It was always going to be a challenge meeting the needs of three distinct Churches and It's important that I get it right.

Last month, I said that I was about to embark on Christmas planning, and I'm pleased to announce that I've finally done it!

December had to include:

- Three Carol Services
- Three Crib Services
- Three Christingle Services
- Two Christmas Concerts
- One Midnight Holy Communion.
- And finally: Three Christmas Morning Services!

I'm pretty sure that this is the final version: so for your information, Christmas services are shown on the church website.

#### Rural Ministry:

Although I grew up in the countryside, all my Ordained ministry has been in Eastbourne town or the suburbs of Stone Cross and Langney.

I am very keen to explore the unique opportunities and indeed challenges of Rural ministry, and with this in mind have been exploring what support and training might be available for a new rural minister.

On Monday the 18th of September Revd. Janice and I are attending a oneday Rural Ministry Conference organised by the Diocese of Chichester. The Diocese writes this:

For hundreds of years village churches have been at the centre of their rural communities. Despite a growing ambivalence about organised religion, a significant number of the rural population still see the village church as their spiritual home, a beacon of hope in an uncertain world, and a symbol of God's unchanging love. This unique dynamic, where the rural church is deeply rooted in the wider community, provides both challenge & opportunity. If rural churches are to survive, they need to recover their role as hubs of community life. And if they are to flourish,

"they need to recover their confidence in the transformative power of the Gospel to change hearts and lives" - Bishop Robert Atwell.

This Rural Conference, building on a similar event last autumn ('How Village Churches Thrive') will provide an opportunity for clergy, churchwardens, and all who want to see their local churches flourish, to be encouraged, to renew confidence, and to be inspired. As well as input from seasoned practitioners in rural mission & ministry; there will be opportunity to discuss and share with those in similar contexts, as well as receive practical and imaginative ideas to strengthen the life of the local Church, in loving & serving our rural communities.

Following on from this, I have been recommended a residential course this October which I am pleased to say that each of our three parishes have agreed to fund me to attend.

This is an intensive 2-day course that tackles all the issues that I am beginning to identify in our three wonderful parishes.

Sessions include:

#### Rural Contexts: Place & People

The aim is to help participants begin to understand their specific context. Looks at some of the issues faced by rural communities, including housing, poverty, and transport. Considers the different, increasingly diverse groups of people who make up rural communities. This is a more sociological view, also looking at different types of social capital and the church's place in rural communities.

#### Exploring Rural Leadership

How do we lead from a faith perspective? How can we build partnerships with our communities?

#### **Rural Mission & Evangelism**

For effective mission, context is key: what works in one community won't necessarily work in another. We explore what mission means in the rural context and create space for delegates to share stories from their own communities. What are the overlaps with evangelism? The rural context has its own specific opportunities and challenges which are explored here.

#### Rural Children and Young People

Children and young people are present in rural communities but – as in many suburban and urban communities – not always in churches. This session looks at some of the challenges and opportunities of working with rural children and young people.

#### **Rural Mission in Practice**

A workshop which creatively explores some ways of working on mission with local congregations. This session enables delegates to identify what connections those in their congregations already have with the wider community and draw on these as a starting point for collaborating in mission. Rural Communities & Agriculture

In this session a representative of the agricultural community shares insights into the rhythm of the farming year, some of the current opportunities and challenges facing farmers, and ways to make contact and build relationships with local farmers. #### **Nature Notes**

It interests me that last summer, the British Isles experienced recordbreaking high temperatures and a drought. This year, temperatures have been generally below the average norm. Also, it has been unusually wet. So what is happening to the climate? These islands have not experienced any general disaster this year so far. The fact is disasters have been experienced elsewhere. For example, more than a million displaced people and dozens dead after record rain drenches north-eastern China.

May 2023 was the world's third warmest May on record in 174 years. We are already seeing devastating fires in North America. Global sea ice has reached a record low. This will reduce the albedo effect. Ice reduces global heating by reflecting the sun's rays into space. July 2023 was the hottest global month on record. Global average daily sea surface temperatures (SST) hit 20.96 Celsius in early August, breaking the record of 20.95°C, reached in 2016, according to the Copernicus climate modelling service. Scientists say the record will continue to be broken. It is usual for oceans to be at their global hottest in March, not August. This is because most of the global ocean is in the southern hemisphere.

It is encouraging that the BBC is beginning to regularly mention climate relevant facts on the news, because I feel too few people in Britain are aware of them. We have heard many reports of how thousands of British holiday makers have gone on holiday to Mediterranean countries only to find they need repatriating to Britain because of the heat and fires. It also helps us to understand that many folks from "hot countries" are trying to migrate to Britain because of our more temperate climate. Sadly, rich people in those countries invest in air conditioning in their homes, which incidentally, contributes to climate change by using fossil fuel generated electricity to export heat from their rooms to the world outside. But poor people who maybe cannot afford such a luxury decide to migrate north.

The British Isles has its own air conditioning system that may keep us warmer than our continental neighbours in the winter and cooler in the summer. This is called the Atlantic conveyer, or the North Atlantic Drift. This is a current of water that flows from the Caribbean Sea to the British Isles. This is accompanied by our prevailing, rather wet, SW winds.

We enjoyed a great workshop and the number of children who mastered hula hooping in a short space of time was impressive.

New Priest in Charge at St Thomas a Becket, Father James has visited both schools, meeting both staff and pupils. He led an assembly/act of worship based on Perseverance and made quite an impression. We are currently gearing up for Harvest Festivals in early October. As rural schools, we feel the importance of celebrating this Festival and will involve both the Uckfield Community Fridge and Uckfield Food Bank in our collections.

At the time of writing the year 5 and 6 pupils from both schools are preparing to head off on their residential trip to PGL Windmill Hill. Spending 5 days together taking part in challenging activities always creates amazing memories and the camaraderie generated has a lasting impact on the rest of the academic year. We hope they have an amazing time.

#### Hoverflies by Michael Blencowe for Sussex Wildlife Trust

Everyone loves bees, don't they? Knowing that our bees are in decline has prompted protests and petitions and highlighted the important service these buzzing pollinators provide to our planet. Without them our crops and ecosystems would collapse. Yet many other pollinators that provide the same service don't get the same level of public support. So today I'm waving my flag for the hoverflies.

For some reason, they're not as loveable as bees. Perhaps it's because most of the time people mistake them for wasps. This isn't totally our fault because that's exactly what the hoverflies want you to think. The 283 species of hoverfly in the UK come in many shapes, colours and sizes but most of them sport yellow and black stripes, making them easily confused for wasps, bees, hornets and bumblebees. It's a strategy called Batesian mimicry and was first proposed by Leicestershire lepidopterist Henry Bates in 1861. Hoverflies are harmless. They don't sting and can't bite but they have discovered you don't actually have to be dangerous to deter predators – you just have to look like something that's dangerous.

Yet their devious mimicry isn't the most incredible thing about them. Their wings are the things. Hoverflies (like all flies) have just two wings (half as many wings as bees and wasps). Whereas other flies keep their wings straight, hoverflies incline theirs to create an angled downward stroke at a remarkable rate of 120 beats per second. This allows hoverflies to fly to a most amazing place: nowhere. Hoverflies have become the motionless masters of mid-air.

It's not all sitting around in the sky though. During their few days of life, hoverflies fight, fornicate and feed and while busy collecting energy-giving nectar and protein-rich pollen they inadvertently provide that vital pollination service to our flowers and crops. And hoverflies have earned the title of 'The Gardeners Friend' because about 40% of them have a larval stage which is basically a tiny crawling stomach that roams around your flowerbed eating aphids. Pollination, pest control – next thing you know these beneficial little insects will be mowing the front lawn for us too.

So why not thank these friendly flies by planting some of their favourite flowers in your garden - parsley, fennel, borage, hebe, sedum and alliums - and consider putting in a pond no matter how small. Do your bit for the pollinators and they'll keep the world working for us.

#### NEWS FROM YOUR WEALDEN DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

Don't lose your vote – the annual canvass which allows Wealden to keep the electoral register up to date is underway. Keep an eye out for an email or letter.

There are still two dates left to make an appointment for a free health check if you are aged between 40 and 74 – 6 and 13 October at Heathfield and Uckfield respectively. Appointments must be booked in advance by emailing <u>martyn.reynolds@oneyoueastsussex.org.uk</u> or <u>sam.bentley@oneyoueastsussex.org.uk</u>

As I write, I have been attending the public inquiry into the appeal for non-determination at Bird in Eye Farm.

'Let's Talk Wealden' has gone live on the Wealden website where residents can find out about the latest proposals, have their say and ask questions etc. Residents do not need to sign up if they wish to view the site but need to register if they wish to comment, discuss or ask a question.

Wealden has switched to hydrogenated Vegetable Oil replacing diesel in all of the waste collection and street cleansing vehicles operated by the council's contractor Biffa. This reduces the carbon by up to 90%. A successful trial was operated earlier in the year with Biffa also sourcing the HVO for the vehicles which is much more expensive than diesel.

#### FRAMFIELD PARISH COUNCIL – REPORT

This time I have included some important updates effecting the Parish.

**New bus service.** This is a new seven days a week route 29A linking Brighton, Lewes, Uckfield, Framfield, Blackboys and Heathfield. Hourly, including up to mid evening on Mondays to Saturdays. I do have a few hard copies of the timetable although there is a timetable on each bus stop.

**Gun Road, bridge repairs.** The outline programme for the works is dictated by the Environment Agency (EA) permit which can take 6-8 weeks, should have been applied for by the design consultant in the first week in September but has now been delayed until the third week. This follows some lengthy ecological site surveys and watercourse related assessments that were needed to inform the permit application.

Assuming all is well with the permit and the EA don't come back with any potential "deal breakers" ESCC are aiming to start the works as soon as the permit is confirmed. The initial work will be to dam the watercourse and provide a diversion channel off to one side of the bridge location, demolish the existing bridge, before excavating and preparing the foundations for the new precast box and retaining walls.

Concurrently with the permit submission, ESCC are looking to order the precast items in advance. This will be done "at risk" in order that they can speed up the programme, but as mentioned, if the EA do have any issues related to the permit, this would be a potential issue.

The precast units themselves have a long lead-in time of up to 14 weeks. This is because ESCC are opting for skewed boxes rather than square end standard ones to avoid encroachment onto private land and the associated potentially lengthy legal processes involved.

With this lead in time for the units, delivery to site may not be until mid-December and, as such, it is unlikely that the precast installs and backfill needed in order to get the road opened before Christmas will be achievable.

The other significant risks ESCC face are related to the water levels, which may hamper the start.

**CMF (Community Match Funding) – Lewes Road, Blackboys.** The Parish Council was successful in its application to reduce the speed on the B2192 between Hollow Lane and Brownings Farm to 40-mph. This means that ESCC will match fund up to 50% of the cost. Currently the scheme is with ESCC designers and a deadline for completion cannot be confirmed.

**High Street, Blackboys – reduction in speed limit to 30-mph.** The design and costings are still being carried out by ESCC with Gold Developments with the latter offering 50% of the costs up to a maximum of £50,000. An important factor is with ESCC Streetlighting and the design/cost of the additional lights. Agreement has come back from ESCC that if implemented, consideration can then be given for a 40-mph 'buffer' out to beyond the 50-house site entrance.

**B2102, east of Pump Lane, Framfield – leak.** Confirmation has been given by ESCC that they intend to carry out drainage improvement works here, starting on the 6 November 2023 for 10 days. These works will include the installation of new pipework and gullies and the reforming of a ditch, as well as carrying out a large repair to the carriageway.

**Treeworks – along the B2102.** Some very disturbing tree works were carried out by ESCC along the B2102 at night without the Parish Council or indeed the landowners being notified. This was carried out after the new 29a bus suffered a broken window. I can now confirm that no further works are currently required. This followed on from some very robust meetings between the Parish Council, ESCC and their contractors. However, we have been warned that if additional communication from the bus company is received that further damage has been caused by branches, ESCC be will be asking for specific locations so that these individual sites can be addressed using the correct traffic management methods.

**Bins** – we are experiencing a high level of household waste being places in the Parish litter bins. This is fly-tipping and illegal. Attempts are being made to find the culprits and if anyone has information please let me know.


