

Nature Notes (Reprint)

This article is reprinted from the December January issue, as I managed to mess up all the degree symbols. Apologies to all, and to Martyn. [BR – Technical Editor]

At 7 pm on 10th November, the temperature outside was 6.6°Celsius. It was pitch dark since before 5pm. Next morning it was 2°C. at 08:00 h. Frost decorated both garden and car. In New Zealand, folk were experiencing daytime temperatures of c. 23°Celsius. Their days are lengthening and warming and ours shortening and cooling as the globe tilts them further south towards the sun. Winter is surely upon us. Also, we are experiencing low pressure fronts swinging in from the Atlantic Ocean across these islands and giving us a frequent drenching. All this affects the living natural world in many ways. Humans are part of this, and many homes have been flooded already in parts of these islands. Homes of animals will have flooded too. Hibernating hedgehogs and lizards will have been disturbed. Many invertebrates will have drowned and be washed away as they hibernate for winter. Most birds will have been able to fly to dryer areas but will desperately look for food in new places to keep their tiny bodies warm through metabolic heat generation.

Fundamentally, there are 2 types of animals when it comes to keeping warm. These are 1. Endothermic animals like us and most other mammals, who keep their bodies warm by eating and 'burning' calories to maintain body temperature as we do at c. 36.8° Celsius. The body temperature of other endothermic animals may be different, for example, many birds maintain a temperature of around 40° C. The other type are 2. the poikilothermic (or exothermic) animals, whose body temperature is regulated by the external temperature. These are the invertebrates and primitive vertebrates such as fish, amphibians and most reptiles.

Animals that hibernate allow their body temperature to drop and fall into a kind of sleep, more accurately described as suspended animation, this includes some mammals such as dormice (dormir, French for to sleep). There are many dormice within the countryside around Uckfield. I used to monitor them in Lake Wood for many years. Even when they are sleeping, they sometimes squeak if they are disturbed, and can also be heard to snore on occasion. I know of no birds that hibernate, these little feathered animals must find extra food to keep them warm in winter. That is where we can assist by providing feeders and water in our gardens.

Follow us on Facebook or Google Framfield & Blackboys WI Nature likes to redress an imbalance. If a tree falls over, a dozen or so young ones will compete to replace it. If you cut off the branch of a tree, a new one will grow quite quickly. If a female blue tit loses her mate to a sparrowhawk, a new young floating male will often move in to take his place. If you plough up a meadow, the plants are replaced by opportunist weeds of cultivation unless they are controlled by a weedkiller and a crop is planted instead. Any change generated by humans will generate a natural response. Even the monoculture crop will generate an influx of organisms wanting to consume it. To get the crop, these arrivals will have to be controlled by pesticides, that will also be lethal to other organisms.

Nature is also attempting to redress the imbalance caused by human induced (anthropogenic) climate and other changes in some most extraordinary ways. For example. We are burning more fossil fuel now than ever before, especially due to the global number of vehicles being driven increasing daily. A consequence of this is that the carbon dioxide produced is acting like a greenhouse and heating up the atmosphere and global surface. More ocean is being exposed as the ice caps are melting.

Now, 71% of the global surface is water. The amount of water leaving the oceans and entering the atmosphere as vapour is proportional to the temperature, so global warming is causing much more water to be held within the atmosphere. The more water vapour there is in the sky, the more clouds form which also store energy that can be manifest as lightning and wind. The consequence of this is more powerful storms and heavier rainfall. This rainfall causes erosion of our tarmac roads, often by freeze and thaw of water in cracks and fissures. Also, by simple flow erosion. This in turn causes pot-holes. In turn, the pot-holes cause damage to the tyres and structure of vehicles, and while those are off the road, they are not burning fossil fuels. Nature tries redressing an imbalance. Meanwhile, car owners rush to get their vehicles repaired or replaced and so the cycle goes on. Man has become a geological force of nature. This has caused geologists to suggest renaming the epoch that we are living through as the Anthropocene (human new) epoch. Officially, we are in the Holocene (meaning wholly new) epoch.



FRAMFIELD PARISH COUNCIL – REPORT

Gun Road Bridge, Blackboys - there is a full update elsewhere in the magazine.

Lewes Road, Blackboys – there has been a significant delay at ESCC with the design/costings for the reduction in speed limit on the B2192 between Hollow Lane and Brownings Farm. It had been anticipated that the works would be completed in the 2023/24 financial year. The Parish Council has been awarded Community Match Funding for the works whereby up to 50% of the cost is borne by ESCC.

Parish Streetlighting – since ESCC have a new contractor for all highway works, new procedures have been put in place and are still in the process of being agreed with the Parish Council. The Parish Council owns the Parish streetlights but contracts ESCC to maintain them. Whilst this continues only minor repairs will be carried out.

Claimed footpath 67b/68c – ESCC have decided not to make any changes to the footpath network in this area.

Budget - the budget required for the 2024/25 financial year is $\pounds 81,805$, this is a $\pounds 8,805$ (12%) increase on the previous year's costs but a $\pounds 12,805$ increase from last year's precept as the Council had agreed to use reserves to fund the shortfall last year. The increase will assist in covering the costs of the works to the streetlights.

NEWS FROM YOUR WEALDEN DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

Local Plan – by the time this magazine hits the doorstep the Local Plan will have been published and it is anticipated will go out for consultation in early March. This is the Regulation 18 part of the Plan and is very much only a draft. Regulation 19 which becomes the final document could be issued later in the year.

Rural England Prosperity Fund – Rural Business Grants Scheme – this capital business grants scheme was launched on Friday, 12 January 2024. The programme will support rural businesses to grow, increase productivity and make improvements. £500,000 is available until March 2025 with grants of between £2,500 and £50,000, with some match funding required from the business. WDC are working in partnership with Rother District Council although ESCC will deliver the funding as they have experience of delivering successful grant schemes.

If anyone would like to meet up to discuss any District-related matters please do not hesitate to contact me. Wealden District Council covers many subjects – Council Tax, Housing, Benefits, Planning, Licencing, Environmental Health to name but a few. I don't always have specific information to hand but can always find someone who would.

The works are going to necessitate the removal of up to 200 tonnes of hardcore and clay soil, with approximately 20% being hardcore. If there are any land owners nearby that would possibly be interested in having this (delivered free of charge), please can you contact the Parish Council, and we will put you in touch with a member of the project team. Toad-in-the-hole by Michael Blencowe for Sussex Wildlife Trust

Once upon a time, the British people were divided. Impassioned debates raged throughout the land, truth and common sense became distorted, and the public rose up and demanded an answer. How did that toad get inside that rock?

In 1898, two burly workmen in a chalk quarry near Lewes cracked open a hollow chunk of flint. The solid rock, formed 85 million years ago, split open to reveal an airtight cavity at its core. To the quarrymen's amazement, entombed within the ancient flint was a dead toad.

'Toad-in-the-hole' hysteria soon hit the headlines. It seemed like every month the newspapers reported how someone had split open a rock and found a toad inside. Some of these toads had already croaked but others would inexplicably still be alive and hopping. The Victorian world was thrown into theological and philosophical panic. Clergymen preached that the Creator had placed the eternal amphibians in rocks at the dawn of time. Subscribers to Darwin's new theory of evolution were perplexed. Charles Dickens wrote of his bewilderment, while others believed it was simply sorcery. Scientists began burying living toads in sealed boxes to investigate the unfortunate animal's longevity.

The Lewes toad of 1898 is the world's only surviving artefact of the entombed toad craze. It now resides in Brighton's incredible Booth Museum of Natural History – one of my favourite places in the whole world. Amongst the many awe-inspiring exhibits at The Booth, you'll find a special cabinet dedicated to curiosities. In it, lying reverentially on a bed of maroon felt, there is 'Probably the most famous toad in the world'. Admittedly when it comes to world-famous toads it's not a particularly crowded field, with only Toad of Toad Hall to contest the title. Alongside the original oval of cleft flint sits the shrivelled body of the infamous amphibian. The whole surreal exhibit is like a Kinder Surprise designed by Hieronymus Bosch.

But this cracked up flint isn't all it's cracked up to be. The Lewes toad was originally presented to the Brighton and Hove Natural History

A further update to the Gun Road Bridge works

Following a meeting on Monday 15th with the Parish Council, County Council and Balfour Beatty, we now have a bit more detail in respect to the bridge replacement. ESCC have again apologised for the delays caused, some of which have been out of their control as mentioned in previous updates.

The Environmental Agency have now issued a permit, and a programme of works has been put in place. Procurement has already begun, and manufacturing is already underway.

The key dates that most people will want to hear is that site works are due to start 12th February, with a completion date of the 9th May 2024. To begin with there will be lots of staging works required, as well as hedge removal works to be done. A large crane is to be positioned in the adjacent field ready to lift the precast blocks into place. There will be a dam installed upstream, and a diversionary route put in that spans around the worksite, to allow a controlled flow of the water and assist migratory fish.

Site traffic will be from the northern end of Gun Road. There are going to be significant HGV movements in the area. The route will be monitored by ESCC for any damage caused by the project vehicles and make good road surfaces, if and where necessary.

There are still some risks to the programme, with one of the biggest being the weather. If there is a significant downpour that causes stress to the stream and/or its tributaries, there may be no option other than to release the dam until the volume reduces again. This is all being carried out to strict

Environmental Agency requirements.

There will be a temporary bridge offset to one side for pedestrians throughout the work, although there will be some further temporary full closures at times for short periods, i.e. when the crane is lifting. Crane operations are likely to take 2-4 days. The bridge will be open to pedestrian traffic only, but strictly no horses. The bridge will be suitable for wheelchair and buggy access, although there will be a small ramp to negotiate.

SPEEDING TRAFFIC IN BLACKBOYS

There are concerns amongst residents in Blackboys about speeding traffic in the High Street and on Lewes Road. Local County Councillor Chris Dowling is working with Parish Council and a community group to press East Sussex County Council and Sussex Police to review the speed limits and take action.

To help address the speed issues in the High Street, a Community Speed Watch (CSW) group of volunteers could be set-up. The CSW system is a Police project and it is robust, with speeding motorists who are 'caught' by the CSW team reported online to the Police. The system has a rising level of contacts and warnings sent to offending motorists. Motorists who offend repeatedly and are reported can face Police prosecution.

Unfortunately, due to Police procedures and insurance cover, CSW cannot operate in Lewes Road.

The Parish Council would like to see a CSW set up in the Parish again, but a group of volunteers is neededapproximately 6 people. Training, equipment and support is provided.

HAND SIGNALS

When we have a puppy, we hope it will always be fit and healthy, but as time goes on we might notice a change in its behaviour. Perhaps it is not coming when told or there are other changes in its behaviour. It is possible that these changes are due to the dog gradually losing its sight or going deaf.

It is quite usual to train our dogs to respond to our voice, but it is a good idea to teach it to respond to hand signals as well so you can still communicate with your dog. Ideally teach your dog to respond to both hand signals and voice.

Of course, it might be us with communication problems, for example losing our voice or going deaf. Many years ago I had golden retrievers. The lanes were very quiet then, so I had the dogs loose and I would listen out for the occasional car. If I heard one I would shout get in and the dogs would immediately get on the verge and stand still till I called to them to go on again when it was safe. Colleen the youngest one was very quick to get into the side. This worked well until I had problems with my ears and was for a while quite deaf and could not hear the cars. However, Colleen had excellent hearing and when she heard a car she immediately got into the side, so my problem was solved as all I had to do was to watch her and get myself into the side of the lane when I saw her get in! Do not do this nowadays.

I had a miniature Dachshund for over seventeen years who loved her walks but when she was getting old she was reluctant to walk anywhere new, but was very happy to go on walks she knew well. I also noticed she developed a strange habit, when we returned from a walk she would walk up to the door step, stretch out till her nose just touched the edge of the step then would happily jump up. She also developed some odd habits indoors, again using her nose to check whether a door was open or closed. I took her to the vet and was very surprised to discover she was completely blind. These examples show that it is very easy to think the dog is being disobedient, when in fact it has sight or hearing problems.

Ideally teach your dog to respond to both voice and hand signals. Your dog will quickly learn what the hand signals mean if they are immediately rewarded with praise and treats.

A very useful one is "stay" Do this rather like a policeman stopping the traffic. The dog should immediately stop and stand quite still until you give another hand signal that means it can move again. Make this an excited quick movement.

"Down" is quite easy, hold a tasty treat and gradually move your hand down to the floor. As soon as the dog is lying on the floor give it the treat.

A nice easy one is "fetch" Have a ball in your hand while the dog is watching you and throw the ball.

To start with make all your movements quite big, over time these movements can be smaller.

Dogs are so very adaptable and are very quick to learn, especially if it is to their advantage.
