

From the Vicar's desk

Well it's that time again. The Sunday when Clergy the world over talk about Water, Ice and Steam, Shamrocks, clover leaves and eggs, with their Whites, yolks and shells and in doing so promote age old heresies. Modalism,

Arianism and Tritheism to name but a triune three!

It's therefore completely understandable that some Christians think that the doctrine of the Trinity is so baffling that it's better to forget about it.

Others, however recognise that it must be important in some way, but don't see how it could possibly be of any help to us in our daily lives as followers of Jesus Christ.

And this is a shame – not only because I believe that the doctrine of the Trinity is true, but even more, because I really believe that the mystery of the Holy Trinity can be the greatest help in showing us the way to God.

Far from being irrelevant to 21st century Christians, I believe that belief in the Trinity should be at the very centre of our lives and our faith.

If we take the time to reflect on what Jesus shows us about relationship with God, this relationship is always about our sharing in the life of the Trinity. Now, I really do get that the doctrine of the Trinity can seem not only very confusing, but also confused in itself.

The doctrine tells us that God is both One and that God is Three:

the Persons of Father, Son and Spirit.

There is in God a profound and perfect unity, so that we can rightly speak of God as One.

And yet in that unity there is distinction, of Father, Son and Spirit.

Where in the Gospels can we find any reference to the doctrine of the Holy Trinity?

This is actually a really good question, and one that non-Trinitarian faiths will often ask us. (The Jehovah witnesses for example)

The answer is actually quite surprising, because I'd like to argue that the most convincing case for the existence of a Triune or Trinitarian God is found in Jesus' teaching on prayer.

'Teach us to pray' say the disciples and Jesus answers, 'when you pray, pray like this:

'Our Father...'

We see in the Gospels that Jesus, the Son, speaks to his Father, and that his relationship with the Father is one of the greatest intimacy and trust.

The conversation between Jesus and his Father is a real conversation, not Jesus talking to himself.

If Jesus is divine (as well as human) and the Father is also divine, then we immediately see a distinction in God between Father and Son.

We are already part of the way towards thinking about the Trinity.

We see at this early stage the presence of two of the Persons of the Trinity: Father and Son.

If we are invited by Jesus to address his Father as our Father, then we must have a relationship with the Father that is like Jesus's relationship with the Father, because the Father is not only his Father but ours as well.

When we address the Father as our Father, then we are like Christ himself in some way.

As Christians we believe that Jesus is both God and man, and also that the Father is God.

When we address God as our Father, we are not simply sharing in the humanity of Christ, but rather, we are raised to the level of the divine. And being raised to the level of the divine, the Father is not only the Father of Jesus the Son, but is truly our Father too.

It is here we see the role of the third Person of the Trinity, the Spirit. We are like Christ, the Son, because the Spirit is working in us, shaping us. By the power of the Spirit we are raised to the level of Christ and can address the Father as our Father.

By the working of the Spirit we are made brothers and sisters of Jesus the Son, who is both God and man. We are not only brothers and sisters of Jesus in his humanity. We are also brothers and sisters of Jesus in his divinity. So even if we think of the Lord's prayer as a fairly ordinary prayer, we see that it reveals to us the most wonderful truths about ourselves and our relationship with God.

Every time we Pray the Lord's Prayer, at the Eucharist at Morning and Evening Prayer or at Compline, we are participating in the life of the Trinity: we are raised to the level of the divine and made like Christ by the power of the Spirit so that we can address the Father as our Father.

The doctrine of the Trinity is a great gift to us. It helps us see that we are truly brothers and sisters of Jesus Christ, not only in his humanity, but also in his divinity.

Nature Notes

As spring turns into summer, we watch the world around us flourish. We see trees resplendent with new leaves. The sequence of flowers – snowdrop, crocus, daffodil, tulip, oxeye daisy, orchid, rose - means that the ecosystem around us is working in a dynamic way to maintain itself, attracting insect pollinators, breaking up carbon dioxide and water to make sugar and oxygen $(6CO_2 + 6H_2O \rightarrow C_6H_{12}O_6 + 6O_2)$ feeding the plants, herbivores and omnivores and ultimately the carnivores, all of which, like us, are breeding, and populating the planet. I saw a disturbing statistic recently; the world's population of humans is increasing by about 1 million per week. The worrying thing about this is that every human, that is you me and the new one being born will require a lifetime of food, and the only source of that is the subject of this note – **nature**.

Farmers, hunters, foresters, ecologists, engineers, and gardeners all manage nature with the intention of helping it to serve all of us with food, oxygen, water, waste disposal and raw materials that we need to survive. That is ecology, an ecosystem. In today's world, we cannot live well without those that manage nature. But we can try. We can all cultivate a few food plants. I once grew some wonderful green peppers in troughs on our windowsills. I was also lucky to have a garden to grow potatoes and keep 2 laying hens. So, we were always able to have fried eggs with mashed potato and grilled green peppers. Then for dessert we had locally picked wild blackberries stewed with apple from our tree. We may not all be able to grow our own food, but we are all part of nature. Every green plant (inside or outside our homes) will make oxygen. If we look after them, they will contribute to the planet. If you have a garden that extends beyond 7 metres from any building, plant a shrub or tree and you will make a larger oxygen contribution, plus serving the local insect and bird community. Remember that all that you eat will generate waste, hold your local authorities responsible if the local river or stream seems polluted. Remember that it is your waste that you pay them to dispose of responsibly. That way you will save the lives of countless water creatures and birds such as kingfishers, grey wagtails, ducks, coots, and moorhens that depend on them for food. Then ultimately the foxes, stoats, otters, and buzzards that will prey on those. Remember, our rivers are the vascular system of terrestrial ecology.

Today I am considering predator-prey relationships. The biblical statement in 1 Peter 1:24-25 states: "all flesh is as grass". If we interpret grass as meaning all green, <u>photosynthetic</u> organisms including plants, algae, and some bacteria, then all flesh is indeed made from green things, as all global energy is ultimately solar. Then flesh eating organisms (including insectivorous plants, fungi, and some bacteria) are feeding on animals that consume plants as food in a chain of consumption and so on.

I saw some footage recently of a leopard in India wandering into an abandoned temple and finding a terrified wild pig in one of the rooms, essentially trapped. The leopard looked at the now petrified pig, and then walked on. The leopard was not hungry. Most of us will have seen the wildlife documentaries on TV showing 'carnivores' hunting herbivores. These events are quite infrequent, and it takes a lot of patience to film one. However, even cats like to eat grass sometimes, and sheep love to eat snails, to the point where several snail species living on the sheepgrazed grass of the South Downs are described as "sheep snails". One of them even has a hairy shell and is known as the hairy snail (Trochulus hispidus). Also, deer like to hunt and eat frogs. A single blue tit nestling will have eaten more than 1000 caterpillars and a quantity of spiders before it leaves the nest. It will be just one of about 7 siblings each eating about the same amount, as will the 2 parents (total c. 10,000 prey items). We may cringe when we see a lion bringing down an elephant or buffalo in Africa, but their physiology commits them to eating meat when they are hungry, and there are probably many days/weeks between such kills. But we are also omnivores, eating both plants and animals, most of the latter are not hunted as such, but raised in a protected and engineered habitat and fed on the best vegetation to maximise their bodily health and killed, ready for us to eat. We also eat the wild animals from the water such as fish and molluscs. All these are hunted by other humans on our behalf. Our effort is usually just to visit a market of some kind and collect them already prepared for cooking where required and consumption. We are still predators, because we depend on another organism to survive, whether it is a plant or an animal or even a fungus like mushrooms, alone or in cheese, yeast in bread, wine and beer and bacteria in yoghurt.

Gun Road Bridge, Blackboys – hot off the press at the time of writing the completion to the works to re-build the bridge are now delayed until the end of June.

Lewes Road, Blackboys – ESCC have stated that the works to reduce the speed limit to 40-mph between Hollow Lane and Brownings Farm will be done in the autumn. The Parish Council is contributing towards costs under a Community Match Funding scheme using the funds from CIL (Community Infrastructure Levy) gleaned from the various developments in the village.

The Parish Council acting as sole trustee to the halls has reviewed the hire charges for charity/not for profit groups based in the Parish. This should benefit those groups, whilst keeping the costs for non-parish events higher. In particular, the electricity costs for both halls have increased dramatically so it is always a challenge to maintain a balance.

Allotment rents – if you have an allotment at Framfield or Blackboys please don't forget to let me have the rent. Emails were sent out in March. There is a surcharge for non-payment from 1 June.

Parish Streetlighting – many residents will be feeling frustrated that the streetlight near to their property may not be working. By of explanation, the new ESCC contractor who maintains the lights, insists that a complicated, and in some parts irrelevant, disclaimer is entered into by the Parish

Council before any works commence. The Parish Council has been in protracted discussion but cannot enter into the agreement until the content meets the need. It is hoped this will happen very soon.

If anyone spots any problems in the Parish please contact me in the first instance and I'll let you know if I can help.

Swifts by Michael Blencowe for Sussex Wildlife Trust

These are uncertain times. Who knows where this planet is heading? But since the start of May I've been looking to the sky for a sign of reassurance: the return of the Sussex Swifts from Africa. Ted Hughes expressed it perfectly: "They've made it again / Which means the globe's still working, the Creation's / Still waking refreshed, our summer's / Still all to come."

Swifts may not look like much - they're basically two wings and a mouth - but it's hard to explain their abilities without making them sound supernatural. Swifts are all about flying. They feed, scream, and mate in the air and bathe in the rainclouds. At night they switch off half their brain, switch on cruise control and fall asleep amongst the stars. If they had their way they would never come down. But there's one little flaw in their plan: eggs don't float. So, for just a few weeks of the year, they begrudgingly swap the open skies for a cramped nest under the eaves where they raise their young. The problem is in recent years most of these little gaps have been lost to renovations and modern architecture. The destruction of their homes is one of the reasons why Swift numbers have fallen. They are refugees on the wind.

They cruised into Sussex in May after a non-stop, long-haul flight from Africa; not that this trip bothered them. Swifts are all about flying. For me, the Swift is the only bird that takes pure, unadulterated pleasure in flying. Other birds fly out of necessity, but Swifts seem to fly for the joy of it, screaming with delight at the top of their little Swift lungs, a shrill cry that is forever associated with English summers.

Both of the schools in the St Thomas a Becket Church of England Federation (Blackboys and Framfield) are thriving, and as the summer approaches, we gear up for the most exciting part of the school year, including our traditional end of year school plays!

There has been a focus in both schools on the National Tests that the children need to take. Our year 6 pupils have thrilled staff with their hard work and positive attitude during their SATS tests. Our year 1 pupils are gearing up for the Phonics Screening Check and our year 4 pupils are practising hard for their Multiplication Tables Check. It's certainly a busy time!

However, as regular readers know, our schools are about more than just academic achievement. At Framfield, classes have enjoyed their new Woodland Wonders sessions, getting to grips with the amazing environment in the village. Children in Puffins class have also started their swimming lessons and impressed their swimming teachers. 
