

Candlemas Day – A Celebration of Light and Hope

If Candlemas Day be fair and bright, Winter will have another flight; If Candlemas Day be wind and rain,

Winter has gone and will ne'er come again.

Candlemas Day, observed on February 2nd, marks an important milestone in the Christian calendar. This ancient feast, also known as the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord, celebrates the moment when Mary and Joseph brought the infant Jesus to the temple in Jerusalem, in accordance with Jewish law.

The words of Simeon, have become enshrined in our liturgy. In the Book of Common Prayer's service of Evening Prayer and in the even older night service of Compline.

Lord, now lettest thou thy servant depart in peace according to thy word.

For mine eyes have seen thy salvation,

Which thou hast prepared before the face of all people;

To be a light to lighten the Gentiles and to be the glory of thy people Israel.

(Luke 2:32).

Candlemas is primarily associated with light.

In many churches, it is the day when candles are blessed, symbolizing Christ as the Light of the World.

These candles, often distributed to the congregation, remind us of the presence of God's light in the darkness of our lives and the world.

The name "Candlemas" derives from these rituals, blending the theme of light with the spirit of purification and presentation.

Historically, it has also been seen as a bridge between the seasons, falling halfway between the winter solstice and the spring equinox, which is why the day was traditionally used as one of the 'weather predicting days' in the church's year.

For your information and amusement, the others are Saint Swithin's day on July the 15th

Saint Swithin's day, if thou dost rain,

for forty days it will remain; Saint Swithin's day, if thou be fair, for forty days 'twill rain no more.

and with a far more fanciful rhyme, Saint Paul's day on the 29th June!

If St Paul's day be fair and clear It does betide a happy year But if it chance to snow or rain Then will be dear all kinds of grain

If clouds or mists do dark the sky
Great store of birds and beasts shall die
And if the winds do file aloft
Then war shall vex the kingdom oft.

But back to Candlemas....

The Candlemas themes of transition, from darkness to light, from winter to spring, from cold to warmth; mirrors the spiritual message of the day: just as the earth is inching toward spring, so we too are encouraged to grow in faith, hope, and readiness to receive Christ's light.

In our parishes, Candlemas offers a wonderful opportunity to come together for reflection, prayer, and thanksgiving.

It is a chance to renew our commitment to being bearers of Christ's light in this increasingly dark world.

Please do bring a candle to one of our Candlemas Eucharists at Chiddingly, East Hoathly or Framfield on Sunday the 2nd of February; and as they are blessed at the start of the service, let us remember that each of us is called to shine with love, compassion and kindness; reflecting God's light in our homes, our communities, and beyond. May this Candlemas be a time of blessing and renewal for us all.

The View from the Churchyard – Peter Berry



Nature Notes

Fields. Uckfield, Framfield, Heathfield, Isfield, Maresfield, Rotherfield, Mayfield, Hartfield, Henfield, Cuckfield, Itchingfield, Staplefield, Lindfield, Netherfield, Westfield, Mountfield, Catsfield and Ninfield, are all places nearby where the trees have been *felled*. It is (was) our great Albion's *Andredes weald*, meaning "the forest of Andred" a Roman region reduced and renamed <u>Pevensey</u> by Anglo-Saxons meaning "River of [a man named] <u>Pefen</u>"). Anderida Forest extended over Sussex, Surrey and Kent. Settlers felled trees forming clearings to build villages. The clearings maybe got the local name first, assigned by the folk who created them. The village names then followed. Now, we have more clearings (fields) than forest, because further clearings allowed the ground to be farmed to provide food for the villagers. However, most food we now eat from day to day is no longer grown in a felled area down the lane. Much of it even comes from different lands, the Americas, Africa and Eurasia. Now, just short of 14% of the UK is woodland, up from about 9% in the 1980s. This increase is good, because it shows we are making progress with planting trees and allowing some ecological succession to progress from fields back to woodland.

In some ways, UK leads the way in combatting climate change globally. Our carbon dioxide footprint is better per capita ranked 70th/208 in 2023 (Wikipedia) than many other leading countries. However, our species decline record is not so good. Insect loss is particularly worrying, because they are an essential part of a balanced ecosystem. It is easy to make toxic chemicals that kill insects, and these chemicals are used to maximise crop yields, control flies, ants, and wasps, all to make our lives easier in the short-term. However, many plants and animals depend on insects to survive, including birds such as swifts and swallows that eat nothing else, and just about any land-bird species raising a family. E.g. just **one family** of blue tits requires up to 1,000 insects **per day** for about **20 days** when nesting. Also, a rare bird of prey called a honey buzzard specialises in eating copious bees and wasps. No surprise that this bird is rare, because wild honeybees are also now rare, and we are good at killing wasps. Hot news - I saw a **swallow** (Pevensey Bay) hunting insects on 3rd January 2025!

Also, consider local places called ...hurst; Penshurst, Staplehurst, Ticehurst, Hawkhurst, Goudhurst, Wadhurst, Lamberhurst, Speldhurst, Ashhurst, and Sandhurst. Hurst is probably Anglo-Saxon (German), meaning woodland thicket or wooded hillock. Forests in these localities are probably very old and home to **biodiverse** ancient woodlands. Humans are ecosystem engineers, whose ancestors lived and worked much closer to nature than us now. However, the further we get from nature, the less we consider its welfare, often writing it off as collateral damage as we build towards some "greater goal". Ultimately, nature is our essential life support system. All things originate from nature.


Traditional real Sussex cider made with enthusiasm right here in Framfield.

Happy New Year! I hope you all celebrated the festive period with cheer and are still basking in the twinkly afterglow, hoovering up remaining treats and reminiscing over time spent with loved ones.

As that sparkle fades to a glimmer, don't give in to that looming January chasm of grey-blue doom. Instead, focus on the new. Think of Month 01 as a springboard for all the things that await you this 2025; new wildlife, new experiences, new Parish magazine article authors... and with that shameful seque let me introduce myself.

NEWS FROM YOUR WEALDEN DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

If anyone was caught up in the early sanctioning of the direct debit for Council Tax over the Christmas period and has not yet been refunded any fees for bank charges etc or had other issues sorted out, please let me know.

I thought the statement from East Sussex County Council regarding the devolution proposals might be of interest so I have added it in full within the magazine. Please contact me with any questions. Town and parish councils won't be affected by the proposals although they will remain and possibly take on an extended role as being the authority with the closest links to the residents. I do suspect that some services could be devolved down to them as well although if this happens it would be hoped that the funds to cover those services would accompany them.

If anyone would like to meet up to discuss any District-related matters please do not hesitate to contact me. Wealden District Council covers many subjects — Council Tax, Housing, Benefits, Planning, Licencing, Environmental Health to name but a few. I don't always have specific information to hand but can always find someone who would.

Statement on Sussex Devolution from East Sussex County Council

In December, a week before Christmas, the Government published a paper on Devolution. Unusually they did not choose to publish a consultative Green Paper but a White Paper which sets out what they plan to do. It was much more specific than expected and with a tight timetable. This note sets out the facts and corrects the widespread misunderstanding about Devolution.

In the White Paper, the government invited councils, including East Sussex, to submit expressions of interest to be considered for the Government's Devolution Priority Programme indicating support for a Sussex Mayoral Strategic Authority. This could unlock new money and powers for the region.

The expression of interest, which was sent on Friday 10 January, is from the leaders of East Sussex, West Sussex and Brighton and Hove. East and West Sussex would each have a unitary authority, taking on responsibility for the services provided by the Districts and Boroughs which, along with the county council, would cease to exist. (Brighton is already a unitary authority). Staff from the Districts and Boroughs are expected to transfer across.

The Government's White Paper sets out in detail the key areas that a strategic authority would be in control of to drive growth and provide support on shaping public services. These include:

- Transport and local infrastructure
- Skills and employment support
- · Housing and strategic planning
- Economic development and regeneration
- Environment and climate change
- Health, wellbeing and public service reform
- Public safety.

The most likely model is that the Mayoral Strategic Authority would be 'light touch' with most of the services for residents provided at unitary level.

The expected timeline following the submission of the proposal is:

• A more detailed discussion and proposal before the end of March 2025.

- Further extensive discussions with councils and others in Spring 2025 following which a Ministerial decision will be taken as to whether to proceed with a Mayoral Strategic Authority (prior to unitary re-organisation). The Spending Review will then confirm future mayoral investment funds for new mayoral areas.
- Relevant legislation will be laid before Parliament in relation to the creation of Strategic Authorities.
- In March 2026 notice of mayoral elections will be given for a Mayoral election in May 2026. A decision whether to move to a Mayoral Strategic Authority under the reorganised arrangements would follow.

A letter from the two county council leaders has also asked for a delay in the May 2025 elections. This has caused some debate, but the rationale as expressed by council officials as well as leaders is:

- Given the timescales set out by the government, much of the work involved in consultation and writing proposals for devolution would be at the same time as the build up to, and follow on from, the May 2025 elections. This could not be done during an election period.
- Other local government reorganisations generally have a delay in elections.
 The white paper specifically mentions delaying elections.
- Local elections invariably lead to a turnover in council membership across all parties. This would give a new set of councillors who would need significant work by officials to bring up to speed, at a time when their workload would be dominated by the reorganisation and continuing to manage services.
- The resulting county councillors would only be in office for 2 years, could only pass one meaningful budget and could not make any fundamental changes to council policy.
 - A debate on this was held in an emergency meeting of the full council in East Sussex on 9 January and rejected a motion to continue to hold the elections. A subsequent cabinet meeting agreed to submit the letter including requesting a delay. On the same day West Sussex and Brighton also agreed to submit the letter. However, the decision as to whether to delay the election is made not by councils but by Government ministers and parliament.

The 'Women's Shed' is open on Wednesday and Friday from 10 - 3pm and is hosted by Men's Shed, Uckfield. After joining the annual membership of £20 and receiving an induction, each workshop session is then charged at just £3, thanks to Men's Shed funding.

Experienced makers (male and/or female) are always on hand for mentorship and support, as well as safety. The site also has a small kitchen, social area and free parking. It is open throughout the year.

FRAMFIELD PARISH COUNCIL - REPORT

Precept/budget – at their November meeting the Parish Council (PC) reviewed the expenditure for the current financial year which had been as expected. They set the budget for the 2025/6 year at £84,464.24 but decided to keep the precept the same at £81,805.00 covering the extra expenditure with reserve funds. Councillors decided that increasing the precept would be more appropriate when more of the approved houses have been built out and contributing towards Council Tax, thus diluting any increase across a greater number of households.

The Parish streetlights are now being maintained by an alternative facilitator and repairs are ongoing. A new energy supplier is also being sourced.

Councillors agreed to once again pay for four extra cuts to the 'urban' grassed areas by ESCC. These are generally areas within the villages. The areas in between the villages are cut twice a year although if the height of the grass becomes a hazard ESCC will do remedial works if contacted.

Planning – although refused at WDC committee, a revised application for the Cysleys Farm site on the Eastbourne Road is now live and an appeal for non-determination has been lodged on a new application on land at Bird in Eye South. This latter appeal will be heard as a public inquiry but the date is yet to be set. The PC has made comments on the 58-house application on land at the Old Nursery House, Framfield. Determination by WDC is awaited.

The works to reduce the speed limit on the Lewes Road, Blackboys, between Brownings Farm and Hollow Lane are due to commence in the Spring. This is being funded under the Community Match Fund initiative (ESCC) whereby the PC pays half of the cost - £30,000. This will come out of CIL (Community Infrastructure Levy) funding.

Options to reduce the speed limit on Blackboys High Street continue to be explored. It is hoped that ESCC will review the decision not to reduce the speed limit outside the 50-house site to 40-mph which will assist with any initiative to then lower the speed limit in the High Street. Again, subject to the costs, the funding could come from the CIL funds.

Following a routine tree survey, two trees are to be removed from Framfield recreation ground – a Scots Pine, which is dead, and an Ash sapling with Ashdieback. One tree has to be removed on the recreation ground at Palehouse Common.

A new work surface has been installed in the kitchen at the Memorial Hall and the kitchen at the Blackboys Village Hall has been completely refurbished – the latter is better than it has ever been!

Deer Aware



When are deer around?

Deer cross the roads all year round. However their presence peaks in April and May when territorial deer and young deer are dispersing and from October to November when deer will be on the move for the autumn mating season. This is around the times the clocks go forward and back. Take particular care at dawn and dusk.



Seen one? Look for another

If a deer crosses in front of you, it is likely that another will follow. If it is safe to do so, slow right down or stop and wait. Deer are unpredictable, drive with caution.



Be aware

Deer often cross the roads in the same locations. Deer warning signs are put up where deer are known to cross regularly.

When you see a warning sign or are travelling through a heavily wooded stretch of road, slow down, stay alert and be prepared to stop.



What to do if you hit a deer

Call the emergency services on 999 if:

Anyone is seriously injured or there is a danger to others using the road e.g. a deer (alive or dead) is blocking the road or is a danger to the traffic.

Call the non-emergency line on 101 if:

The deer is injured and on the side of the road not causing a danger to traffic. The police will deal with any traffic issues and have access to specialists who will know the best course of action to take if the deer is still alive.



What to say

Give as much detail as possible about your location, perhaps using an app such as what3words if you have it

Give them your mobile number, if possible, so they can call you back.


