

The Weald Way Churches Website:

For a while now I have been working on a website for our three parishes, which is gradually becoming the main online presence for our three churches, replacing other sites that are still lurking out there in cyberspace!

Please visit www.thewealdwaychurches.co.uk and take a look.

The Home page of the website is updated weekly, and details the services for the current week, so it is always worth checking before you set out on a Sunday.

Rotas containing service provision across our three churches can be viewed or downloaded from the Services page.

These rotas are painfully difficult to 'get right', and I am acutely aware of the importance of giving each church equal consideration when it comes to Sunday services.

I have just started posting rotas, individual to each church, in each church's particular section of the website, so do take a look.

The church's commitment to the safeguarding of Children and Vulnerable Adults is prominent on our website; our three safeguarding officers are introduced on the Safeguarding page, and up to date policy documents for all three churches can be downloaded if required.

The website also contains a What's on page, detailing social, fundraising and other events.

Dedicated sections concerning Baptisms and Weddings give up to date information for those interested in those sacraments.

At specific times in the church year, the website carries addition pages detailing services for Advent, Christmas, Lent, Holy Week and Easter. Contact details for Myself and Janice can be found on the Contact page, and we have already had a number of Baptism and Wedding enquiries through the website.

#### Facebook:

For many people, Facebook is an important part of their social media diet, and to this end, the Weald Way Churches have a dedicated Facebook page. I aim to post church services, news, and events on the Weald Way Churches Facebook page at least once a week, and the page is attracting an increasing number of visitors.

#### **Nature Notes**

September – the seventh month? (Latin septimus meaning seventh). So, why is it the ninth month, if we start from January? Because it comes before October - the eighth month (octaua Latin for eighth), and it follows that November (Latin nonus for ninth) and December (Latin decimo – tenth) conclude the year. So, January to August are alternative month names in sequence. Incidentally, I will just mention that the name of March comes from Martius, the first month of the earliest Roman calendar. It was named after Mars, the Roman god of war, and an ancestor of the Roman people through his sons Romulus and Remus. Similarly, August comes from the Latin word augustus, meaning "consecrated" or "venerable," which in turn is related to the Latin augur, meaning "consecrated by augury" or "auspicious." In 8 B.C. the Roman Senate honoured Augustus Caesar, the first Roman emperor, by changing the name of their sixth month (Sextilis) to Augustus. It follows that Augury included a Greco-Roman religious practice of observing the behaviour of birds, to receive omens. When the individual, known as the augur, read these signs, it was referred to as "taking the auspices". "Auspices" can mean "looking at birds". Auspex, another word for augur, (Latin: auspicium) "one who looks at birds". It augers well if you do!

September contains the autumn equinox, about the 21st when daylength equals night length. Nature responds by forcing our deciduous trees to decide to shed their leaves, the insects they support either die, or hibernate, as do other animals such as dormice and hedgehogs. Many bird species such as swallows and the various warblers fly back to Africa, at least most of them do. With global heating, more birds are deciding to stay all year round. As insectivores, this means that more insects are also remaining active all year as well. It also follows that the plants the insects feed on are continuing to grow. Am I the only one who has noticed a few roses or primulas still flowering in December? Roses support aphids, which are a favourite insectivorous bird food. As I write now it is August. The world is buzzing with insects, it is frequently hot, and many plants of all sizes are wilting in the drought. The reservoirs are running short of water, and we are told to use it wisely. This spring, I took advantage of the offer by South East Water to purchase another water butt from them at an amazingly low price. It is useful now as I can water my roses etc to keep them alive through the drought. The mosquitos also seem to be benefitting from them as a breeding site. Another SEW initiative was to offer a reduction in our water bills if we have a soak-away (we do) in the garden to cope with surface run-off. It reduces pressure on the drains and can reduce flooding risk, it also keeps rainwater in the garden to support the trees and other plants. Many people may not even realise they have a soak-away, but it may be recorded in the house documents. Auspicium Melioris Aevi. (Latin for 'Hope of a Better Age').

#### October 2025:

Just as an addendum to September Nature Notes, January (named after the Roman god Janus, who was the god of beginnings, endings, doorways, and transitions) and

February (from the Latin word februum or februare, meaning "to purify," and from Februa, a Roman festival of purification and atonement held mid-month). These were added to the monthly calendar by Numa Pompilius, the second king of Rome, around 713 BC. The additions were made to account for the full lunar year and the period of winter that was previously left unassigned. This part of ancient Rome's lunar calendar considered winter to be a monthless period, which originally only had ten months starting with March. The word 'month' should be 'moonth' as a lunar month accounts roughly as the period from one 'new moon' to the next, which is approximately 29.5 days. This period is also called a synodic month and represents the time it takes for the Moon to go through all its phases and return to the same alignment with the Earth and Sun. A harvest moon is when the moon is particularly bright, such that farmers can harvest crops during the night and usually occurs in September, but sometimes early October.

August, September and October are months when many birds migrate south to escape the short cold days of winter. Maybe the most remarkable of these is the arctic tern (*Sterna paradisaea*), which breeds in the northern Arctic zones and spends the winter in the Antarctic. I am also fascinated by cuckoos (*Cuculus canoris*), who never meet their biological parents, but instinctively know where and when to go (Africa) for the winter after fledging in late summer. Other bird species can at least migrate in mixed age groups, often with their parents, but most cuckoo adults leave Europe in June before their offspring have fledged the host's nest. The other thing to look out for in the autumn is spiders' webs. They often show up with dew or frost in cold mornings. Most insects die at the end of the summer, and nature is never wasteful, there is always a use for its products. Some insects lay eggs, and then die with the first frosts or are eaten by spiders or birds. Others hibernate as larvae, pupae or adults, and some such as painted lady (*Vanessa cardui*) butterflies migrate south like some birds.

One of my specialities is the blue tit (*Cyanistes caeruleus*). I studied how they planned their families to optimise breeding success for my doctorate. What I found has been published in my book called 'The Blue Tit'. One relevant thing is that female British blue tits often migrate for short distances, maybe 100 miles or so from where they bred, usually southwest and near the coast. The south-west of England is probably the warmest place on our island in the winter due to the relatively warm Atlantic Conveyer current flowing from the Gulf of Mexico to Britain. Male blue tits tend to remain at their nesting sites.

### Sussex Wildlife Trust September 2025 – Woodlice and Dead wood

A minibeast staple of childhood bug hunts, and comprising of 30 UK species, woodlice can be found in gardens all year round.

Not lice at all, but terrestrial crustaceans, meaning they have hard exoskeletons, woodlice are related to crabs and shrimp. Favouring damp habitats to avoid drying out, these helpful critters can be found under rocks, logs and in compost heaps, doing what they do best, recycling. Nothing is off the menu, as woodlice will consume dead plant and animal matter, fungi, lichen, and with full zero-waste commitment, even their own faeces. Woodlice have an extraordinary series of common and nicknames, with a survey once collecting 250 regional variations; chuckypig, slater, pillbug, monkeypea and woodpig, to name a few. It's not known why woodlice have so many alternative names, but a lovely theory is that it's due to their accessibility to children playing in gardens, who come up with imaginative names which stick over time.

A critical habitat for woodlice is dead wood, whether fallen or dead trees, rotting stumps, logs or stick piles. A sometimes-overlooked environment, dead wood is often a microcosm bursting with life.

Fungi are a hugely important partner in the dead wood cycle, by both contributing to the decay process and feeding on the dead wood itself. Many insects rely on this habitat, including Saproxylic Beetles, which burrow into the softer surfaces to avoid predators, their grubs feeding on the decaying wood. Insectivorous birds, such as woodpeckers, then benefit from this. Bats utilise holes in standing dead wood to roost, and feed on flying insects attracted to the damp environment it can create. And the decaying wood itself recycles nutrients back into the soil.

With such an impressive ecosystem to support, it is important to leave dead wood and resist any temptation to clear it away. On a large scale, it can contribute to a diversity of woodland understory, creating different angles and textures as you peer through the forest, increasing not only the ecological value, but the mystical aesthetic of our ancient Ebernoe reserve, for example. On a smaller garden scale, it can provide a bug-hotel-style feature and a vital home for the important wildlife we don't always notice; a chuckypig paradise.



#### Summer Show 2025 - Quite An Event!

As the sun came up on Framfield Recreation Ground on Saturday 16<sup>th</sup> August, the quiet field was revealed with a light dew coating the blades of grass, to have been transformed the day before from an empty field (admittedly with a large white marquee in the centre) into our Summer Show! Thanks must go to the Summer Show Committee, the Framfield and Blackboys Horticultural Society Committee and the army of volunteers who emptied the container, moved items around the field and erected the hardware of the Summer Show. Without these many hands, the show would just not take place.

Slowly people arrived to set out their entries in both the marquee and the Memorial Hall. With over 600 entries into this competitive part of the event, the diverse skills of the parish were on full display with a spectacle consisting of vegetables, fruit, flower arrangements, handicrafts, cookery and photographic entries. The Children's section was again well supported by both Framfield CE and Blackboys CE Schools along with additional entries from the parish. The results of the show are at the end of this article.

By the time we reached midday, the slight drizzle had departed and the field was buzzing. The gates began admitting the over 900 visitors to the show who enjoyed the wide range of stalls. The refreshment tent opened with a huge array of cakes making your choice so tricky but oh so tasty! The bar of course, despite the cloud cover, did brisk business. Competitive events such as the bra-pong, welly-wang, bowling, egg-throwing as well as the luck-based raffle, tombolas and hoopla continued the traditions from previous years.

The central arena, with the Scarecrow entries around the edge, saw Hollie sing a range of popular songs, CMA Martial Arts demonstrations, the Uckfield Ukulele Band perform as well as, for possibly the last time, The Return of the Red Barrows. The afternoon concluded with the Children's Races and the now annual Egg Throwing Championship. The voting for best Around the Village photograph continued through the day having begun with the exhibits on show in the entrance of the Hare and Hounds (who kindly donated the prizes for this category).

The Show profit will again continue to be divided and provide a Community Fund that can be bid for later in the year. The support of visitors and the money they spend serves to increase the size of the funding available and 2025 will be much the same in size as the previous year.

The show runs on volunteers, and I would like to thank the very long list of those who have made the show take place. From the Summer Show Committee to those who did a stint staffing a stall or an entrance gate: thank you for you time and commitment to allowing our Summer Show to be the highlight of the parish's calendar where it brings together so many people for the afternoon.

#### NEWS FROM YOUR WEALDEN DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

Councillor Ward Budget Scheme – a new community grant funding scheme has been launched by WDC to give each elected councillor a budget of £10,000 to support community projects, events and organisations within their ward. The scheme is open to non-profit community and voluntary organisations to apply for a grant of up to £5,000 in support of projects that will benefit Wealden residents. If anyone is interested, please make contact with me.

Local Government Review – the latest timetable is detailed below. Consultants have concluded that the most cost-effective way to progress is to go forward as East Sussex rather than a mixture of smaller unitary authorities so the various councils involved will be putting forward their decisions on this during late September.

- 26 Sept 2025 submission to the Government of Unitary Authority proposals by East Sussex, West Sussex and Brighton & Hove
- May 2026 election for Mayor of Sussex
- May 2027 elections to the Shadow Unitary Authorities
- April 2028 Vesting Day for new Unitary Authorities (at which point existing County, District and Borough Councils will cease to exist)

#### Framfield Parish Council - Update

A few updates to share with you in this edition.

#### Lewes Road speed limit scheme

The long-awaited Parish Council scheme to reduce the speed limit on the B2192 Lewes Road has once again been delayed by East Sussex County Council (ESCC). This time, the setback is due to clashes with other scheduled works, and, as always, the project remains at risk of being pushed back further if emergency works arise elsewhere.

The Parish Council has made repeated representations to ESCC to express our frustration, understandably so, as it is now over three years since the project began. Despite our efforts, we are told there will be no extension of the scheme beyond Hollow Lane past the Stonebridge Lane junction.

At present, works are pencilled in to start in the last week of September, with additional measures such as High Friction Surfacing (HFS) and advanced signage programmed for mid-October. After that, a number of legal processes must be completed before the new limit can formally take effect, and as yet we have no confirmed date for when this will happen. Updates will be shared via our website and social media as soon as we have firm news, or in the next edition of the Parish Magazine if we experience another delay. ESCC continue to assure us of their commitment to deliver the scheme as soon as possible.

#### Blackboys-Framfield (B2102) footpath

Many of you will be aware, particularly if you follow our online updates or attend the Parish Council meetings that the condition of the footpath between Blackboys and Framfield has become a real concern. In some stretches the path narrows to as little as 30cm, making it impossible for those with mobility aids or pushchairs to use. While we recognise this was never designed as a wide, urban-style pavement, its state has deteriorated to the point where it is often unusable.

For many years, the Parish Council has been proactive in taking forward residents' complaints on matters such as this. Unfortunately, ESCC have informed us that, according to their records, they have not received any complaints from residents at all. We will, of course, continue to work with residents on parish matters, but in light of ESCC's rather selective awareness, we would also strongly encourage you to report any highway issues to them directly, just so there can be no possible doubt.

The Parish Council has been pressing ESCC Highways to treat this as a priority, especially with further housing developments planned in the area. Despite several site meetings and discussions, we were recently dismayed to receive a response from ESCC stating: "Much of the area currently covered by verge has been in this condition for so long that there is no longer a hard surface beneath. Given this, we will not be proceeding with further works at this stage."

We found this reply deeply disappointing and have now lodged a formal corporate complaint. We await their response, but our position is clear: this situation is not acceptable.

#### **Blackboys High Street speed limit**

We are continuing to look at the feasibility of reducing the speed limit on Blackboys High Street from 40mph to 30mph. A meeting with ESCC has been requested so we can explore what options might be available, and we will share more information once we have it.

#### Framfield Memorial Hall car park

A polite reminder about the Memorial Hall car park: this is private and reserved for hall users only. We have noticed an increase in vehicles parking there without permission. While some may assume that using an "empty" car park causes no harm, the reality is that it encourages others to do the same. The hall is hired at various times throughout the week, and those bookings rely on all spaces being available for their use. Please help us to respect this rule, it makes a real difference.

#### **Palehouse Common Playground**

The toddler swing has now been replaced and is in use again. Apologies for the delay in not rectifying this sooner.

#### Sussex Police, PCSO Street Meeting

There will be a street meeting in November outside Framfield Memorial Hall where you can pose questions relating to policing issues. At time of press, it is only pencilled in for 3<sup>rd</sup> November 2pm-4pm. We will clarify online, once confirmed. A member of the Parish Council will also be there, should you wish to discuss a parish matter with us.
